U-46 building bond referendum passes with large majority

April 4, 2023

School District U-46's referendum asking voters to approve selling \$179 million in school building bonds has passed, according to the unofficial vote tally from Tuesday's election.

The total vote count was 10,504 votes in favor to 6,346 against, not including mail-in and provisional ballots not yet counted.

It broke down like this: In Kane County, with all 53 precincts reporting, the measure had 5,033 yes votes and 2,485 nay votes. In Cook County, the measure had 3,475 votes in favor and 1,814 no votes, with all 43 precincts reporting. In DuPage County, with 98.9% of election day ballots counted, the nay votes tallied 2,047 and the yes votes 2,014.

Voters back incumbents for U-46 school board

Aging schools, student achievement, the transition to a full middle school model and the search for a new superintendent are among the key issues facing a new **Elgin Area School District U-46 school board**.

Six candidates sought election to four 4-year terms on the school board.

As of 9 p.m., unofficial vote totals showed voters backed incumbents **Susan Kerr**, who currently serves as school board president, with 10,782 votes and **Kate Thommes** with 10,706 votes. **Chanda Schwartz and Samreen Khan** received 8,678 and 8,411 votes, respectively.

Unofficial vote tallies showed **Maureen Morris** and **Heather LH Manzella** trailing with 7,327 and 6,537 votes, respectively.

As the state's second-largest school district, **U-46** serves 11 communities in Cook, DuPage and Kane counties. More than 35,000 preschool through 12th grade students attend 57 district schools and programs.

The new school board will be hiring the district's next superintendent and will have to deal with addressing the district's aging schools, some of which date back to the 1800s.

Two incumbents, two newcomers win District U-46 School Board seats Tuesday night

Incumbent District U-46 School Board members Kathleen “Kate” Thommes and Sue E. Kerr won new terms in Tuesday’s election, and will be joined on the dais by newcomers Chanda Schwartz and Samreen Khan, based on unofficial vote count results.

While the final tally won’t be certified until later this month so that mail-in ballots postmarked Tuesday and provisional ballots can be added to the count, it appears that Elgin resident Thommes and Kerr, of Bartlett, have secured new four-year terms.

With all precincts in Kane, Cook and DuPage counties in, Kerr was the top vote-getter with 10,471, followed by Thomme with 10,344; Schwartz, of Bartlett, with 8,368; and Khan, of Bartlett, with 8,229.

Rounding out the group was Maureen Morris, of Streamwood, with 7,262 votes, and Heather LH Manzella, of Elgin, with 7,262, unofficial numbers show.

Final precinct counts were delayed Tuesday night when the computer system used by the Kane County Clerk’s Office crashed. Complete unofficial numbers were not available until after midnight.

School District U-46 announced that 214 seniors were named Illinois State Scholars from the Illinois Student Assistance Commission.

The achievement is based on being considered in the top 10 percent of seniors across the state through test scores, class rank, grade point average and class size. There are about 16,700 state scholars.

“We are extremely proud of our students for demonstrating dedication and discipline in achieving academic excellence,” said Lela Majstorovic, assistant superintendent of schools, for a district press release. “We also recognize our teachers, counselors, mentors, and family members who supported our students as they worked to meet their goals.”

Multiple expense items slated for U-46 board vote

The Board of Education in **School District U-46** is set to vote on \$3.8 million in expenditure items at its upcoming meeting on Monday, April 10. They were presented on March 20.

Included is \$3.2 million, from the operations and maintenance and health life safety funds if approved, with Bear Construction for the second phase of a renovation project to the Dream Academy and Central Schools Program (CSP).

The proposal states renovations include “painting walls, electrostatic painting of the lockers, and removal and replacement of the vinyl tile (VCT) in all of the main hallways” as well as new science labs and prep rooms, cafeterias, classrooms, library and work room.

With SchoolLinks, the district is asking for \$371,474 (education fund) which will be spent over three years. “SchoolLinks will provide **School District U-46** with a comprehensive college and career planning tool that allows us to provide efficient services to our students and families,” the proposal states.

Costing \$144,000, through federal grants, the district is seeking approval to help teachers attain bilingual and English as a second language endorsements through Northern Illinois University.

The district is seeking to install fiber cabling to the press box at **Streamwood High School's** Millennium Field at a cost of \$88,696 (operations and maintenance fund) with Low Voltage Solutions. The proposal states it’s “to ensure equity among the four high school press boxes” with Millennium Field being “the only press box in the district without the capability to livestream athletic events from the stadium without additional equipment.”

Costing \$42,314 (education fund), the district is asking to renew a contract with Frontline Education “for substitute assignments and absence management” software.

The board will also vote on a high school science curriculum proposal on updated standards. No new resources are being proposed.

“Biology, chemistry, and physics are in the final stages of the curriculum cycle as they were adopted by the **U46 School Board** in 2016,” the proposal states. “Secondly, the Illinois State Science Assessment is changing its format to align with the Framework for K12 Science Education and the Next Generation Science Standards. And lastly, a recent gap analysis of the science curriculum necessitates updates to the science curriculum K-12.”

Dist. U-46 Board approves expense, curriculum items

The Board of Education in **School District U-46** unanimously approved \$431,437 in expenditure and curriculum items at its Monday, March 6 meeting.

The highest costing item was \$137,600, from the education fund, for renewal of MUNIS software, used for human resources, from Tyler Technologies.

Costing \$116,740 (education fund), the board approved a contract with Group Travel Planners to allow up to 100, up from 42 last year, Black students from **Elgin, Larkin and Streamwood high schools** to tour historically black colleges over the summer.

From n2y, LLC, the board approved \$69,839 from federal grant funds for math manipulative kits.

The proposal states that “adding math manipulatives for multisensory learning experiences will allow us to provide a fully comprehensive math curriculum for students with significant intellectual disabilities and unique learning needs. The resources are differentiated and allow for an additional visual and tactile experience to accommodate the needs of learners with significant disabilities.”

A contract costing \$41,430 (education fund) with Avid CNA School was also approved.

“This year, **Streamwood High School** was unable to hire an instructor for the CNA Program,” the proposal stated. “This is a capstone course for students in a Healthcare Science Pathway and can culminate with an industry credential.

In order to ensure access to this valuable career preparation opportunity, we have partnered with Avid CNA, which is a local CNA training school to offer instruction and the clinical experience. Instruction will be provided in a hybrid model that includes both in-person and synchronous remote instruction.”

Two curriculum items were approved including one to add two integrated math, contemporary world issues, business for entrepreneurs and entrepreneurship courses at **Streamwood High School’s magnet academy**. It has a six year estimated cost of \$65,828.

A middle school science curriculum proposal was approved. Ratified were new standards with no new resources proposed.

Seventh-graders units will include “Weather and Climate, Matter: Structure & Properties, Chemical Reaction, Cells to Organisms, Reproduction and Heredity and Artificial Selection, and Earth’s Systems,” the proposal states. Eighth grade will include “the History of the Earth, Natural Selection, Waves, Electric and Magnetic Forces, Energy Transfer, and Human Impacts.”

Also approved 7-0 was \$5.9 million in itemized bills.

Sabres soccer opens year with 2-1-1 beginning

The **Streamwood soccer team** has had a solid start to the 2023 season.

First-year **coach David Criswell** inherited a program with a strong group of returners that look to improve upon last year's 7-13-1 overall record, 4-4-1 in the Upstate Eight Conference.

"The strong core of returning players combined with our new players leaves me optimistic and has led to a positive start with early training sessions," Criswell said.

The **Sabres** have gone 2-1-1 over their first four games, including 1-0-1 against UEC foes.

Streamwood opened the year with a 1-0 non conference win over Dundee Crown with senior Dayanara Huerta's first half unassisted goal holding up on Tuesday, March 14 at Millennium Field. Senior goalie Selina Chavez had four saves.

Against **Bartlett, the Sabres** finished in a 0-0 tie against the defending UEC champs on Wednesday, March 15 at Millennium Field. Chavez had four saves in her second shutout of the season. **Streamwood's** lone loss so far was in a 3-1 non conference match against Jacobs on Tuesday, March 21 at Millennium Field. Senior Daniela Sanchez scored off an assist from sophomore Milanie Martinez, and Chavez made seven saves in the effort.

Against **Larkin, the Sabres** bounced back with a 5-1 UEC victory on Wednesday, March 22 at **Larkin**. Sanchez (two goals, one assist), junior Reyna Saldivar (two goals), Huerta (one goal, two assists) and Martinez (assist) led the **Sabres**.

"Overall, I'm kind of happy with the trajectory that we are headed in," Criswell said.

"There are some adjustments we can make getting used to the style of play that I'm trying to implement. If we do that, we'll produce more opportunities."

Coats a perfect fit for Geneva

Marquette-bound junior midfielder/defender sparks Vikings past Bartlett: ‘I take control of things’

Versatility, size and talent. Junior midfielder/defender Lilly Coats wears all of those hats well for Geneva, but there's another aspect that rounds out her wardrobe as a player.

But first, let's talk about Coats' spot on the field. She plays either in a holding position as a defensive midfielder or the next shield in the Vikings' armor as a central defender.

A good fit?

"Those are two great positions because I'm good at seeing the field and knowing where the options are," she said. "I understand the movement of the game, both on and off the ball."

It doesn't hurt that Coats has a special connection with junior forward Olivia Rawls.

Coats, a Marquette recruit, set up a pair of goals by Rawls just minutes apart Monday night as Geneva eased to a 5-0 non conference victory over host **Bartlett**.

In a game shortened by lightning, sophomore midfielder Alyssa Houk also scored two goals for the Vikings (3-1). Rawls assisted the final goal by freshman forward Olivia Hagen.

The 5-foot-10 Coats touched all sides, using her elite length and range to shut down the opposition and her speed and ability on the ball to build the attack out of the back.

The special rapport and sharp chemistry linking Coats and Rawls, meanwhile, has been more than a decade in the making. The two have been playing together since 2012.

“We’ve been great friends for so long that we just really understand each other and our style of play,” Coats said. “I know she likes the ball at her feet.”

Rawls, who is not as tall as Coats, is quick and fluid with the ball. The two play off each other brilliantly, with Rawls’ movement off the ball fused to Coats’ playmaking and creativity.

“I like playing with the ball at my feet,” Rawls said. “I have always been a goal scorer. I am a forward, so that is just a natural part of my game.” Rawls is also an intense competitor who loves the up-tempo style. She competes on the golf team in the fall.

No matter the sport, she’s driven to excel.

“Some of these girls I have been playing with for three years, some two and some just this year,” Rawls said. “We have had some high level results so far.

“I just love it when the whole team, and not just me, is having a good game.”

Megan Kron, despite the one-sided score and the number of goals permitted, also had a good game. The sophomore goalkeeper made seven saves for **Bartlett** (0-3-1).

It was hard to stop Coats, however. She showed the vision and balance to influence multiple factors in the game, particularly as a connector between the defense and offense.

“My size is a great tool for me, especially with my stride,” she said. “I think it gives me a lot of speed and helps getting headers or having my body in front of the ball.”

Playing two different roles just gives her multiple chances to impact the game.

“It’s a pretty seamless transition going back and forth between the two roles,” Coats said. “I have more of an attacking mindset, especially getting on the back of the goal on crosses, and then playing central back is more of a pressure cover.”

Geneva coach Megan Owens praised the athleticism and toughness of the two close friends.

“I think overall our junior class is very solid,” Owens said. “A lot of them have played together for several years in different sports together.

“Lilly missed a lot of last year with an injury, and it’s great having her back. Those two have really good chemistry, and it’s starting to shine off.”

Coats is ready to take the next step for Geneva.

“I have taken more of a leadership role,” she said. “Before I led more by example.

“Now, I take control of things, especially with organization, keeping everybody in line and making sure everybody is working hard and up to 110% of their standards.”
