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District U-46 to pay more for school officers

School District U-46 will pay 2.3% more in the 2019-20 school year to have police officers serve as school resource officers in its middle and high schools.

A contract approved by the school board Monday agrees to pay \$1.07 million to the municipalities of Elgin, Streamwood, Bartlett and South Elgin for its officers' services.

This school year the cost is \$1.04 million, records show.

Each of the district's largest municipalities supply one full-time police officer to each middle and high school in their respective communities. Elgin provides seven officers, followed by three in Streamwood, two in South Elgin and two in Bartlett, records show.

School resource officers' duties include law enforcement inside and outside the school, presentations on topics pertinent to students, staff and families, and assistance in things like crowd control and vehicular traffic.

The cities or villages pay their officers' salaries and approved overtime, and are reimbursed by the school district. According to the contracts, annual salaries range from \$62,430 in South Elgin officers to \$72,177 in Elgin.

Salary costs went from \$956,018 in 2018-19 to \$979,703 in 2019-20, a 2.5% increase, according to the contracts. The overtime/event security budget of \$89,500 is not increasing.

'We have our moments'

Bartlett takes first step forward after summertime death of coach Hunt **By: Paul Johnson**

Working through the emotions of coach Brad Hunt's death this summer has been a team effort for Bartlett.

"Losing a man as great as Brad was, we have our moments," said Joseph Eirich, the varsity assistant the past two seasons and now the interim head coach. "Sometimes we're fine. Sometimes we get emotional.

"It's really just working through that emotion and continuing to build our craft on a daily basis."

The Hawks honored Hunt at Wednesday's 85-35 win over Fenton in the season opener, and have established a scholarship in his name.

"It will be an emotional day," Eirich said Tuesday. "These girls are awesome. They're so resilient, so strong-minded. They're going to pull through. They're going to be fine."

Having Eirich still around has helped smooth over the sudden transition the Hawks had to endure, according to junior guard Lexie Sinclair.

"It definitely makes it easier," she said. "I think over the summer he kept everything going, kept everything together. That has made it so much easier.

"We know it's going to be hard, but there isn't any other place we'd rather be."

While continuing to celebrate the life of Hunt, the Hawks also did what they thought he would want them to do.

They started to prepare for a new season.

The Hawks enter this winter with high hopes. The return of Sinclair and sophomore guard Mackenzie Hare gives Bartlett one of the most explosive duos around. They combined to average 31.3 points last season.

Both are receiving Division I interest.

"It's so nice to be able to draw on that," Eirich said. "Having those girls as role models, as people for everyone in the program to look up to, is great. They're so seasoned.

"Between the two of them, I'm returning more than 1,000 points from last season. That is incredible."

How Eirich deploys them and returning starter Dani Heeden, the team's best defensive player, will be interesting.

Eirich has been thrust into the head coaching role in the most difficult way possible, but he said he's ready for the challenge.

"I know the game," Eirich said. "I'm from the game. I played in high school. It's just now adding my own flavor, adding my own twist to the game.

"How am I going to handle situations? The girls know me. They know my personality. They know how I'm going to react. The transition has been pretty smooth because they're used to me and they know what to expect."

Bartlett finished with a 29-5 record last season, losing to Wheaton Warrenville South in the Class 4A Batavia Sectional championship game. That loss still sticks with the Hawks.

"Our goal is to get back there and hopefully win that," Sinclair said. "I'm just excited to see where we're at, see how much growing we have to do.

"We're so young this year, but I think that we have a lot of experience. There are a lot of good things happening."
