St. Charles North has suffered its share of close Upstate Eight River losses this season. That's why senior point guard Zach Ludwig wasn't scared down the stretch in Wednesday's regular-season finale against Streamwood.

The Sabres, looking to salvage at least one conference win before the postseason, led 69-63 with 38 seconds left. But Ludwig and the North Stars didn't flinch.

Ludwig hit the tying jumper with 17 seconds left. After Streamwood missed a shot, he grabbed the rebound and raced down the court, setting up Brendan Dal Degan for the winning layup as time expired, allowing St. Charles North to escape with a 73-71 win.

"I know we just kept playing, kept getting stops and finishing," Ludwig said. "We just believed that we were going to come back. We've been through a lot this year, so we just kept our composure and didn't panic."

Ludwig let his instincts take over in the final seconds for St. Charles North (16-10, 9-3).

Ludwig grabbed the rebound off a miss by Sabres forward Keenon Cole and turned his head up the court. He saw Tyler Nubin on one block and Dal Degan on the other. He opted to dish to Dal Degan, who scored.

"I was waiting to either get the ball or for him to finish over Keenon or drop it off to Nubin," Dal Degan said. "He just gave it to me. I saw Keenon coming over, so I knew I had to get it up high. I just put it up, and thankfully it went in."

St. Charles North was on the other end of heartbreak three times this season. North Stars coach Tom Poulin said that prepared them for this situation.

"We've been through the fire," Poulin said. "We've learned our lessons. We're ready to go."

The ending soured what had been one of the best performances of the season from Streamwood (11-18, 0-12). After Kyle King tied it at 60-60 for North with 3:29 left, Streamwood produced an 8-1 spurt to take a 68-61 lead.

"I thought the boys played really well," Streamwood coach Paul Kowalyszyn said. "They played with some heart and got after the boards. Keenon had a great game.

"It just didn't work out the way we wanted it to, but this gives us a little confidence going forward. I'm not into moral victories, but this shows that we can hang."

Nikola Sinik scored 21 points for Streamwood, including five 3-pointers. Ludwig led North with 21. Dal Degan added 15 points, and King contributed 13 points and 11 rebounds.

Cole was the star of the game for the Sabres. He scored a game-high 32 points to go with 16 rebounds

"Inside, outside, long, active, athletic — we really don't have an answer for him," Poulin said. "He's as good as anybody in the conference, if you ask me. We tried to keep the ball out of his hands, but it just seemed like he was getting the ball where he wanted pretty easily, so we have to figure out why that happened."
