Compensation report presented to U-46 board

On average, School District U-46 employees made \$101,032 in salaries and benefits and took 12 sick days in Fiscal Year 2022, according to the salaries and benefits report generated by the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE).

The 69-page report was presented to the Board of Education at its meeting on Monday, Sept. 11.

Superintendent Suzanne Johnson said the district reports numbers to the ISBE which in turn generates the report.

“Each school board shall report to the State Board of Education, on or before October 1 of each year, the base salary and benefits of the district superintendent and all administrators and teachers employed by the school district,” the Public Act requiring the report states. “For the purposes of this Section, ‘benefits’ includes without limitation vacation days, sick days, bonuses, annuities, and retirement enhancements.”

The Public Act continues: “Prior to this annual reporting to the State Board of Education, the information must be presented at a regular school board meeting, subject to applicable notice requirements, and then posted on the [internet] website of the school district, if any.”

The salaries and benefits in the report represents about 55 percent of the \$465.5 million budgeted for salaries and benefits in FY2023. Certain staff and certain income expenditures, like stipends, are excluded from the report.

The salaries listed in the report totaled \$201.3 million. Total compensation was \$255.5 million with benefits included: other benefits (\$32.4 million), retirement enhancements (\$19.9 million), annuities (\$1.7 million) and bonuses (\$172,000).

There were 2,529 full-time employees included in the report who took 30,240 sick days, for the average of 12, and 2,075 vacation days were taken. The district’s teachers’ contract allows for 12 sick days per year.

Without comment, U-46 approves its latest budget

The Board of Education in School District U-46 unanimously approved, by a 7-0 vote, the Fiscal Year 2024 budget that increases spending by \$86.4 million (\$689 million to \$775.3 million), a 12.5 percent increase, at its meeting on Monday, Sept. 25.

A public hearing, originally scheduled for Sept. 11, was held that evening. No public comments were made.

This will be the ninth straight year of spending increases with enrollment declines. It projects a 2.9 percent drop in student population from 35,049 to 34,026 with only 61 percent of building capacity used.

There was no board discussion on the ongoing, long-term trends.

Although not discussed at the meeting, the budget appeared to correct an anomaly caught by The Examiner in the tentative budget from August which showed enrollment data from previous years significantly off.

The original budget proposal stated “equity,” not education, is the budget’s “mindset” by spending taxpayer dollars “to areas of greater need as well as addressing climate and culture issues.” Spending is “based on need rather than enrollment alone,” the proposal stated.

“This year, we tried some new approaches such as budgeting with an equity lens and deeper stakeholder engagement,” said Frank Williams, assistant superintendent of finance.

Revenue is set to increase by \$57.2 million (\$689.8 million to \$747 million), an 8.3 percent increase, for a \$28.4 million deficit.

However, the budget is considered in balance with a \$21.6 million surplus based on government financing rules as \$50 million in spending comes from other financing sources, that being the issuance of bonds after the voter approved referendum last spring.

The largest increase in revenue is in the so-called “evidence-based” funding from the state, \$242.9 million to \$275.7 million (\$32.7 million increase). The district plans to seek the largest property tax increase allowed under the law with that revenue increasing \$12 million (\$330.7 million to \$342.8 million).

The largest expenditures are salaries and benefits, increasing 8.2 percent from \$448.9 million to \$485.9 million. Staff is expected to remain flat at 4,794. The largest spending increase is capital outlay, \$53.3 million to \$111.2 million, based on capital projects funded by the new bonds.

The three-year budget forecast shows spending increasing to \$803.5 million by 2026-2027. Enrollment is expected to decline by around 1,000 students a year, eventually to 30,924.

If the forecasts are realized, spending will have increased by 86.9 percent (\$430 million to \$803.5 million) and enrollment declining by 24 percent (40,687 to 30,924) since 2012.

Missed chances lead to tie for Streamwood soccer

The Streamwood soccer team was unable to put away enough chances as the Sabres finished in a 2-2 tie with Glenbard East in Upstate Eight Conference play on Wednesday, Sept. 27 at Millennium Field.

Sabres coach Matt Polovin noted the Glenbard East crowd's excited reaction to the tie as if they won a state title. That's because based on time of possession and scoring opportunities were definitely on Streamwood's side making the tie feel more like a loss for his side.

"We should have won eight or nine to two," Polovin said. "We shouldn't have given up the two, but we had the chances getting the ball in the box and attacking. Andy Benitez was just on fire tonight creating so many chances. He didn't get any help from his teammates. All we needed was someone to just run in, a good hard pass on the ground and put the ball in the back of the net. And nobody did it."

All the scoring came in the first half. Max Galvan and A.J. Sabanovic each found the net for Streamwood with Sergio Barrera and Jairo Sanchez adding helpers.

The Sabres did lose top defender Alex Alcala to an injury in the game when he took a knee to the head which could keep him off the field for a few weeks. Keeper Carlos Rosales also made his first start, which Polovin was pleased with his performance, as starting goalie Issac Morales was injured during practice that week.

Streamwood is now 10-3-3 overall, 2-0-2 in the UEC as they compete with Elgin (5-0) and Larkin (3-1) for the conference crown.

"There's a lot of teams that would love to be 10-3-3 right now," Polovin said. "The guys have done well all season. I just don't want it to unravel at this point in the season. We're supposed to get stronger and get ready for regionals coming up in a couple weeks."

The Sabres were coming off their fourth and fifth shutouts, both UEC games, of the season the previous week with a 0-0 tie at Bartlett on Monday, Sept. 18 and a 6-0 win at Glenbard South on Thursday, Sept. 21.

Sabanovic led the effort against Glenbard South with two goals and three assists.

1. York (6-0) Glenbard West, Friday

Comment: The Dukes started the toughest three-game stretch on their schedule last week with an impressive 32-21 win over previously unbeaten Downers Grove North. Jake Melion rushed for 257 yards and scored 3 touchdowns a week after running for 213 yards and 3 TDs. Next comes a pair of 4-2 teams, Glenbard West and Lyons.

2. Hersey (6-0) At Rolling Meadows, Friday

Comment: The Nasir McKenzie comeback story added another impressive chapter last week in a 28-3 win over Prospect. McKenzie, a senior who tore his ACL as a sophomore, rushed for 211 yards -- his second straight 200-yard rushing game. Combined with QB Colton Gumino and Hersey's lethal passing game, the Huskies continue to be near impossible to stop.

3. Batavia (5-1) St. Charles East, Friday

Comment: Much, much, much closer this time -- full marks to Boone Thorgesen's Geneva squad -- but another year, another Bulldogs win, this time 21-18. Now 13 straight, the one-time lopsided series is narrowed to 51-49-5 with Batavia coach Dennis Piron aiming to tie it in his final two years as coach. Batavia's schedule finally eases up last 3 weeks.

4. Barrington (6-0) At Hoffman Estates, Friday

Comment: The Broncos continued their bounce-back season with a 55-14 win over Schaumburg last week, though the schedule gets harder to end the year. Next up are a couple of 4-2 teams with the Hawks and then Palatine before closing the regular season against Conant. QB Nick Peipert threw for 330 yards last week.

5. Downers Grove N. (5-1) At Lyons, Friday

Comment: The Trojans gave top-ranked York a battle last week despite missing RB Noah Battle. Sophomore QB Owen Lansu threw for 223 yards and found Oliver Thulin for a pair of touchdowns. Now they get another toughie against Jon Beutjer's Lions before closing the regular season against the two Hinsdales -- a combined 3-9.

6. Maine South (5-1) Glenbrook South, Friday

Comment: The Hawks enter on a five-game winning streak. The latest came against Glenbrook North -- a game they trailed 7-0 before quickly putting 40 unanswered points on the board. Constantine Coines tossed three more TD passes and scored on an 8-yard run. Glenbrook South also is 2-0 in the Central Suburban South that the Hawks have absolutely owned.

7. Palatine (4-2) Conant, Friday

Comment: Kole Fager ran for 3 TDs last week in the Pirates' 24-10 win over Fremd in the annual Battle of the Tracks matchup. Now comes a Cougars team that struggled last week in a 28-0 loss to Hoffman Estates. Cooper Hanson did rush for 151 yards for Conant, who let up all 28 points in the second quarter.

8. Warren (4-2) At Waukegan, Friday

Comment: After an absolute gauntlet of a schedule, the Blue Devils get 1-5 Waukegan this week and 1-5 Zion-Benton in Week 9 sandwiched around a Lake Forest team that just lost to Stevenson last week. Warren is in the driver's seat for the North Suburban Conference title, and it is also looking like a strong bet for another long postseason run.

9. Lake Zurich (5-1) Lake Forest, Friday

Comment: The Bears bounced back from a hard-fought loss to Warren with an equally hard-fought win over Libertyville, 29-28 in overtime. Chris Pirrone rushed for 113 yards, quarterback Lucas Lappin added 75 more, and Lappin also threw the 2-point conversion pass to force OT before Pirrone scored the eventual game-winner on a 1-yard run in overtime.

10. Naperville C. (5-1) DeKalb, Friday

Comment: Watch out for the Redhawks, who have opened DVC play with a 27-0 win over an improved Waubonsie Valley team, then beat Neuqua Valley 21-7 and Naperville North 21-14 in back-to-back weeks. With 2-4 DeKalb and 0-6 Metea Valley up next, the Redhawks are in a great position with their lights-out defense and improving offense.

To the Max? That's exactly what Streamwood needed from Max Galvan against Elgin. 'It's just his tenacity.'

Sophomore midfielder Max Galvan came into Monday's game on a mission for Streamwood.

Junior forward AJ Sabanovic and his team-leading 16 goals were on the bench due to a red card in the previous game. That meant Galvan needed to execute a different approach.

"We had to rely on the midfield and the wingers to work with us more, not with the strikers," Galvan said. "The strikers were more of a decoy. We had to step up for AJ."

Galvan indeed stepped up with 11:12 left in the first half, converting a pass from Bryan Huerta for the lone goal in a 1-0 win over Upstate Eight Conference leader Elgin.

Huerta pushed the ball up the sideline and centered a pass to Galvan, who fired a line drive into the net to send the host Sabres (11-3-4, 3-0-3) past the Maroons (11-3-1, 5-1).

The play was second nature for Galvan.

"We work on that before we start the game," Galvan said. "We do that in warm-ups where someone takes the ball there and centers it and we finish. I had that in mind.

"That's always (Huerta's) mission — to take it all the way down the line and center it back in. I was just waiting for the opportunity, and once I saw it, I put it in."

The goal was the fifth of the season for Galvan, tying him with Huerta for second on the team. That's only part of what he brings to the Sabres, however.

"It's just his tenacity out there," Streamwood coach Matt Polovin said. "You would never look at him and say that's the guy we have to watch out for. He flies under the radar but just does everything and more that I ask of him.

"Defensively, distribution-wise and when we need a goal, he's done that a few times this season. He just hits a line drive right into the center of the goal."

Streamwood was also missing its best marking defender in Alex Alcalá, who's out with a mild concussion but hopes to be back before the end of the regular season.

That didn't stop the Sabres from stifling Elgin on the defensive end.

"They were doing a nice job of staying compact and cleaning stuff up," Elgin coach Jimmy Romano said. "They did enough to disrupt what we were trying to do."

"It was an off night for some of us as well. Couldn't find the groove, couldn't find the connections."

Eduardo Nava, the Maroons' leading scorer, was held to only one shot on goal. Trey Yi did most of the one-on-one work on Nava.

"My original plan was to double-team him and then it turned out that we didn't need to," Polovin said. "Trey did a phenomenal job, just on him, frustrating him."

Elgin didn't lose its first game last season until the supersectional. The Maroons have now lost three games in a month, but Romano isn't overly concerned.

"Honestly, it's kind of humbling," Romano said. "Losing now to get that taste before the playoffs is good. Last time we lost to York and Naperville North it kind of fired our guys up."

"It actually makes us more focused, more determined."

With the win, meanwhile, the Sabres kept their conference title hopes alive with three games left before the postseason.

Galvan's effort will go a long way toward fueling the Sabres' success.

"Max is one of the better midfielders anywhere," Polovin said. "What he brings to our team and what he's done this season, we probably wouldn't be where we are without him.

"He's someone that is just 80 minutes strong."
