Free school supplies for K-6 students at U-46 schools

The <mark>U-46 School Board</mark> is expected to approve a \$1.2 million contract with Pala Supply Company Inc. to provide supply kits to all kindergarten through sixth-grade students for the 2023-24 school year.

The plan is to order 21,449 kits containing essential supplies other than backpacks. Federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief grant money will pay for the items, as they have done since the 2021-22 school year.

District officials said they are looking at ways to continue the effort once relief money is no longer available.

U-46 to offer Japanese and Mandarin classes as part of elective high school curriculum next year

School District U-46 plans to add Japanese and Mandarin language classes to its elective offerings at all five high schools in the 2022-23 academic year.

"Initially, Level 1 would be available at all five high schools," <mark>Jacob VandeMoortel,</mark> coordinator of K-12 Social Studies and World Languages</mark>, told the school board Monday night.

<mark>Streamwood High School</mark> is the only <mark>U-46 school</mark> to currently offer Japanese and Mandarin.

The addition dovetails with the Illinois State Board of Education's decision to require high school students to complete two years of a world language in order to receive their diploma, a change that goes into effect in the 2028-29 school year, VandeMoortel said.

<mark>U-46</mark> currently has no world language requirement for its students but it does offer French, German and Spanish language classes.

Streamwood students will continue in the language classes in which they are now enrolled. In 2022-23, another level of Japanese and Mandarin will be added so that by 2025-26, every high school will offer four years of study for both languages.

"This would be two years ahead of the Illinois state graduation requirement," <mark>VandeMoortel</mark> said.

The district plans to work with New Zealand-based education tech company Education Perfect to create customized content for the classes. "Students will have digital textbooks, which they will access through their computers," <mark>VandeMoortel</mark> said.

Teachers are excited that what Education Perfect provides can be used in whole group, team or individual instruction, he said.

The program's estimated over six years would be \$43,560 for digital resources and \$6,792 for initial and ongoing professional development, he said. Assuming 484 students take the courses over those six years, the cost would be about \$17 per student per year, VandeMoortel said.

The new language instructors would likely travel from campus to campus to teach classes, at least for the first year, he said.

"I am so happy to see this being offered eventually to all high schools," board member Melissa Owens said. "This puts us on par with other high schools that neighbor our district. It sets our students up for success in languages that are really important, especially in the business world."

Board President Sue Kerr said she also was pleased by the addition of the new classes and the world language requirement, but questioned what kind of impact it might have on student schedules given other requirements and interests.

"This may be making things more difficult for our kids in some ways," Kerr said.

Drawn to music off the field, Brooke Baumann sings winning tune as a defender for Bartlett. 'I have figured it out.'

Growing up, Bartlett's Brooke Baumann rarely turned down a chance to sing.

During long family trips, every time a song that she liked came on the car radio, Baumann would break out and accompany the track in her own beautiful, distinctive singing style.

It's like she was trying out for "The Voice."

"Music has always been in the background, and I was drawn to it," she said. "Choir became an option when I was in middle school. My mother said I should just go for it because I am singing all the time."

The senior defender is mastering a song on the soccer field for the Hawks (4-9-4, 4-2-3), demonstrating resolve, talent and drive along with a willingness to try new things.

Change is a driving force in life. After displaying offensive skills as a forward and midfielder in her first two varsity seasons, <mark>Baumann</mark> moved to central defender to fortify that crucial position.

"It was all **Brooke's** idea," **Bartlett coach Vince Revak** said. "She felt she could contribute more as a defender, and that is exactly the type of player Brooke has been. "She is focused on the success of the team. It's true we could have used more goals this year, but it's also true that having her in back has given us a lot of opportunities to win games."

The 5-foot-10 Baumann, a St. Mary's recruit, is a force of nature no matter where she plays on the field. She combines ideal size, range and power with a specific physical presence.

"I definitely use my body to shield the ball and get in front of other players," <mark>Baumann</mark> said. "My height is great for winning balls out of the air.

"I have super long legs and that makes my strides faster, which I use to my advantage."

Playing offense for her tends to be more freewheeling and improvisational — making plays on the go. Defense brings out her more disciplined side.

"You have to play with a lot more composure, because you are the final line of defense," she said. "Any mistakes are automatically goal scoring opportunities for the other team.

"It was a little stressful at the beginning, but I feel like I have figured it out."

The best part about shifting to the back for Baumann is being closer positionally to her younger sister Breanna, a junior who plays on the outside.

"My sister is my best friend," Brooke said.

Like her older sister, <mark>Breanna</mark> is lanky and versatile. The natural chemistry between the two sisters is a crucial reason the Hawks have recorded eight shutouts.

"Brooke always works until the last second and she expects nothing less from her teammates," Breanna said. "I can definitely see how she has influenced me through our years of playing soccer together.

"One of the best things about playing with her is how we cover for each other. If I get beat on the outside, I know she will have my back. I don't even have to call for it. It's just a shared understanding."

Brooke Baumann still has the necessary offensive attributes. She has scored three goals all on penalty kicks — for the Hawks, who play Geneva in a Class 3A regional semifinal Wednesday at South Elgin.

Like her musical taste, she's adventurous and not tied down to just one style or form.

"Playing multiple positions gives me a better understanding of the game," <mark>Baumann</mark> said. "I think it really broadens the thought process. I can better direct when I am in the back because by seeing the whole field.

"As a forward, I know what I would do in certain situations, so I could suggest to the underclassmen about what to do and how to guide them. Some people just don't know."


