Johnson poised to be next U-46 superintendent

Suzanne Johnson has been named the next superintendent of School District U-46, according to a May 23 press release from the district.

Johnson has been the interim superintendent since February after former Superintendent Tony Sanders left the district to become the Illinois State Superintendent.

According to the press release, Johnson will be the next superintendent "pending the successful outcome of contract negotiations and approval at a June 2023 Board meeting." If approved, she would officially become the superintendent on July 1. In March, the board approved of hiring Hazard, Young, Attea and Associates (HYA) to assist in an internal search at a cost of \$22,500.

In April, HYA released a document with a profile of the desired characteristics of the superintendent based on meetings with district staff, parents and students which described the characteristic of having "had successful experience in a diverse district, demonstrating relationship building and a successful track record of student achievement to be its next Superintendent."

"The Board seeks someone who is an empathetic communicator, who listens carefully while collaboratively developing and patiently implementing with the Board a vision,

with its goals and the district's wide array of programs," the report states. "In addition, the selected candidate will be a person of integrity who is visible and approachable in the community and the District making data informed decisions, building teams, especially in the development of a team relationship with the Board."

The report adds: "The next Superintendent of School District U-46 will work collaboratively with the staff and community as an advocate that reflects a student focus. The School District U46 Board of Education is looking for a person, who will lead in diversity and equity especially as they relate to human resources and student achievement, and committing to stay with the district for a significant tenure."

Johnson has been with the district for 26 years, previously as the deputy superintendent of instruction. She has an undergraduate degree from University of Iowa, a master's in curriculum and instruction from DePaul University and a doctorate in curriculum and instruction from University of Illinois-Chicago.

Examiner of Bartlett Hawk Hollow conversion ripe with traffic concerns

The Village Board of Trustees was presented with a proposal from School District U-46 related to the conversion of Hawk Hollow from an elementary school to a middle school at its committee of the whole meeting on Tuesday, May 16.

The conversion would increase the enrollment from 293 students currently to a potential of 750 students which left some trustees leery of the plans as there are traffic issues presently, specifically during drop off and pick up.

Village President Kevin Wallace said: "It's kind of a wreck over there right now.... And if you add students, you're going to add cars, a lot of them. Especially in middle school. Middle school students don't like taking the bus."

The proposal includes "a two-story addition as well as two parking lots providing a total 236 parking spaces," Kristy Stone, planning and development services director, wrote in a memo. "U-46 anticipates a total of 27 classrooms and a maximum enrollment of 750

students upon completion of the expansion. The majority of the expansion is devoted to flex/ lab space, library expansion and a new gymnasium."

The site of the school is off of Jacaranda Drive which has single-family homes surrounding it.

Being requested is a plat of consolidation to make a single lot and rezoning the 19.9-acre lot to public lands where it is currently designated for both public lands and suburban residential. It also includes a request to remove an extension of Fair Oaks Road from a future land use plan.

"Improvements include a building addition to upgrade the school to a Middle School," wrote Claudia Welp, project manager with Cage Engineering, in a letter. "Site upgrades include increased parking to meet Village requirements, separate parent and bus drop off loops, separate parent and bus entrance/exits to the site, and associated pavement, utility and stormwater upgrades."

The plan will move to the Planning and Zoning Commission for review and a required public hearing, and the board wants further review from a traffic engineer.

U-46 Board slated to vote on myriad of expenses

The Board of Education in School District U-46 is set to vote on \$261,054 in expenditure items at its upcoming meeting on Monday, June 5. The items were presented on May 15.

Included is \$129,500 with Corwin, coming from the education fund and reimbursed through federal grants if approved, to hire Doug Fisher as a curriculum consultant. It is for a revision to the middle school curriculum as the district prepares to transition to sixth grade moving to that level from elementary.

The proposal states that "we determined that an expert consultant to guide the work would support the curriculum writing teams to ensure alignment with our U-46 Rising work which would include rigorous tasks, common formative and summative assessments, learning targets, language targets, and success criteria. The expert consultant would also help achieve our goal of developing thriving adolescents as

defined by the MS Transition Committee as well as meet the needs of all our students by integrating social and emotional learning."

Costing \$72,000 (education fund), the district is seeking a community engagement and communications consultant through Creative Entourage to "assist with ongoing community engagement to bring the community's vision to life" related to facility updates.

The board will vote on renewing membership with the Illinois Association of School Boards (IASB) costing \$33,240 (education fund). The IASB is a taxpayer funded lobbyist group for government-run schools.

With Estate Enterprises, the district is asking for \$26,314 (operations and maintenance fund for district wide herbicide application.

"School District U-46 has nearly 400 acres of grass on its properties and requires a contractor spraying specific herbicides to keep weeds to a minimum," the proposal states.

The board will also vote on the 2024-2025 school calendar as well as membership with the Illinois High School Association (IHSA), which governs high school athletics. There is no fee to the IHSA membership.

Sophomore Hailey Dworak and Susana Alanis as well as freshmen Brianna Coffey and Justice Coats added an RBI in the effort.

Streamwood fell 17-0 at West Chicago to end the regular season on Tuesday, May 16.

Graduating seniors include Elgin Community College commits Lara and Nick Weaver along with Mario Avila, Carter Blanchard, Matthew Leffel, Vinnie Lunz, Joey Lunz, Joseph Matuszak, Isaiah Ortiz, Frank Sanchez and Joshua Wilder.

"Like I have said before, this senior class is always going to be special," said Streamwood coach Dan Jennings. "They are the first four-year guys we have had since we got here. I love these guys and cannot wait to see all the great things they do in the future."

In the regional semifinals, Streamwood defeated No. 8 Elgin 11-3 on Wednesday, May 24. Weaver (3-for-4, double, RBI), Ortiz (2-for-2, RBI), Paskewic (double) and Joey Lunz (three RBI) led at the plate, and Paskewic went the distance on the mound allowing three runs (one earned) on four hits and two walks, and he struck out six.

Streamwood opened the week with its final regular season game, a 5-2 non conference loss at Metea Valley on Monday, May 22.
