# Elgin Courier-News U-46 to settle vaping lawsuit \$1.2M Juul Labs payout planned over four years March 8, 2023 By Mike Danahey for Courier-News

District U-46 will receive at least \$1.2 million in the settlement of a vaping lawsuit with Juul Labs Inc.

School board members authorized the deal Monday night but made no decision on how the money will be spent.

Interim Superintendent Suzanne Johnson said district staff will look at data for ways the funding might be allocated within the parameters of the suit's settlement.

U-46 joined a class-action lawsuit in November 2020 against Juul and other parties tied to high school and junior high school students using e-cigarettes and vaping materials, which experts say creates addiction risks and can result in potentially deadly respiratory ailments, according to U-46 documents. The district was one of 1,400 across 25 states to participate in the case.

"The use of e-cigarettes and vaping devices by students has caused the district to incur costs in the form of staff time, disciplinary proceedings and other costs, with the expectation that these costs will only increase unless and until student use of these devices decreases and stops," district documents said.

While a settlement has been reached with Juul Labs and other parties, litigation against Altria Group, Inc. and remaining defendants continues. According to reports, Altria once owned 35% of Juul but has since divested its holdings.

Lawyers anticipate an initial payment of about \$600,000 will be received by late 2023, with the remainder to be paid in installments made through 2026, documents said.

According to reports, Juul faced more than 8,000 lawsuits brought by users, families of users, school districts, city governments and Native American tribes.

Juul rocketed to the top of the U.S. vaping market five years ago on the popularity of flavors like mango, mint and creme brulee, which appealed to teenage users and was

blamed for the surge in underage vaping.

Juul dropped all U.S. advertising and discontinued most flavors in 2019. The Food and Drug Administration rejected the company's application to keep its product on the market for adults because Juul did not adequately address questions about the potential for chemicals to leach from its device but placed a temporary hold on the decision while Juul files an appeal.

#### District U-46 approves curriculum, expense items

The Board of Education in School District U-46 unanimously approved \$18.8 million in curriculum and expenditure items at its meeting on Monday, Feb. 13.

Included was an item presented and approved that evening, a \$149,768 proposal with Trane U.S. from the operations and maintenance fund as part of Phase 2 of a Streamwood High School pathways project.

"The Streamwood High School Pathways Capital Project (Phase 2) will require new RTUs (remote terminal units) to service the proposed automotive and engineering spaces that are part of the renovations," the proposal states. "Currently, RTUs have a 20-week lead time. Due to these extended lead times, we are requesting authorization to place the order directly with the manufacturer in February 2023, prior to the award of the total project. If approved, we anticipate receiving the units in July 2023, allowing the project to remain on schedule and ready for the first day of school."

Three curriculum items, all paid through the education fund, were approved including a three-year contract for the GALE: In Context For Educators program for secondary schools costing \$700,399, resource and program fees to offer the International Baccalaureate at Elgin High School's gifted and talented academy costing \$505,000 and purchasing updated textbooks and resource for business courses from Cengage Learning costing \$152,635.

Several operations and maintenance fund items were approved including \$5.1 million with Monaco Mechanical for boiler, electrical switchgear and generator replacement at Streamwood High School as well as four roof replacement proposals including Elgin High School (\$5.4 million, L. Marshall, Inc.), Elgin's Huff Elementary School (\$2.4 million, Preservations Services, Inc.), Elgin's Lords Park Elementary School (\$2.3 million, Elens and Maichin Roofing and Sheet Metal, Inc.) and South Elgin's Fox Meadow Elementary School (\$1.3 million, Elens and Maichin).

Two contracts, to be paid through federal bailout funds, were approved including \$448,116 with Crisis Prevention Institute for training and materials and \$363,420 with Care Solace for "mental health care coordination service with a mission to provide easy access to care regardless of circumstance," the proposal states.

Also unanimously approved was \$12.5 million in itemized bills.

## South Elgin High alumnus is prestigious award nominee

Derryl Barnes, an alumnus of South Elgin High School has been nominated for the Television Academy Foundation's 42nd College Television Awards.

According to the Television Academy Foundation, the annual College Television Awards recognize and reward excellence in student-produced programs from colleges across the country. Winners in the competition will be announced by television stars at a red carpet awards ceremony April 1 at the Television Academy in North Hollywood, California.

Barnes has been nominated in the "News" category, along with eight other classmates from the University of Miami, for UMTV's NewsVision. Barnes served as writer on the project, which was selected from over 132 submissions from colleges and universities nationwide by Television Academy members.

NewsVision, a half-hour live news program on the University of Miami's student-run television station, UMTV, covers national and local news, weather and sports impacting the UM community. The nominated episode, which was broadcast April 7, 2022, includes stories on a Brightline train crash, community outrage over a local park entrance and one physician's assistant who goes beyond her duty to save two young patients.

"I remember sitting in my great grandma's house watching the College Television Awards live stream as UMTV won their second-ever College Television Award," said Barnes in recalling a moment from a few years ago. "I made it my goal to be a part of that one day. Just a few years later, here I am. Winning would just be like getting a second cherry on top."

### Expenses, policy updates slated for U-46 board vote

The Board of Education in School District U-46 is set to vote on \$116,460 in expenditure items at its upcoming Monday, March 13 meeting after being presented on March 6.

Included is \$90,000, to be paid through federal bailout funds, to send "up to 52 team members," the proposal states, to Orlando, Florida over the summer for the Instructional Empowerment Building Expertise conference.

The three-day conference, which will be June 21 to 23, is to "explore the concepts of rigor and equity in learning and education," and they "will research and learn about strategies to enhance the continuous improvement cycle in alignment with the school instructional maturity model, with both general and specific strategies for U46 schools and the school system, with experts and colleagues," the proposal states.

Last year, the district spent \$75,000 to send 45 people to the conference. The conference is through Learning Sciences International (LSI) which the district spent a whopping \$18.5 million in 2021 to conduct admitted theoretical work through the 2025-2026 school year.

The board will also vote on a contract renewal with Thought Exchange costing \$26,460 (education fund) as part of the district's "equity" work.

The proposal states: "The communication platform, Thought Exchange, allows Exchange Leaders to create open-ended questions and allow for online interactions among all participants.... Thought Exchanges are a psychologically safe method of engagement that can identify root causes related to equity and inclusion, allowing our team to take decisive and data-informed actions. Finally, Thought Exchange, similar to Gallup and Panorama, can be used as a leading indicator to identify starts, stops, and continuation of all things that help to create a school district of belongingness and inclusivity."

Additionally, the board will vote on updates to 29 policies.

Trisha Olson, chief legal officer, said the "vast majority... have very minor or technical changes." The proposed policy updates were not provided to the public.

#### Amendment to U-46 IGA supported via board vote

The Village Board of Trustees unanimously approved an amendment to an

intergovernmental agreement (IGA) with School District U-46 at its meeting on Tuesday Feb. 21.

The amendment to the IGA extends the terms of a school resource officer (SRO) at Kenyon Woods Middle School allowing the SRO to remain through summer school.

"SEPD was notified that U-46 will be hosting summer school at Kenyon Woods Middle School," wrote Police Chief Jerry Krawczyk in a memo. "They requested the South Elgin Kenyon Woods Middle School SRO to be present."

Krawczyk added: "The annual agreement with School District U-46 expires on June 7, 2023. The attached first amendment agreement extends services for the school resource officer at Kenyon Woods Middle School for the term June 7, 2023, through July 7, 2023. The attached agreement provides staffing coverage between [7 a.m. through 1 p.m.] during designated school days. School District U-46 shall pay the Village \$45.67 per hour plus any overtime rate of \$68.51 per hour for services during the extended term."

The original IGA was approved by the board on July 5, 2022 which ran through June 7 of this year.

"Both School District U-46 and the Village are interested in promoting the safety and security of the staff, students, and school premises in the Village," the resolution states. "School District U-46 asked the Village to provide a Middle School Resource Officer during the upcoming summer school session at Kenyon Woods Middle School beginning on June 7, 2023 and ending on July 7, 2023."

The resolution adds: The Board of Trustees of the Village of South Elgin finds that it is in the best interest of the Village to amend and extend the Intergovernmental Agreement."

## Examiner of Streamwood – Four new coaches to lead Streamwood spring sports

Streamwood athletics will have four new coaches for spring 2023 teams.

The Sabres will welcome Nicolle Giliana (softball), David Criswell (girls soccer), Ryan Markgraf (boys track) and Katelyn Thurnall (girls badminton).

This will be the first year coaching softball at Streamwood for Giliana. She has coached at Maine East and a travel team, and she was the JV dance team coach this year at

#### Streamwood.

"For this season, my goal is to grow the program and get girls of all skill levels out on the field," said Giliana. "Some short-term goals would be to beat last year's record, and establish a community of support and fun for the girls this season at school and around Streamwood. The program's long term goal is to continue to grow and each year get better and better. Now that the season is starting and we are getting more time in with everyone, I am excited to see how we do and ready to put in the time and effort to grow this program again."

Criswell, whose goal this year is "establishing our culture and identity as a program," coached boys and girls soccer for six years in Colorado before coming to Illinois in 2021.

He was the JV girls coach at Hampshire in the spring 2022 and an assistant boys varsity coach at South Elgin in the fall 2022.

"The goal is always to win every game, but more importantly we want to use the soccer pitch as our classroom to create an environment where each player has the opportunity to learn how to become their best self within our team environment," Criswell said. "To do that we focus on creating athletes with a strong set of character values who are also intelligent players with the technical skills to execute our style of play."

Markgraf is a 2005 graduate from Streamwood and played football, wrestling and track. He has seven years of assistant football coaching experience collegiately and has been a three-sport assistant coach since 2014 in Streamwood.

The goal this year is to see "constant improvement" this season, and long term he wants "to create a program that continually develops skills and character traits" that will prepare them beyond just track and field.

Thurnall has been an assistant bowling coach at Streamwood, and she said she is "excited to branch out into a new sport and learn all I can about badminton."

This year, Thurnall and her assistant coach are "focusing on keeping the season fun but competitive" for the "dedicated athletes who are proud to be a part of the program," and she wants to create a program that continually draws in "committed and enthusiastic athletes and grow as much as possible."
