Kindergarten Readiness **Kindergarten Readiness** encompasses the skills and knowledge a child needs to succeed in kindergarten, including social emotional, cognitive, language and physical development. Strong kindergarten readiness leads to long-term academic success and overall well being.

Children that are ready for Kindergarten are:

- Less likely to be identified as having special needs
- More prepared academically throughout their education
- More likely to graduate from high school
- ☐ Higher earners in the workforce




KINDERGARTEN READINESS IN THE GREATER ELGIN AREA
