Dear School District U-46 Community,

This 2019 Annual Report to U-46 staff, students, parents, and community members provides a snapshot of our accomplishments and the amazing work carried out each day on behalf of our students. We have much to celebrate in School District U-46, both in 2019 and as we look forward.

Evidence-based funding from the state, now in its third year, has provided so many more opportunities for our students and our communities — and has deepened our ability to invest in the future. With the addition of 26,000

Chromebooks over the past two years, every student in grades 5 through 12 has a device for school and home. Ninety percent of our classrooms in

> grades kindergarten through 2nd now have 25 or fewer students, lower than the student-teacher ratio at many area private and charter schools.

> > We've added instructional coaches in classrooms, and more assistant



principals to our larger elementary schools. We were able to refresh computers for teachers and administrators and embark on \$40 million in capital improvements over last summer, including the completion of library remodels across the five comprehensive high schools.

Investing in Our Students of Today and Tomorrow

The Evidence-Based Funding for Student Success Act that School District U-46 advocated for at the state level in 2017 has provided new revenue that has allowed the District to provide strategic support for our faculty and our more than 38,000 students. A funding formula grounded in evidence provides our District team with guidance on how our investments might improve outcomes for students today and in the future.

Over the past two school years, the District was able to lower class sizes for kindergarten through 2nd grade students, add more instructional coaches to provide guidance to teachers, and add eight assistant principals at elementary schools that historically have been under-staffed and underresourced. The new positions have also provided the District the opportunity to recruit, train, and hire administrators who represent the diversity of our students.

One of the elementary schools that added an assistant principal this school year is Heritage Elementary School, where about 76 percent of its 425 students come from low-income homes. Principal Catherine Fletcher, who has headed Heritage for nine years, said her School Improvement Plan Team identified the need for an additional administrator in 2018 while analyzing their school performance results with District Cabinet members.

Meanwhile, Principal Fletcher said she felt stretched on her own as she tried to meet the needs of her staff, support the social-emotional needs of students, and ensure that Heritage classrooms are places where the children can problem solve, feel safe, and learn to regulate their emotions.

Dr. Angel Brooks arrived as her new assistant principal in July 2019, and Principal Fletcher said she is the "perfect

fit" for the Streamwood school, providing a fresh perspective and being a strong listener who is able to assess situations with an open mind.

"It's just incredible to have someone who is a true partner in everything that we do here," said Principal Fletcher.

While Dr. Brooks had spent much of her educational career in Chicago's south suburbs, she said she was drawn to U-46 because of its history, size, and innovative programs like Dual Language.

"I'm learning from the

best," Dr. Brooks said, nodding toward Principal Fletcher. "And I'm here to help her. I'm her right hand, and we're doing this together, so that our students can grow and our staff will grow, because we're working and making changes for our future."

Elementary assistant principals like Dr. Brooks have access to a variety of development opportunities and supports, including whole team meetings focused on strengths-based leadership, District-wide professional learning sessions, monthly cohort meetings with other assistant principals, and 1:1 site coaching visits with the assistant

superintendents of elementary schools, instruction and equity. The goal is to prepare the next generation of school leaders in U-46.

"We create a variety of small- and large-group ways for elementary administrators to connect with each other," said Steve Burger, one of the two assistant superintendents who supports the district's 42 elementary buildings, "and to reflect on how the Illinois Performance Standards for School Leaders can ground and guide their professional practice."

146 Academic Spotlight

Exemplary Schools

Bartlett Elementary School celebrated its 90th birthday in 2019 (festivities pictured below), and both it and Prairieview Elementary School in Bartlett were named "Exemplary" on the 2019 Illinois Report Card, the state's top designation. The report provides a detailed look at each school's progress on academics, student success, school culture and climate, and financial investments. Schools that are named exemplary perform in the top 10 percent of all public schools in the state and have no underperforming subgroups. The Illinois Report Card designated 46 other schools in U-46 as "Commendable."



Top 100

Bartlett High School was recognized in 2019 by U.S. News & World Report among the top 100 public high schools in the state of Illinois. Schools were rated on six measures: college readiness; breadth of college curriculum; reading and math proficiency; reading and math performance; graduation rate; and performance of underserved students. With nearly 2,500 students, the graduation rate at BHS is 94 percent, and 39 percent of its students took at least one Advanced Placement exam during the period studied. It was ranked 86th among Illinois public high schools.





Technology

≺ chool District U-46 began the 2019-20 school year by distributing 12,000 Chromebooks to all students in 5th through 8th grades. The initiative built on the 1:1 technology program started in 2018 when 14,000 Chromebooks were distributed to high schoolers and to middle schoolers enrolled in specific math classes. The technology has improved equity and access for all students, as not all students have access to their own computing device at home. The Chromebooks have also enhanced the tailoring of instruction for students with disabilities and increased access to key content for English Language Learners. Applications such as the Google suite of tools have increased collaboration among students, as well as between teachers and students. And as the District moves forward in developing recommendations for the use of technology over the next five years, it has instituted new professional development opportunities for teachers based on the premise that technology is not an end in itself but that it can enable and enhance the most effective learning behaviors.



College and Career Exploration

tudents in U-46's eight middle schools had several opportunities to explore their strengths and interests and how those might be related to college and career paths after high school. A web-based platform called Naviance helps students identify what makes them unique and think more deeply about what that means for their future. School counselors, who were added to middle schools in 2018 thanks to evidence-based funding, help students explore their career options. Additionally, more than 2,500 8th-grade students across the District traveled to the Sears Centre Arena with their classmates, teachers, and principals to Explore 2019, the District's fifth annual curriculum and career expo. Explore is held in partnership with the Alignment Collaborative for Education, a local non-profit that brings together community resources to support District priorities. Designed to demonstrate the connection between academics and careers, the event featured representatives from more than 90 companies, organizations, hospitals, universities, and nonprofits. In total, the exhibitors represented a dozen "career clusters" that 8th graders could explore at a time when they are beginning to recognize their interests and — together with their parents, teachers, and guidance counselors — plan for high school and beyond.

Many of these same expo exhibitors are also increasingly providing our high school students with work-based learning experiences, from one-day job shadowing to internships that can last as long as a summer. These experiences provide students with exposure to a professional career path, allow them to apply knowledge from the classroom in the workplace, and give them the opportunity to build connections and confidence.

All of these initiatives tie into the important work being done at the District level to expand small learning communities to all U-46 high schools. Called Educational Pathways, these learning communities will emphasize rigor and relevance, relationships with peers and staff, and college and career readiness skills. They will also ensure students can explore a field of interest and graduate with early college credit or industry-recognized credentials in addition to a high school diploma. Dual Language


he District's award-winning Dual Language program expanded to 10th grade to start the 2019-20 school year as we move to become a K-12 Dual Language district. More than 11,000 preschoolers through sophomores in U-46 are on their way to becoming bilingual and biliterate, better ready to build careers in a global society. Already we are seeing evidence of the power of this program. Dual Language freshmen took the Advanced Placement Spanish language test in the spring of 2019, and nearly half of them (48 percent) passed the test, earning a 3 or higher, without having taken the AP Spanish course.

Also in 2019, the English Language Learners department hosted its fourth annual Dual Language Parent Academy in November at Elgin High School. Two women who are examples of the power of bilingualism, biliteracy, and multiculturalism made the event extra special. Illinois State Superintendent of Education Dr. Carmen Ayala (pictured below with CEO Sanders and Highland Elementary 5th grader Scarlett Cabral) helped launch the workshop, and Sylvia Acevedo, the CEO of the Girls Scouts of the USA and a former rocket scientist with NASA, delivered the keynote address. Karen Osborne, a social worker at Fox Meadow Elementary School in South Elgin, was named the 2019 Kane County Student Support Personnel of the Year. Osborne is a Streamwood High School graduate who was inspired to go into her field after a social worker helped her process the grief associated with losing her father as a teenager. At Fox Meadow, Osborne meets with students in classrooms, small groups, and individually to support their social-emotional and behavioral goals.



Students from Larkin High School presented its production of "Faculty Portrait," and students from South Elgin High School presented "The Addams Family" at the 2019 Illinois High



Abbott Middle School in Elgin, Canton Middle School in Streamwood, and Eastview Middle School in Bartlett all sent teams to the Illinois Science Olympiad competition in the spring of 2019 at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Science Olympiad is an enrichment program held before or after school that covers all areas of STEM. Six of the students earned first place in their events. The team from Abbott, pictured above, placed fourth overall in their division.



More than 60 community leaders participated in U-46's 12th annual Principal for a Day event in December 2019, leaving with firsthand experience of how principals guide school teams to meet the academic, social, and emotional goals of each student. Illinois State Board of Education Chairman Darren Reisberg was the guest principal at Creekside Elementary School in Elgin (he's pictured to the right of Creekside Principal Joel Pollack) and then served as the keynote speaker at a luncheon afterward for administrators and guest principals.



U-46 was honored in 2019 with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from The NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education. Standing out among the District's music programs is Joya Dorada de U-46, the District's mariachi band consisting of students from six middle schools and two high schools.

Equity Plan

School District U-46 continues to make equity integral to who we are and the work we do. The Equity Committee, formed in 2018 and initially led by the late Ron Raglin, set out to aggressively include and value all students, especially those who have been historically marginalized, invisible or forgotten.

In November 2019, the Equity Committee presented a five-year Equity plan to the Board of Education. The plan has four core goals, all aligned to the four pillars of the District's Strategic Plan:

- To close the opportunity gap among students
- To recruit, develop, and retain a diverse, forward-thinking, and culturally proficient workforce
- To create a welcoming and safe environment



• To equitably distribute funds across the District to eliminate barriers to student success.

In 2020, the Equity Committee will create a plan of action to lead the District on a journey toward equity. Steps will include ensuring that curriculum and instruction materials reflect our diverse student population. Also scheduled is developing a long-range staff recruitment plan and a comprehensive professional development plan.

"The plan is very much a living, breathing document subject to change as we deepen our learning and make adjustments and revisions as needed," said Lisa Jackson, a member of the committee and the District's Coordinator of Assessment & Accountability. She says that adding student voices to the effort in 2020 is just one example of how the Equity plan will continue to evolve.

Facilities Review

full-scale evaluation of how U-46's facilities are used, and a review of its current and future capacity needs, started in 2019 and is expected to stretch through most of 2020. The development of a long-range capital plan will prepare the District's high school buildings for the launch of the

Educational Pathways program through construction and remodeling. It will also outline priorities and timelines for replacing or updating infrastructure and creating new learning spaces across



U-46 that can easily integrate technology and are flexible enough to accommodate independent small-group and whole-class learning.

The evaluation will help determine the feasibility of shifting 6th grade out of the District's elementary schools and into its eight middle schools.

School District U-46 currently operates 56 school sites, one bus facility, one plant operations building, and one food services commissary. Altogether, the District's buildings comprise an estimated 5.8 million square feet and total property of 830 acres



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U-46 Educational Foundation

he U-46 Educational Foundation will begin 2020 with a new coordinator leading the non-profit organization, the first time the group has had a full-time employee. The group has distributed nearly \$800,000 in donations since 2008 to expand opportunities for U-46 students beyond what is possible with tax dollars. The new administrator will build on that tradition by enhancing relationships in and among the 11 communities served by U-46 as well as establishing stronger connections with the District's proud and accomplished alumni.

The Foundation partnered with the District's School &

Community Relations department on two exciting initiatives in 2019. In January, members of the Foundation's Board of Directors surprised eight teachers in their classrooms with awards of up to \$500, called Innovation Mini-Grants, to support bright new ideas in teaching and learning. In May, the two groups created a Thanka-Teacher campaign. Students and parents were invited to honor teachers with a donation. That campaign generated nearly \$6,000 for the Foundation, and 110 teachers were celebrated with pins for their lanyards, customized cards, inspirational posters, or surprise visits from the donors.
