U-46 Food and Nutrition Services recognized for success ahead of National School Lunch Week

Elgin Area School District U-46's Food and Nutrition Services department will be honored with an "Accent on Achievement" during Monday night's board of education meeting just ahead of National School Lunch Week.

The federally-funded National School Lunch Program has been serving the nation's children since 1946 and provides nutritionally balanced, healthy meals to more than 30 million children every day. National School Lunch Week will be celebrated in schools across the country Oct. 14-18, 2019.

U-46 serves 3.35 million lunches annually, with an average of 18,700 students eating a school lunch each day, said Elena Hildreth, director of the Food and Nutrition Services department.

"I'm proud of the strides my team has made in making school lunches healthier and more appealing to students," Hildreth said. "School lunch is an important part of ensuring students have the fuel they need to learn and grow."

Nine of the school district's elementary schools offer salad bars where students can customize their own salad; 10 more salad bars will open by January 2020.

Elementary students now also have the option of a cold or hot lunch entree each day.

At the secondary level, a number of "house special" pizzas are offered, and stations have been set up so students can customize everything from pasta to rice bowls, chicken wings to baked potatoes.

Starting this school year, the school district is now also working to ensure the custom meals it offers to students with documented allergies are similar to the meals served off the primary menu.

"Our dietitian works closely with our nurses and families to ensure they have allergy sensitive meals available that are as close as possible to the posted menu," Hildreth said.

Schools throughout the school district will be celebrating National School Lunch Week with games, activities, and special menus.

Hildreth will be at Monday's board meeting to accept the "Accent on Achievement" certificate for the Food and Nutrition Services department at 7 p.m. in room 140 at the Educational Services Center.

Foundation gets naming rights with gift toward \$4.25M project to convert South Elgin building

A \$1 million donation has kick-started the Boys & Girls Club of Elgin's plans to convert the former South Elgin public works building into a clubhouse for K-8 students.

The organization announced this weekend that Wayne-based Wisdom Family Foundation made the million-dollar contribution toward their \$4.25 million fundraising goal and would receive clubhouse naming rights as a result.

"It's extremely inspirational to see this happen," Boys & Girls Club of Elgin's President/CEO Cathy Russell said. "When you have an idea like this and start a project like this, you worry whether it can become a reality. While there is still pressure to raise all that money, it is encouraging to have this start."

Russell said the goal is to bring in more than \$4 million by the end of the 2019-20 school year, enough to fund the project's construction and operational costs. If all goes according to plan, the facility could open in early 2021.

The Wisdom Family Foundation has worked closely with the Boys & Girls Club of Elgin for years, said founder/chief association executive Kristi Wisdom, who also serves on the club's board.

"They so closely align with our mission of working with children and families, particularly at-risk children," Wisdom said.

It's hoped the donation will motivate others to contribute and strengthen potential donor leads for the project, she said.

Among the Wisdom foundation's philanthropic efforts are scholarships for School District U46 students and assistance to support Feeding Greater Elgin and South Elgin High School boosters program. They're planning to start a Christmas Wishes campaign to provide gifts and holiday meals for as many as 100 families.

The donation announcement surprised many who attended Great Futures Gala, the Boys & Girls Club of Elgin's annual fundraiser held Saturday.

"The village of South Elgin is excited about the prospect of partnering with the Boys & Girls Club to serve our residents," South Elgin Village Administrator Steve Super said in a news release. "The club does such a great job of helping youth find the right path in life. What could be more important than that?"

School District U46 CEO Tony Sanders, who did not attend the gala, said he learned of the \$1 million donation Monday. The district works closely with the organization, which opened a satellite location at U46's Ridge Circle Elementary School in Streamwood in 2018, the first outside Elgin.

"(The donation) can only do good things for them," Sanders said.

Once completed, the 20,000-square-foot clubhouse on Martin Drive will feature a gym, kitchen, cafeteria, learning center, conference space and garden. It will be large enough to accommodate 250 children in grades K-8 from Clinton, Willard, Fox Meadow and Harriet Gifford elementary schools and Kenyon Woods Middle School.

Schools advance on career pathways

U46 making transition to a new academy structure in 2021-22 **By: Rafael Guerrero**

High school students will be able to choose from two dozen career pathways when District U46 makes the transition to a new academy structure in the 2021-22 school year, officials said Monday.

Current seventh-graders will be the first class to switch to the new high school structure under which they will select a career objective, attend the academy that offers classes for that career, and graduate with college credit, industry credentials or certifications, and/or a state seal of biliteracy.

"This whole process is really meant to ensure students have opportunities to be successful once they graduate from high school," Lela Majstorovic, assistant

superintendent for secondary schools instruction and equity, told the U46 School Board Monday night.

Each of U46's five high schools will house five academies: fine arts, human services, liberal arts, business and STEM. Each academy will have multiple career pathways from which students can choose.

The business academies would have pathways in finance and accounting, management and leadership, and office assistant, officials said. Fine arts pathways are to include 2D and 3D art, Mexican folkloric arts, commercial and digital art, music recording and production, photography and theater arts.

The human services academies will have pathways in early childhood education, hospitality and culinary arts, law, medical assistant, patient care technician and social advocacy. The STEM academies will have pathways for automotive, engineering, environmental science, information technology, precision manufacturing and welding.

The fifth academy, liberal arts, will allow students to pursue a more traditional high school route, but with the possibility of earning high school and college credit for some courses.

While every high school will have the same career academies, not all pathways will be available at every school, Majstorovic said. A finalized list of the pathways will come at a later date, she said.

High school freshman will be able to take an introductory seminar course beginning in 2021-22 that will provide more information on the pathways options available before they are required to choose one the following year, Majstorovic said.

The five high school academies that already exist in U46 are going to become more rigorous magnet academies.

South Elgin's proposed magnet academy for digital and media arts is expected to apply for magnet status in 2020, Majstorovic said.

Bartlett and Streamwood high school magnet academies have yet to be determined, she said. Bartlett's current academy is for STEM students while Streamwood's focuses on world languages/international studies programs.

"Bartlett High School, we've always said it will remain a STEM academy but we really need to take a look at updating that curriculum to make sure that it is truly a unique program and not something you can find anywhere else. Right now that is not necessarily the case," she said.

"For Streamwood, they are looking at revising a couple of courses in the academy and doing a much larger-scale revision," Majstorovic said.

Educational Pathways Director Kinasha Brown said there will be differences between the magnet academy and nonmagnet programs.

"In looking at our fine arts pathways and our Larkin High School performing arts magnet academy, we are looking at very specialized curriculum," Brown said. "In addition to that specialized curriculum, the teaching philosophies are a little bit different ... the course content will be completely different (at the Larkin magnet academy) from what you see in the fine arts academy."

The district will hold three town hall sessions for families and residents to listen to discussions about the educational pathways and academies and offer input. All three will run from 6 to 7:30 p.m. at the following:

Oct. 29: Eastview Middle School, 321 N. Oak Ave., Bartlett.

U-46 Board approves two emergency repairs

The Board of Education in School District U-46 unanimously approved of a pair of emergency repair items on work completed in August at its meeting on Monday, Sept. 23.

The items totaled \$291,736, both paid for by the operations and maintenance fund, including school gym and cooling tower wall repairs at Bartlett's Prairieview Elementary School and bulletin board encapsulation repairs at Elgin's Coleman Elementary School.

The work at Prairieview was performed by IHC Construction Companies at a cost of \$253,948.

"During routine tuckpointing at Prairieview Elementary School, it was discovered that the gym and cooling tower walls showed signs of atrophy that required an analysis by a structural engineer," the proposal stated. "Due to the concerns present, the gym was taken offline the last week of school as a safety precaution while the structural analysis and repair plan were orchestrated."

The proposal added: "After receipt of the structural report, Plant Operations was able to identify a construction management company who could coordinate the necessary emergency repairs prior to the start of school. These repairs included the removal of the impacted bricks, rebuilding of the cooling tower walls, stabilization of the walls in question, tuckpointing, and painting. These activities were completed according to Plant Operations' specifications and verified by the structural engineer."

The work at Coleman was done by Holian Asbestos Removal and Encapsulation at a cost of \$37,788.

Work by an outside vendor had been

performed at the school and completed in July which resulted in the district being "notified by the Coleman principal and custodian of potential mold on bulletin boards," the proposal stated.

"Since definitive mold can only be determined through laboratory analysis, a proactive approach was taken with regard to the bulletin boards. Safeguards were implemented to address the identified areas, as well as to mitigate potential future growth throughout the entire building. Thus, all bulletin boards (cork, fiber, etc.) were painted with a microbial paint as an encapsulation method. In order to facilitate the work, the bulletin boards were painted by a licensed environmental contractor, as it is a potential safety hazard," the proposal states.

Village officially honors Fire Prevention Week

At the Village Board meeting on Sept. 16, Village President Steve Ward proclaimed Oct. 6 to 12 as Fire Prevention Week in the village.

According to the proclamation, the week is intended to remind residents about "small but important actions" that may keep someone and the people around them safe. A person typically has as few as one to two minutes after a smoke alarm sounds, in a typical home fire, to safely exit.

The theme for the week is, "Not every hero wears a cape – plan and practice your escape." The week is also intended to promote safe approaches for residents to consider in

case of a home fire.

"... Take personal steps to increase safety by planning an escape route, testing smoke alarms, choosing an outside meeting place and practicing home fire drills," Ward said.

According to Fire Chief Steve Wascher, there are at least 10 things that can prevent a house fire, which include checking your dryer vent, inspecting all heating sources yearly and keeping fire extinguishers around the home.

The national fire prevention event was started in 1922 and Fire Prevention week is observed on the Sunday through Saturday during a period that commemorates the Great Chicago Fire that began Oct. 8, 1871.

U-46 vote clears way for co-op speech team

Streamwood High School students will have a chance to compete for a speech team for the first time in years after a School District U-46 Board of Education vote at its meeting on Monday, Sept. 23.

The board unanimously approved of allowing the board president, Sue Kerr, to sign an application to create a cooperative team between Streamwood and Elgin high schools which will be submitted to the Illinois High School Association (IHSA).

"Streamwood High School has not had a speech team in the past," the supplication states. "A Co-op with Elgin would allow students from Streamwood High School to compete."

The IHSA requires board approval for creating co-op teams the proposal stated. This co-op will begin for this year's speech team season and run through the 2020-2021 school year.

Elgin has had a speech team which included 25 to 30 students a year in the past according to the application. Elgin again anticipates 25 to 30 students competing on the team and Streamwood estimates 10 to 15 additional students on the team.

Streamwood has had a speech team in the past according to Kerr.

"I'm glad Streamwood's getting it's speech team back," Kerr said. "My son was on the South Elgin team and they used to share the bus with the Streamwood team, and I was sad when Streamwood dropped out for a few years."

Board member Kate Thommes said: "As a former speech team kid, great. This is cool."

Also approved unanimously by the board was the list of 2019 high school graduates, an annual requirement set by the state.

Pedestrian seriously injured by vehicle while walking in road

On Tuesday, Oct. 1 at approximately 9 p.m., Kane County Sheriff's deputies responded to a report of a pedestrian struck by a vehicle in unincorporated St Charles Township.

The initial investigation indicated that a Ford Crown Victoria was traveling westbound on Courtier Avenue near the intersection of Sycamore Avenue when it struck a pedestrian walking in the roadway.

The driver of the vehicle, Amber Blaskoski, a 28-year-old resident of St. Charles, was uninjured. The

pedestrian, David Busby, a 40-yearold resident of St Charles Township, was airlifted to a Chicago area hospital with potentially life threatening injuries.

No tickets have been issued and the crash remains under investigation by Kane County Sheriff detectives and members of the Kane County Accident Reconstruction Team.

New pact to keep select U-46 students in district

Kimball Middle School in Elgin will house three classrooms next year for School District U-46 elementary and middle school students with behavioral issues.

The Board of Education unanimously approved of a three-year contract costing a not-to-exceed amount of \$1 million, which will be paid for by the education fund, with Catapult Learning to help support the plan at its meeting on Monday, Sept. 23. It was presented at the Sept. 9 meeting.

Suzanne Johnson, deputy superintendent of instruction, said that "the bulk of the cost is essentially to have other providers through Catapult Learning come in to provide the instruction for our students.... If we can provide some of those resources, we can certainly do that."

Students who would be assigned to these classes currently are generally sent to outside services like the Streamwood Behavioral Health Center.

The proposal stated it will be an "interim alternative educational setting to address comprehensive services including core academic and social emotional instruction that aligns with the Illinois state standards." It also states the contract includes academic, social and emotional, parent support and administrative support capabilities.

There will be three classrooms at

There will be three classrooms at Kimball starting in the 2020-2021 school year including one for kindergarten through second graders, one for third through fifth graders and one for sixth through eighth graders.

No more than 30 students would be in the program at a time and are limited to 40 days according to Johnson. After the 40-day period, a determination will be made on if the student can transition back to their home school.

Board member Eva Porter said she was "very impressed" with the proposal, and board member Kate Thommes said: "I know families personally that have been affected by movement to Streamwood Behavioral Health, so the ability to keep these families inhouse is huge."

Also presented on Sept. 9 and approved on Sept. 23, by a 7-0 vote, was a contract renewal with One Hope United in Elgin costing \$357,500, which will be paid for by the nation's taxpayers through Preschool For All grant funds.

The contract will provide extended childcare services to low-income families.

"U-46 subcontracts with One Hope United Elgin Child and Family Resource Center... to provide an additional 102 preschool slots within the childcare facility," the proposal states. "The subcontract pays for the salary and benefits of three teachers, three teacher assistants, facility expenses and materials."

Also unanimously approved was \$12.8 million in itemized bills as well as a personnel report and workers' compensation cases item which included two new positions, a maintenance employee and paraeducator. There were also eight workers' compensation cases totaling \$197,209, the top case costing \$49,490 to a driver.

Storm football marches on by blanking Larkin 48-0

The South Elgin football team remained undefeated after defeating Larkin 48-0 in Upstate Eight Conference play on Friday, Oct. 4 at Elgin's Memorial Field.

It was a balanced attack for the Storm who outgained their opponent 394-122 in total yards. South Elgin tallied 197 yards on both the ground and through the air behind quarterback Ben Karpowicz who was 12-for-17 with 197 passing yards and three touchdowns, and he added 69 rushing yards on eight carries including a TD.

Davion Cherwin started the scoring with a 62-yard touchdown run as part of a 21-0 first quarter, 35-0 first half. Cherwin, who also had a 39-yard TD catch from Karpowicz in the opening frame, finished with 69 rushing yards and added five catches for 89 yards on offense, and defensively he had two interceptions.

Leading the way for the Storm's success was their linemen according to

Karpowicz.

"An overall effort on both sides of the ball, especially with the lines," Karpowicz said. "That's where it all starts. Going back to practices, they're always the ones that get us going. It was just a great effort."

Karpowicz's touchdown run was from one-yard out in the first quarter, and he threw TD passes from 23 yards and four yards out to Cristopher Mejia-Gomez and Andrew Bucaro respectively in the second quarter.

On special teams, Shiking Marshall had a 33-yard punt return for a touchdown to end the game's scoring and Bucaro, South Elgin's kicker, was 6-for-6 on extra point attempts and 2-for-3 on field goals with successful tries from 24 and 35 yards out.

Corve King finished with 42 rushing vards.

South Elgin earned an automatic postseason spot with the win as it improved to 6-0, both overall and in the LIFC

Man charged after damaging gas mains with vehicle

For a team that only returned one starter, South Elgin sure is turning heads.

The Storm moved one step closer to the Upstate Eight Conference championship Tuesday night at home with a 25-21, 28-26 win over Glenbard South.

That follows a tournament championship last weekend at Hampshire, the second title for a team with just senior outside hitter Angie Negron back.

"Everybody thinks we're South Elgin, we're the team that everybody graduated, we aren't supposed to be good," Negron said. "We're the underdogs. It's pumping us up, motivating us even more to do better and keep going. Even in times like this when we get down in the game, we say we've got this. The fact people underestimate us is what motivates us to do even better."

South Elgin (19-6, 6-0) has three conference matches remaining against East Aurora, Bartlett and Glenbard East.

Glenbard South (13-13, 4-2) tried to play spoiler Tuesday, rallying from deficits in each set to have chances down the stretch.

Each time the Storm won the big points -- often with Negron taking charge.

"They are not used to pressure situations and obviously this is a pressure situation," Storm coach Joni Plach said. "They were just playing really timid, they weren't going out there and playing their game. But we came out with a win."

Tied at 19 in the first set, the Storm scored five straight points. Freshman Alyssa Worden started it with a kill for a sideout, then went to the service line and won four points including an ace. Negron's tip kill made it 24-19.

The Raiders fought off three game points before another Negron smash off Glenbard South's block won the opening set.

South Elgin looked like it would make it an easy win in the second set with leads of 5-0 and 13-4. But the Raiders fought all the way back to tie the score at 20-20.

Down 24-22, Glenbard South survived two straight match points, both on kills by Lauren Sweeton. The Raiders then had two chances to force a third set up 25-24 and 26-25, but each time Negron put down a winner, once on a hard hit and the next a tip.

Negron then ended the match with an ace for a 27-26 lead and a kill from the back row.

"She's (Negron) very calm," Plach said. "She's not perfect, she makes errors but she doesn't let her errors affect her. Having a player like that with such a young team really mentally helps everybody."

Negron led both teams with 12 kills and added 11 digs. Worden totaled 3 aces, 7 kills and 17 digs, and Allison Cunniffe set 23 assists.

Sweeton (8 kills), Sadie Camfield (5 kills, 3 aces, 17 assists) and Kathleen Millett (13 digs) paced the Raiders.

"That's something we've been able to do in the past," Raiders coach Chad Grant said of the comebacks in each set. "We're not a team that gets down on ourselves too much. We continue to fight. And we've got some good servers that allows us to get on some runs. We feel we can come back from any deficit."



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
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Late Elgin score dooms Sabres in 23-22 defeat

The Streamwood football team was unable to hold onto a fourth quarter lead as the Sabres fell 23-22 to Elgin in Upstate Eight Conference play on Friday, Oct. 4 at Millennium Field.

After three quarters, the Sabres looked in good position for the win holding a 22-8 lead. Streamwood had found the end zone three times, including its first passing touchdown, and was 2-

for-3 on two-point conversion attempts on runs from Buddy Martinez and Sirrion Dixon.

Sophomore quarterback Kevin Lunz (1-for-2) threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Zach Marquez in the first quarter as Streamwood took an 8-0 lead.

After Elgin tied the game, Martinez (20 carries, 179 yards) ran in a 67-yard touchdown for a 14-8 lead at halftime and then added a 27-yard TD run in the third for the 22-8 lead.

In the fourth quarter, Elgin rallied with a pair of touchdowns converting the extra-point kick on the first and then a two-point conversion on the second, which came with just under two minutes remaining in the game, for its first lead and the winning score.

Elgin outgained Streamwood 294-258 in total yards but the Sabres had a 250-130 advantage on rushing yards. Dixon finished with 56 rushing yards, and Jaydon Varnado had an interception on defense.

A few weeks prior, Streamwood coach Don Guindon said "we've just got to get back to what we do" after a 63-0 loss to UEC leaders South Elgin which snapped the

Sabres two-game winning streak, the first consecutive wins for the program since 2011. The loss to Elgin extended a losing streak to three games.
