Village Board approves proposals, bills listing

The Village Board of Trustees unanimously approved of five proposals pertaining to police or public works as well as a list of bills at its meeting on Tuesday, May 7.

Included was a resolution approving the purchase of up to 1,300 tons of road salt at a total cost of \$107,848. The purchase would be with Compass Minerals America, Inc. through a DuPage County Joint Purchase Program.

The cost is \$82.96 per ton, up from \$67.15 last year. According to a memo from Dan Dinges, director of public works, the village expects to be over a

budgeted \$150,000 for salt with an additional purchase planned.

"Due to the extreme winter weather felt throughout the nation this previous winter, salt prices have increased, which may impact the previously budgeted amounts for salt," Dinges wrote. He added: "We also will be procuring up to an additional 1,200 tons through the State Joint Purchase Program, which Staff also suspects will also increase from the previous year's \$48.23 per ton. Our total cost for salt this year was budgeted at \$150,000 for 2,500 tons, but with the increase in the cost of salt, it may reach

up to \$185,000."

Two proposals with Currie Motors Fleet in Frankfort were approved for the purchase of vehicles.

Included is an all-wheel drive, V-6 engine vehicle for the police department which will cost \$36,397, slightly below a budgeted \$37,000, which is being purchased through the Suburban Purchasing Cooperative.

"The police department would like to purchase a replacement 2020 Ford Utility Police Interceptor vehicle as budgeted to be assigned to the patrol division," wrote Chief of Police Patrick Ullrich in a memo to the board.

The other vehicle being purchased is a sewer televising van, a 2019 full-sized Ford transit van, through a cooperative of state municipalities. The price per specifications in \$21,748 with a final delivery price of \$28,789, and the remainder of a budgeted \$45,000 is also planned to be used on the van.

"The additional costs of upgrading include both High Rook and Extended Wheelbase Options which allows personnel to operate equipment and stand upright, inside the vehicle," Dinges wrote in a memo. "The remaining \$16,220.00 will be used to install necessary equipment inside of the vehicle."

An agreement with Engineering Enterprises, Inc. (EEI) costing \$47,449,

below a budgeted \$50,000, was approved.

"We have completed the majority of the public sanitary sewer maintenance improvements in the area north of the railroad tracks and east Oak Ave. and we are ready to move to a new area," Dinges wrote in a memo. "This contract is for flow monitoring of two areas of our sewer system that we have been experiencing high flows during rain events. The area covers the majority of homes south of Devon Ave. and north of the Com Ed ROW."

Dinges said the village has worked with EEI "on our sanitary sewer system rehabilitation and would like them to help us with this new area."

The board also approved an ordinance to accept public improvements made by developer Muirfield West, LLC at its building off Schiferl Road in the Brewster Creek Business Park.

"The public improvements consist of an extension of the Village's water main system," wrote Bob Allen, village engineer, in a memo. He added: "This water main has been operational and functioning successfully for more than 12 months."

The approved bills list totaled \$1.4 million with the water (\$712,958), municipal building (\$244,899), general (\$199,293) and central services (\$122,889) funds making up the largest portions.

License, permit requests ratified by village board

The Village Board of Trustees unanimously approved three requests for licenses or permits at its meeting on Tuesday, May 7.

Included was an open burn request made by the Bartlett American Legion Post 1212 on Memorial Day, Monday, May 27, for a flag retirement ceremony at Bartlett Park. This is the 19th straight year the post has held the event according to Joey Dienberg, administrative intern.

The ceremony starts at 10 a.m. and "will last approximately 15-30 minutes in which time the flags will be retired," Dienberg wrote in a memo. An open burn permit is required and the Bartlett Fire Protection District is aware of the event.

The board also approved a Class D liquor license request made by Arts in Bartlett for an event at Bartlett Park on Saturday, June 22 and Sunday, June 23.

"The Class D liquor license allows for the retail sale of alcohol for a special event" for no more than 12 hours in a single day and during the hours of 8 a.m. to 1 a.m. on Sunday through Thursday and 8 a.m. to 2 a.m. on Friday and Saturday according to Sam Hughes, senior management analyst.

A parade permit was also approved by the board for BAPS Charities which for its annual walkathon which raises funds for the Bartlett Park Foundation, the Hanover Township Foundation and the Nature Conservancy. The walkathon will take place on Sunday, June 2 from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.

"The route begins at Bartlett Park, proceeds to the Bartlett Library and back to Bartlett Park.... BAPS anticipates 800 walkers for this year's event and plans on utilizing street parking around the park, as well as the Metra parking, with village permission," according to Dienberg.

May officially designated as Bike Month in village

This month has been declared Bike Month in Bartlett by Village President Kevin Wallace.

The League of American Bicyclists sponsors the month and has designated May as National Bike Month since 1956.

Trustee Michael Camerer, who chairs the Bike and Run Plan Advisory Committee, read a proclamation at the Board of Trustees meeting on Tuesday, May 7.

Camerer said that bicycles have been a part of American life for over a century.

"Today, millions of Americans engage in bicycling be-

cause it is a viable and environmentally sound form of transportation, an excellent form of fitness and provides quality family recreation," Camerer said.

According to Camerer, the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning is working with both Bartlett and Streamwood in creating a multijurisdictional bike plan while developing an inventory of current facilities, both bike and pedestrian, through its Local Technical Assistance program.

"The inventory will identify key gaps, prioritize new bike paths and connections, maintain existing bike infrastructure and promote biking throughout

both villages," Camerer said.

Camerer said the village's bike and run committee "promotes safe bike and pedestrian activities on the village's bike path system," and Ride Illinois provides information and safe and proper use of bikes at bikesafetyquiz.com.

"The Village of Bartlett, the Bartlett Park District and the DuPage County Forest Preserve and independent cyclists throughout our village are promoting greater public awareness of bicycle operations and safety education in an effort to reduce accidents, injuries and fatalities for all," Camerer said.

U-46 students honored for work at state events

A group of students in School District U-46 were recognized for their accomplishments at various state events from last month at the Board of Education meeting on Monday, May 20.

South Elgin senior Sarah Richardson was recognized for winning the broadcast news category by producing an audio news clip under a deadline at the state journalism competition at Heartland Community College in Pontiac.

The Storm finished 11th as a team at state which included senior Samantha Prus and junior Derryl Barnes Jr. teaming up to finish fourth in the video news category and junior Mia Ackermann taking fifth in newspaper design.

"I'm so excited that our publication classes were able to collaborate with Beacon Academy to pull together a very strong journalism team for the IHSA sectionals and state competition," said Kari Botkin, one of the team's coaches, for a district press release. "Sarah performed very well, under deadline, at both sectionals and state."

Five high school seniors, three from South Elgin and two from Streamwood, were recognized for first place finishes at the state manufacturing competition with Skills USA. The students will travel to Louisville, Kentucky next month for the national competition.

South Elgin's Hailey Harden won CNC Turning, Brian Kulpa won CNC Technician and Dylan Loerwald won CNC Milling. Streamwood's first place finishers were Jacob Pierce and Andrew Pfeifer in Additive Manufacturing.

"I am very proud and impressed with each student's commitment to honing their precision manufacturing skills to become college and career ready," said South Elgin's manufacturing teacher Russ Bartz for the press release. "Their achievements are tangible proof that our precision manufacturing program sets up students for success."

Zach Meyer and Michael Solomon from South Elgin and Angel Acosta, Juan Ayala, Aditya Patel and Christopher Piotrowski from Streamwood all placed at the competition in various events.

Six middle school students were honored for first place finishes at the state's Science Olympiad. Jazib Ahmed and Patricia Savioa-Cooley from Bartlett's Eastview won in the roller coaster event, and from Elgin's Abbott two sets of students earned top honors with Nolan Chansophy and Joshua Dinh in disease detective and Jesse Dinh and Kate Gillespie in water quality.

"I am so proud of our Science Olympiad teams and grateful for the dedication of each team's coaches, students and parents," Deb McMullen, the district's science coordinator, said for the release. "Science Olympiad provides students with valuable STEM experience that allows them to explore their interests and prepares them for a career in STEM."

U-46 supports changes to Hanover Park TIF

The Board of Education in School District U-46 was mostly supportive of an extension and expansion to a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) district in the Village of Hanover Park during a discussion at its May 6 meeting.

Hanover Park will be holding a public hearing regarding a redevelopment amendment in front of a joint review board on Thursday, June 20 at its Village Hall.

"Among other matters, the amendment extends the term of the Village Center Redevelopment Project Area from 23 years to 35 years and adds additional territory," the notice of public hearing states.

Jeff King, U-46's deputy superintendent of operations, said he was a member of the joint review board and was seeking guidance on how he should vote from the U-46 board, which did not have to take any official vote.

In March, 2018, the previous U-46 board approved of a letter in support of extending the TIF 12 years. That vote was 4-2 with Sue Kerr, the board's current president, and former board member Jeanette Ward voting no.

In 2018, Hanover Park stated in a resolution that the TIF was "set to expire in six years and will not achieve its development goals without the extension," and the TIF was "running a deficit of \$6.6 million as of the 2016 reporting period."

For the current discussion, King said the only difference from what the U-46 board approved last year was additional land being added to the TIF which adds "about 6 acres of property to the TIF which is all Metra parking on the south side of the tracks. It's already tax-exempt property so we don't collect any taxes from that property, and there's a little bit of Liberty Street that's included in that."

King said that Hanover Park needs access to underground utilities for upgrades but won't be able to use TIF funds to perform those upgrades without adding the additional land onto the TIF. He added that "the addition of the property really is a moot point because it's tax-exempt."

Board member Melissa Owens asked why it was tax-exempt to which King said "it's Metra's property." U-46 CEO Tony Sanders said the district was opposed and did not plan on bringing the discussion to the board until finding out the additional land was tax-exempt.

Kerr said she was opposed last year and "I continue to oppose it" stating that this sets a precedent of continuing to extend TIFs at will.

Owens said she was supportive of the extension but agreed with Kerr saying "now we're finding ourselves in a situation where something's being incrementally added." She said last year that she supported the TIF

extension because Rodney Craig, Hanover Park's mayor, is a "supporter of U-46."

Board member John Devereux replied: "I'm not sure it sets a precedent. We have the option to say this one's ok and a future one isn't."

Board member Donna Smith said she agreed with the TIFs expansion saying "it won't really effect what we've already agreed on," and board members Veronica Noland and Eva Porter concurred. Porter's husband, Herb Porter, is a Hanover Park trustee and supporter of Craig.

U-46 resident Tracy Smodilla spoke during public comments and said she opposed the expansion on principle but also said there's been a lack of transparency. The public knows that King is a member of the joint review board because he brought this discussion to the board, but the public may largely be in the dark according to Smodilla.

Smodilla said there are no meeting minutes from the last joint review board meeting on Nov. 13 and nothing is posted on who is a member of the board or how they were put onto the board, and "I think that there's been a lack of transparency in how this request has actually been presented."

In the Village of Bartlett, Smodilla said she's served on the Economic Development Commission for eight years and she's philosophically opposed to TIFs that appear more akin to cronyism rather than free market competition.

"I've already been to the dance a number of times (in Bartlett) on TIF requests, and I think unfortunately they've become just a vehicle for private investment at the expense of the local community," Smodilla said

Regarding this specific TIF, Smodilla said she's frequently driven through this TIF area in Hanover Park and "it's not blighted. As a matter of fact, that's a district that stands to benefit from not just the I-390 extension but the proposed improvements to transportation there."

Last year, Craig claimed the I-390 (Elgin-O'Hare tollway) should help increase business activity in this TIF which should allow them to meet the original goals of the TIF with the extension. He also cited the personal and corporate tax cuts from the federal government under President Donald Trump will also increase business activity.

However, in Illinois the state government has done the opposite increasing its personal income tax rate by 32 percent and its corporate tax rate by 33.3 percent.

Illinois also continues to see its population decline according to Internal Revenue Service data. The state has dropped from the fifth most populated state to the sixth according to the U.S. Census Bureau.



Credit, debit cards supporting U-46 schools to launch this fall



Parents, teachers and community members seeking to support Elgin Area School District U-46 and its high schools can do so with new debit and credit cards.

Through a partnership with [Kane County Teachers Credit Union](#), the U-46 Educational Foundation will roll out "affinity cards" aligned with each of the district's five high schools next school year. The cards will bear each school's logo and color, and there also will be cards bearing U-46's logo.

The foundation will receive a portion of fees collected from merchants on each credit or debit card transaction made with these affinity cards -- 20% of fee income for debit cards and 25% of fee income for credit cards. Some credit card holders also can donate their rewards to the foundation.

The partnership aims to leverage school pride among high school families, alumni and community members while generating roughly \$25,000 for the foundation in the first year based on current cardholders served through KCT. Roughly 2,700 people associated with U-46 are members of KCT, representing 2,539 debit and credit cards.

Cardholders would have to convert their existing cards into affinity cards. There's a debit card, credit card and a credit card with rewards for each high school.

Over five years, the program is estimated to generate nearly \$400,000 for U-46 schools with no cost to the district, the foundation or cardholders, said Mike Lee, KCT Credit Union president and CEO.

"It's a wonderful way to raise money for a foundation," said Lee adding, the cards will help market and create more community awareness of the educational foundation.

The U-46 Educational Foundation, established in 2006, has raised and distributed roughly \$500,000 to district schools, supported student scholarships and teacher innovation grants. The foundation board is working to generate more resources to support innovation and enhance student learning and well-being, President Bud Wilson said.

The U-46 school board Monday night approved the affinity card program, which has been used successfully by other districts, U-46 CEO Tony Sanders said.

KCT Credit Union partners with East Aurora District 131, West Aurora District 129 and Geneva Unit District 304 on affinity cards.

"U-46 is not a guinea pig," Lee said. "Proof of concept is there. The program works. We are starting to give them checks."

Lee said the credit union is committed to the financial wellness of district teachers and employees and was chartered for that purpose as a not-for-profit by the district in 1937.

It was named U-46's Partner of the Year in 2017-18 and donated \$5,000 in 2018 to the Superintendent Scholarship Program. Its ATMs are installed at all the high schools, the district office and transportation center "as a way to give back to the community," Lee said.

People who don't use KCT Credit Union for banking can apply for the U-46 affinity cards at its three Elgin locations and Aurora, Geneva and South Elgin branches or online.

"We solicit all the employees but we also solicit the community," Lee said. "We will actually highlight this in all of our branches to try to get the community to support our school district."

The Elgin Area School District U-46 school board Monday night recognized 12 students for earning first place in several statewide competitions -- the SkillsUSA Illinois

Championship, the Illinois Science Olympiad, and the Illinois High School Association state journalism finals.

South Elgin High School seniors Hailey Harden, Dylan Loerwald and Brian Kulpa and Streamwood High School seniors Jacob Pierce and Andrew Pfeifer captured first place last month in a statewide manufacturing competition sponsored by SkillsUSA, a school-industry partnership group promoting job skills training.

Each competition was designed to test students' knowledge and ability using CNC (computer numerical control) machines and other manufacturing technologies. It comprised multiple skills tests lasting four to six hours.

Harden won in the CNC (computer numerical control) turning category, Loerwald in CNC milling, Kulpa in CNC technician, and Pierce and Pfeifer in additive manufacturing. The students earned a June trip to Louisville, Kentucky, where they will represent Illinois at the SkillsUSA national competition.

South Elgin students Michael Solomon and Zach Meyer and Streamwood student Christopher Piotrowski finished in second, third, and fifth place, respectively, in the CNC milling competition. Streamwood students Angel Acosta, Juan Ayala and Aditya Patel finished third place in the team-based automated manufacturing technology.

"Their achievements are tangible proof that our precision manufacturing program sets up students for success," said Russ Bartz, South Elgin High manufacturing teacher.

Six middle school students also were honored Monday for earning first place in the Illinois Science Olympiad in April.

Science Olympiad is a before- or after-school enrichment program covering areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

Abbott Middle School in Elgin placed fourth overall in its division. Its team comprising 23 students earned 10 medals at the state competition. Eighth-graders Nolan Chansophy and Joshua Dinh earned first place in "Disease Detective" and Jesse Dinh and Kate Gillespie placed first in water quality.

Eastview Middle School in Bartlett placed 10th overall in its division. The team of 21 students received six medals. Eighth-graders Patricia Savioa-Cooley and Jazib Ahmed earned first place in the roller coaster competition. A team of 12 students from Canton Middle School in Streamwood won five medals at the state competition, placing 15th in its division.

"I am so proud of our Science Olympiad teams and grateful for the dedication of each team's coaches, students, and parents," said Deb McMullen, U-46's coordinator of K-12 science and planetarium. "Science Olympiad provides students with valuable STEM experience that allows them to explore their interests and prepares them for a career in STEM."

South Elgin High junior Sarah Richardson, a student in the Beacon Academy of Media and Digital Arts, was honored for winning the broadcast news category at the IHSA state journalism competition last month. It marks the second time the school won a state championship for broadcast news.

Also, South Elgin junior Derryl Barnes Jr. and senior Samantha Prus earned fourth place in video news, and junior Mia Ackermann placed fifth in newspaper design. South Elgin's team placed 11th out of 70 schools competing.

Citizens council wants more safety training, info on bullying

The U46 Citizens' Advisory Council presented two end-of-year reports to the School Board Monday evening on safety and community engagement.

School District U46's council of parents and community members this week recommended the district look into training students about online safety and provide more data to the public about bullying and harassment in schools.

As the school year draws to a close next week, members of the U46 Citizens' Advisory Council presented two end-of-year reports to the School Board on Monday evening. The reports focused on school safety and community engagement efforts by the council.

Megan Larson, a member of the advisory council's student safety committee, unveiled a list of recommendations regarding safety in the schools. The advisory council's student safety committee formed in the 2017-18 school year to attempt more engagement and understanding of the district's student code of conduct.

"We actually did a lot this past year," Larson said, thanking the district's student safety and culture director John Heiderscheidt and his team for working with them.

Larson said they recommend more presentations and training on online safety, harassment, teen dating and violence, and vaping, among other topics.

Larson stressed the importance of training students about online safety. She said the district's gradual expansion of its one-device-per-student technology initiative means more students are online more frequently and consistently. Students are vulnerable online to threats like trafficking, radicalization, and bullying, their recommendation stated.

Larson noted only a few people attended an online safety presentation they gave earlier in the school year, despite its timely and "disturbing" messages for children and adults alike about online dangers.

“If we’re giving them this technology, we should also give them the tools to protect themselves,” she said.

The safety committee also recommended the district share more data with the public about bullying in schools, focusing on sexual harassment, assault and stalking incidents.

She reminded those in attendance at Monday’s school board meeting it was the Citizens’ Advisory Council that helped bullying reporting become more accessible and visible on the district’s website. The bullying reporting system on the website now includes a mechanism to report any sexual harassment or assault incidents.

“You don’t know how big the problem is if you’re not paying attention to it and having the numbers,” Larson said.

Community engagement was a recurring theme as Larson and fellow advisory council member Phil Novello presented the two end-of-year reports. Novello’s presentation focused on the council’s family and community engagement committee.

“We are lacking a lot of engagement in the district...we need more parents involved, we need more community members involved,” said Novello. “We need more people to know what’s going on in the district.”

Novello noted the fifth annual real estate professionals breakfast continues to grow.

U46 seeks input on proposed high school magnet academies

School District U46 seeks public input on its proposed high school magnet academies via an online survey.

School District U46 is seeking input from students, staff, parents and residents on the five high school magnet academies being proposed as part of the switch to a career pathways approach to education.

The online survey — available in English and Spanish — will be available at the www.u-46.org website until May 29 and seeks feedback on possible curriculum changes and the existing high school academies make the transition to more academically challenging magnet academies.

As things stand right now, Elgin High School houses the gifted and talented academy, Larkin High School has the visual and performing arts academy, Bartlett High School is home to the science, engineering and technology academy, Streamwood High School

has the world languages and international studies academy and the BEACON academy of media and digital arts is at South Elgin High School.

The survey specifically focuses on the Bartlett and South Elgin programs, which may see changes to their STEM and languages/international studies themes, the release said. Respondents also are asked to rank the importance of 21st century skills and potential new themes for the Bartlett and Streamwood academies.

One example of things found in the survey asks for people to offer their opinions on what skills are important for students to gain through an involvement in a magnet academy.

“U46 is committed to creating learning environments that prepare students to be college and career-ready,” Assistant Superintendent of Secondary Schools Instruction and Equity Lela Majstorovic said in a statement.

“The data gathered through this survey will guide the district as it transitions the current Bartlett and Streamwood High School academies to magnet academies.”

The other three high school academy programs are already undergoing the transition to magnet programs. Elgin’s program will seek to add International Baccalaureate (IB) courses and be IB certified. Larkin’s visual and performing arts theme will stay as is but its curriculum will be updated, the release said. Board members approved a curriculum update for the South Elgin academy last year.

Survey results for the Streamwood and Bartlett programs will not impact current students or the incoming group of freshman students this fall, the release said.

The magnet programs are part of the district’s larger plan to have all high school students on a career-focused educational pathway as early as the 2021-22 school year.

“This is our time to celebrate the hard work of our graduating seniors,” Sanders said. “We look forward to celebrating these graduates with the families and staff members who have supported them along this journey.”

- 11 a.m. Bartlett High School
- 2 p.m. Larkin High School
- 5 p.m. Streamwood High School

Dual Credits



For the second year, the district will be honoring seniors who enrolled in the full-time Dual Credit program on the campus of Elgin Community College.

These students, who must demonstrate certain college readiness benchmark scores for acceptance, take all of their courses at ECC. They earn both high school and college credit for each class in the program, which the district plans to expand to include both high school seniors and juniors in the 2020-21 school year.

The district expects to see its first group of students conferred with both their high school diploma and associate’s degree graduate in the Class of 2022.

During the first semester, the Dual Credit students earned a cumulative GPA of 3.42 (eight students earned straight A’s during the first semester) and earned a total of 626 college credits.

For graduation, they will be wearing special stoles and they will participate in an end-of-the-year recognition ceremony at 11 a.m. Wednesday, May 22 at ECC.

“Over my year at Elgin Community College, I have learned a great deal of lessons that will only help me in the future as I pursue a degree in bilingual elementary education,” said Jennifer Robillard, a Streamwood High School senior enrolled in the Dual Credit program. “I want to make a difference in the world as soon as possible, and enrolling in this program provided me with a head start.”

Forty-six graduates rank among the top 2 percent of their graduating class within the five high schools. These students will attend top universities including Northwestern University, the University of Michigan, University of Southern California, Purdue University, Notre Dame, and University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Showcasing Students

The top 2 percent graduates are being showcased daily through the month of May and June on the district’s Facebook page and all profiles also appear on the **Class of 2019 website page**.

For the third year, U-46 will also issue a special honor to graduates who demonstrate a high level of proficiency in one or more languages in addition to English. One hundred and sixty-six members of the Class of 2019 will earn the State of Illinois Seal of Biliteracy and 315 students the Commendation, given to students who have demonstrated significant progress toward achieving a high level of proficiency.

Scholarship Winners



The Class of 2019 graduates include 40 Superintendent’s Scholarship recipients who earned a \$1,000 scholarship and are the first in their family to attend college.

The district’s four-year graduation rate of 84 percent remains in step with the state’s average of 85 percent. The majority of U-46 graduates attend Illinois colleges or universities with Elgin Community College, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and University of Illinois at Chicago ranking as the top three choices.

More than 20,000 people attended last year’s ceremonies at the Sears Centre. In order to continue to run five smooth and efficient high school graduation ceremonies, School

Cary-Grove finally got some breathing room in the final 30 seconds when Stayart knifed through the defense and came in alone on Hononegah keeper Anjelica Ortiz. Ortiz stopped the initial shot, but the rebound popped right back to Stayart, who put it in.

"I think we had a lot of chances and, especially in the first half, we just couldn't finish," Stayart said. "In the second half, we did a really nice job of pressuring down here, it was

just really hard to get the ball across the goal with the wind, but it was really nice to finally score another goal and finish it off."

Avery Nielsen had a couple of nice runs up the right side in the late going but, with the wind acting like an extra defender on almost every play, couldn't connect on the crosses.

Meanwhile, goalkeeper Makenna Sheehan and the Trojans defense kept the Indians at bay. She adeptly handled the tricky conditions.

"Some of the shots they would take from the top were just so hard to judge," she said. "And then the ball would take a bounce and you didn't know which way it would fly to."

Sheehan appeared to have a shot by Hononegah's Abby Hawes lined up perfectly, but the ball just kept sailing. Sheehan had to punch it at the last second as it bounced harmlessly off the football crossbar.

In the second half, she made a sliding stop on a breakaway by Lauren Wagner.

"I just saw (Sheehan) stepping up and doing a job she's very proud of," said Cary-Grove coach Ray Krystal. "She's a very good-quality goalkeeper, and making saves like that shows her abilities."

As good as Gould

Senior outfielder singles in 10th to lift Larkin past Elgin in regional

All Larkin's Jeremy Gould wanted was a chance.

In a pitcher's duel featuring few scoring opportunities, Gould finally got his wish in the bottom of the 10th inning.

Javier Cervantes drew a walk and Thomas Woodruff followed with a single Monday as the Royals put together a two-out rally in a Class 4A Dundee-Crown Regional quarterfinal at Trout Park.

That ended up setting the stage for Gould. The senior outfielder broke a scoreless tie with an RBI single to center to give the Royals a 1-0 victory.

Larkin (5-25) plays Barrington at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday in the regional semifinals at Dundee-Crown.

“It was just a lot of focus,” Gould said. “I knew I needed to make contact. I knew we needed one hit and it would do the job.

“I wanted to be in that position, but two outs is usually a struggle for me. I was able to come through. I needed this game to be over.”

The game-winner was redemption for Gould. He came up with a two-out single in the bottom of the eighth but was thrown out by John Palmer trying to reach third on Max Anderson’s single.

“That’s been Jeremy all year — just smooth, up the middle,” Larkin coach Niko Morado said. “He’s a base-hit guy, doesn’t try to do too much, stays within himself. He was able to line one up the middle and Javy was running hard.”

The winning run came without either starting pitcher still in the game, but both made a huge impact.

Anderson had a 19-strikeout game against Elgin during the regular season. He struck out 14 in 9 1/3 innings Monday before hitting his pitch count.

“He’s had some tough breaks where we kicked it around a little bit defensively behind him, but that’s Max,” Morado said. “Any time we have a big game, Elgin-Larkin, he gets up for it.”

The pitch count also thwarted Kyle Coates, who started for Elgin (1-29) and struck out 11 in 8 1/3 innings.

“That was a true testament to high school pitching right there,” Elgin coach Cody Beck said. “Both of them dug deep and were keeping every hitter on their toes, on both sides.

“Anderson did a great job. Coates did a great job. Every hitter on both sides seemed fooled.”

The Royals face a tough test Wednesday in top-seeded Barrington, but the win over Elgin was a welcome moment.

“It’s big for this group,” Morado said. “For the year that we’ve had, to be able to come out and really put together a team win and grind this out, it’s a good feeling. It’s nice to keep playing playoff baseball.”

Bartlett soccer falls to regional host Spartans

The Bartlett soccer team saw its season come to an end but not without a fight in the Class 3A St. Francis Regional semifinals on Tuesday, May 14 at Wheaton College.

The No. 8 Hawks were facing No. 9 host St. Francis, which won the Class 2A state title last year, and senior Paige Bednarke got her squad off to a big start scoring on a free kick from midfield just 30 seconds into the match for a 1-0 lead.

Bartlett didn't go away quietly. Bednarke said she told her team at the break "it might be the last time I talk during a halftime," and her team responded by netting an equalizer and playing hard to the end.

Just five minutes into the second half, senior Mikayla Brown fed sophomore Serena Salvato who made it 2-2. After St. Francis made it 3-2 midway through the half, Brown had a narrow miss on an attempt moments later before the host scored the final goal with 14:38 left to play.

"I knew that we had the potential and the fight in us," Bednarke said. "I know the scoreboard reads 4-2, but I don't read that in my heart or in my mind. We came out and never gave up."

Senior goalie Jessica Hill finished with eight saves for the Hawks.

Revak called it a "bittersweet" end as his team will lose 11 seniors, but he

knows a lot of young players got a lot of quality experience which included nine underclassmen. He noted freshmen Tessa Evans, Sabrina Fowler and Madison Neer who were "thrown into a situation and they absolutely stepped up."

Bartlett ends the season 7-13-2 overall. Although below .500, the Hawks lost eight games by a goal with a brutal nonconference schedule and their defense posted seven shutouts, and both Bednarke and Brown feel they

are leaving the Hawks in good hands for a bright future.

"People are going to have to watch out for Bartlett soccer," Bednarke said.

"Our freshmen, they have so much potential," said Brown, a Wisconsin-Stevens Point recruit. "They have made a huge impact on our team already."

The Hawks other seniors include Jocelyn Carlos, Amber Fiedler, Abigail Hawes, Rachel Helgesen, Kaley Kowal, Jasmine Mendez, Morgan Myers and Kelsey Sniatynsky.

The South Elgin soccer team captured the Huntley Regional title in a defensive, overtime thriller as the No. 4 Storm defeated No. 5 Huntley 1-0 in the championship match on Saturday, May 18.

The evenly matched teams, Huntley finishing with a 7-6 edge in shots on goal, went scoreless through 80 minutes thanks in large part to strong goalkeeping, including Storm junior goalie Megan McClure who finished with seven saves including some big stops on pointblank attempts in the team's 10th shutout of the season.

The Storm offense kept up the pressure throughout, Barthelt finishing the scoring in the second half, while McHenry struggled to create any chances all game. The score could have been even more lopsided as South Elgin's offense on multiple occasions hit the crossbar or side posts.

"We just had gaps in our defense," said Streamwood coach Kristin Duffy. "They found


their way through our holes, and we just couldn't slow them down at that point."
