## U46 opens class talks on MLK to public

Middle schoolers debate leader's ideas

The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s ideals echoed this week through the classrooms of Kimball Middle School.

Monday was the holiday that celebrates the civil rights leader's birth, and in three AVID classes at the Elgin middle school, students weighed in on his ideals and vision Wednesday during a special Socratic seminar. The students debated King's philosophy of the "Beloved Community" in which nonviolent solutions are sought to resolve problems and bring about change.

Unlike these types of sessions in other schools, Kimball's program was open to the public. Two other middle schools will hold similar public seminars later this month.

Ron Raglin, School District U46's assistant superintendent for educational support programs and alignment, said opening the seminars to the community gives adults an opportunity to hear "the student voice" on topics that need to be addressed, such as how to prevent violent incidents in schools.

In Wednesday's program, Kimball students questioned and debated King's ideals and how they could be incorporated into schools.

A Socratic seminar, usually conducted in a circle, allows students to open up and engage, Raglin said. It's a valuable approach to critical thinking and discussion because it invites everyone — whether they are extroverted or introverted — into the discussion, he said.

"I can be safe, there (are) rules in place, I am speaking and if I say something, others will hear and respond," Raglin said about the benefits of these types of seminars.

Some students said they saw an opportunity to use peaceful approaches to limit the number of student fights in schools.

"When you fight (in school), it makes everyone, the school look bad," eighth-grader Diego Jaimes said.

Students suggested walking away from confrontations, "turning the other cheek" on potential fights and not sensationalizing fights that do take place.

"You're in the hallway, you see it, you hear it," teacher and moderator Marybeth Seymour said. "What can you do? What can you do to have others turn the other cheek, take the high road? I'm using phrases you just said."

Eighth-grader Pheonix Taylor said, "We can start by talking it out."

The next Socratic seminars will be held at Abbott Middle School in Elgin and Canton Middle School in Streamwood. Both will focus on King's philosophy of nonviolence, Raglin said.

Canton's seminars will be held at 9 a.m., 11:27 a.m. and 2:43 p.m. Jan. 25. Abbott's is scheduled for 9 a.m. Jan. 29. All seminars are free, open to the public and 45 minutes long.
