---Courier News--- 7/13/18 Elgin-area school districts still looking for bus drivers but don't expect start-of-school problems

School districts U46 and 303 are on the hunt to hire more bus drivers as the new school year draws near.

The districts have posted job openings, advertised in their communities and conducted job fairs this summer in an effort to recruit potential hires, officials said.

U46 still needs an estimated 25 new drivers, district spokeswoman Mary Fergus said. The district employs more than 300 people to operate more than 280 bus routes, according to its transportation department.

The district always aims to have at least 10 percent more drivers than routes in order to cover for employee absences, Fergus said. Plus, there's been an increase in retirements of employees with extensive experience, including one this spring of a driver who worked for the district for 41 years, she said.

"The transportation department will be ready to transport all students on the first day of school, Wednesday, Aug. 15," Fergus said. "Ongoing interviews will continue in order to prepare for the upcoming retirees."

The starting wages for a U46 school bus driver is \$18.48 an hour, followed by annual cost-of-living increases, according to the drivers' most recent contract. Drivers may also qualify for benefits, pension and retirement programs, and generally work between four to six hours a day.

Neighboring St. Charles School District 303 hopes to hire eight or nine more drivers ahead of this fall, district spokeswoman Carol Smith said. It currently employs 120 drivers, and the search for more employees will not affect transportation operations in the fall, she said.

"We are very fortunate that we seem to get it done," Smith said in light of the shortage of bus drivers many districts face.

Just like U46, some of District 303's driver vacancies are the result of a large number of retirements that occurred at the end of the school year, she said.

The St. Charles district pays their starting drivers about \$19 hours an hour for four to six hours of work a day.

Drivers hired by District 303 have their commercial drivers' license classes paid for by the district, Smith said. Drivers that average at least six hours of work a day in a 182-day school year earn medical benefits and may qualify for pensions once hired and remain employed, she said.

School District 300 is currently well supplied to meet its needs, transportation officials said. The Algonquin-based district has 190 drivers for its 174 bus routes. Unlike U46 and District 303, D300 outsources its transportation needs to private provider, Durham School Services.

Kate Walden, a communications specialist for Durham, said the company conducted a job fair last month for prospective bus drivers and hire on a year-round basis. Sixteen candidates applied at the June fair, and they currently have more than 30 driver candidates undergoing screening or training, Walden said.

Durham pays entry-level drivers at \$17.50 an hour.

"Becoming a Durham driver is a rigorous process," Walden said. "Prior to employment, all applicants must pass pre-screening checks that include criminal background, motor vehicle record review, DOT pre-employment drug screening and a DOT medical examination, all by third parties."

A survey conducted last summer by trade publication School Bus Fleet reported that more than half of responding bus driver contractors said they were experiencing a "moderate" shortage of drivers. Nearly 25 percent described their shortage as "severe."

Tyra Becker, of Elgin, whose story made national news in early June when the city of Elgin told her to remove oversized "Impeach Trump" signs from her yard, has died. She was 94.

The signs were quickly replaced with signs containing the same sentiment — but sized in accordance with city signage rules — and the Elgin woman continued her activist lifestyle until days before her death, according to friends and family.

According to Julia McClendon, director of the Elgin Area YWCA on whose board Becker served, Becker attended the June 30 Families Belong Together rally protesting the separation of immigrant families by the U.S. government, despite the heat

On June 27, she attended the Elgin City Council meeting at which new U.S. citizens were recognized.

On June 22, Becker joined other activists to meet with U.S. Rep. Raja Krishnamoorthi's staff in Elgin about immigration issues.

Her daughter, Tracy Dillinger, said she had visited her mom a week ago for the Fourth of July holiday. Becker "had a rapid deterioration" after that, she said.

Becker died peacefully in her sleep Tuesday night, Dillinger said.

An Iowa native, Becker and her husband, Morton "Mort" Becker, came to Elgin in 1965. While he worked as a **psychologist for Elgin-based School District U46**, she was a speech therapist in area schools. The couple raised three children.

Morton Becker died in 1993.

Myra Becker retired from Community Unit District 300 in 1985, and had been involved with the League of Women Voters since 1958. Since 1981, Becker also donated much of her time to the YWCA Elgin board, serving for a time as board president, and was instrumental in pushing for its child care and Teen Reach programs, McClendon said.

She played a significant role in various area organizations advocating for issues such as women's empowerment, mental health, voter's rights, fair housing legislation and education.

In addition to the YWCA Elgin, Becker was a member of the Elgin Area League of Women Voters and served on the Larkin Center's board of directors before that organization closed. Becker had a master's degree is speech therapy, which she earned right after WWII, "a time when most women were going for an MRS degree," Dillinger said.

Her mother didn't want to make trouble in the neighborhood or the community, Dillinger said.

"She didn't want to be high profile in that way. But she through eternity will be concerned about our democratic society and the American government. That bothered her, that the direction it has gone is wrong both morally and ethically," Dillinger said.

A funeral service is set for 2 p.m. Friday at the Beth Tikvah Congregation Synagog in Hoffman Estates.

---Courier News--- 7/13/18 Part-time school resource officer job at West Dundee middle school to go full time

The part-time school resource officer at School District 300's West Dundee middle school is to become a full-time job this fall.

The school district and West Dundee Police Department are to approve an intergovernmental agreement under which the resource officer position at Dundee Middle School, held by detective Kate McCarthy since 2011, will increase from 20 hours per week to 40. The officer will also respond to calls at Dundee Highlands Elementary School as necessary.

"In the type of environment we are living in, and all the recent events and (school) shootings, (D300 officials) want to make sure their schools are safe," West Dundee Police Chief Andrew Wieteska said. "And that school has a population of more than 1,000, it's a large school. It makes sense. I'm sure both (the D300 school board and Village of West Dundee trustees) will approve it."

D300 will reimburse the village 66 percent of the total cost, which includes salary, benefits, pension, insurance and other expenses, Wieteska said. The cost to be somewhere between \$120,000 and \$130,000 annually, he said.

Last school year, West Dundee and D300 split the cost of McCarthy's salary, about \$84,000, according to the 2017-18 agreement.

Besides policing, the school resource officer will present educational programs, provide training to faculty and staff, and act as a police liaison between students, families, faculty and staff.

School resource officers are in place at most of the D300 middle schools. Carpentersville, Hampshire and West Dundee have agreements in place with D300, and the school board is to vote on expanding school resource officer program into Algonquin Middle School and Westfield Community School in Algonquin. Nearby, **Elgin-based School District U46** has school resource officers in place at all eight of its middle schools. Districts locally and beyond have adopted or expanded such programs to put more focus on school safety and security, especially as mass school shootings became more frequent.

Village of West Dundee trustees will vote on the intergovernmental agreement at its next board meeting after the school board approves it this week, Wieteska said.

Jesus Gonzalez called the moment "surreal." But he's ready to be **Larkin's** head football coach after serving as defensive coordinator.

After Dragan Teonic left Larkin last month for South Elgin, Royals athletic director Ethan Karolczak had to piece together a list in short order. He received 20 resumes and interviewed nine candidates.

It turned out the right man was already leading the Royals' summer workouts. Larkin announced the hiring on Wednesday of Gonzalez to his first varsity head coaching job.

"It was really surreal at first," Gonzalez said. "I'm just really excited to have this opportunity. I'm really happy that Ethan and (principal Jamie Crosen) are giving me this chance.

"I thought that I did have a good chance because I've been in the program the past five years. I was working with Dragan and he was my mentor. He really prepped me the last couple years."

Karolczak was quick to point out Gonzalez wasn't hired solely because he was already in the program and running the summer workouts since Teonic's departure.

"We went through the whole process and were focused on the process and he fits the bill," Karolczak said. "He's the guy. On a compressed timeline we went through as exhausting a process as we could.

"At the end of the day, he's the guy. He absolutely has the core values that our program believes in."

Gonzalez was a three-sport star at Aurora Central Catholic, where he graduated in 2007. He participated in football, wrestling and track. He attended Waubonsee Community College and Aurora University, where he graduated in 2012.

He began coaching at Plano for a year before landing at Larkin. He's the Royals' varsity assistant in wrestling and the throws coach in track.

"He's the hardest working guy in the building," Karolczak said of Gonzalez. "Our kids will run through walls for him. We're really excited to have him. He's the perfect guy to lead our football program.

"He's a lifelong learner. He's a hard worker. He's loyal. That's what we want our kids to be."

Karolczak introduced Gonzalez as the new coach to the team on Wednesday.

"They were ecstatic," Gonzalez said. "They're ready to roll. I think it's a smooth transition for the kids. I've been with the seniors the whole time. It gives them familiarity with the coaching staff."

The Royals have been on the brink of their first playoff appearance since 2006. Larkin went 4-5 in each of the two last seasons.

Gonzalez sees a group that's ready to get over that hurdle this fall in the revamped Upstate Eight Conference.

"This is a really special group," Gonzalez said. "We've been knocking on the door. I think this group has a chance to get us past that.

"We have to take care of our business. We have to get out there and take care of what we need to take care of and do our thing the way we're supposed to."
