Partial eclipse next weekend eagerly awaited by those who will be able to view some of it in Elgin

The annular eclipse that's to occur next week won't be visible to the naked eye and likely will go unnoticed by most, but it's a fascinating sight for people like **School District U-46** Planetarium Director Peggy Hernandez.

An annular eclipse is a special type of partial eclipse that happens when the moon blocks all of the sun except for a small ring around the edge that is described as a ring of fire, according to science.nasa.gov.

The moon is at its smallest because it's at its farthest point away from Earth, Hernandez said, so it doesn't cover the sun entirely and creates the orange ring, she said.





When it takes place Saturday, Oct. 14, the eclipse will travel on a path from the West Coast heading southeast through Texas, Hernandez said. Within the direct path, there will be areas where people will have a better view of the eclipse and some places in Texas where they'll be able to see the entire ring, she said.

NASA's website has maps showing its direction and indicating where and who will get the best view. The space agency will be broadcasting the eclipse live online and its Eclipse Explorer is an interactive map that can predict events down to the second, its website said.

In Illinois, the sun will be 30% to 40% obscured, Hernandez said.

"If it's really sunny that day, it will look a little dimmer (outside)," she said, but cloud cover will make it less noticeable.

The annular eclipse is expected to be at its peak at noon in Illinois, she said. If you have something safe to view it through, it will look "like a bite was taken out of the sun," she said,

joking that the sun "will look like a According to NASA, it's the last annular solar eclipse that will be visible in the U.S. until June 2039.

The planetarium isn't holding any special programs for the annular eclipse, but the Gail Borden Public Library in Elgin is holding a few.

A Solar Eclipse Extravaganza will be held from 11 a.m. to noon Monday, Oct. 9, in the Meadows Community Room of the 270 N. Grove Ave. library. It's billed as outer space fun for kids and families who are getting ready for the partial solar eclipse.

Families will learn the science and art of solar eclipses and how to view them safely. Solar eclipse filter glasses will be distributed at the event, which can be attended without registration.

Hernandez sees the annular eclipse like a practice run for an April 2024 total eclipse, which will be more visible in the Midwest. It will be visible in the U.S., Mexico and Canada, but the best place to see it will be Indianapolis, will be 100% in the totality zone, Hernandez said.

"I'm going to it. It's the most intensive professional development experience I can have as a planetarium educator," she said.

A total solar eclipse is a totally different experience than a partial.

"For a total solar eclipse, you're lucky to watch it once in your life," she said.

In Elgin, the sun will be 93% covered during the April eclipse but how it's seen will depend on the weather. If it's a clear day, streetlights will turn on and birds will stop chirping, she said. If it's cloudy, it will be much more subdued.

The planetarium is already planning public shows in late March leading up to the big day, Hernandez said.

One common thing about both eclipses is no one should look directly at the sun during the event. Solar glasses can be purchased on sites like Amazon and pinhole projections can be made at home by finding instructions online, Hernandez said.

# 'They can't get people to work here': U-46 drivers call for better pay to attract more workers

Days that start at 5:15 a.m. and end at 4:45 p.m. Workplace temperatures that hit 120 degrees in the summer. The possibility of being kicked, punched or slapped. Confrontations with students in possession of illegal drugs. Take home pay of \$585 every two weeks.

That's the true version of the help-wanted advertisement Elgin Area **School District U-46** has for its bus drivers, according to the people who have been doing the job.

Since the start of this school year, the more than 300 drivers and bus assistants in the state's second-largest school district have called for pay that is at least competitive with that of nearby school districts. The district's administration now has agreed to open union contract negotiations with the drivers earlier than planned. The current contract doesn't expire until July 1, 2025.

But in the backdrop of those talks will be the latest budget approved by the school board. It shows expenses outpacing income by more than \$20 million, if not for \$50 million the district will borrow to help fund construction projects.

Kathryn Bentley is one of several members of the district's transportation department to

plead with the school board in recent weeks to solve what she and her co-workers described as a daily crisis of not having enough drivers to get to school on time.

"I have seen many posts on social media from frustrated parents that are upset their kids are missing 10 to 15 minutes of class time every morning," Bentley told the board recently. "Some of these students have developed anxiety over this. It doesn't exactly fit well with our 'attendance matters' that is on our district homepage.

"The problem is plain and simple. We do not have enough employees, and pay is the problem."

The current contract with drivers shows a starting pay of \$19.50 an hour. That compares, drivers said, to \$22.86 for St. Charles Unit District 303 bus drivers -- a 17% difference.

Tina Semock is eight years into driving for U-46. She still hasn't hit the \$22.86 mark. The top pay for drivers in U-46 is \$25.66 an hour. When she goes to local farmers' markets to try to recruit new drivers for the district, Semock said, as soon as the conversation turns to pay and people jump online to see how it compares to that of other districts, any consideration of working for U-46 vanishes.

"They can't get people to work here, and they are not going to," Semock said. She's thought about leaving. It's only her seniority, which allows her to pick more cherished routes to drive, that keeps her from moving on.

"I've lived in Elgin my whole life," Semock said. "I know Elgin like the back of my hand. When there (are) traffic issues, I know where to go.

"I just decided I would rather try to get the district to fix this problem than leave. But I won't go another two years (when the contract expires). If they choose to not do anything more about it, I will need to go somewhere else."

As it is now, Semock and the other drivers said office staff, management and even nonunion employees in the district's transportation department jump in to drive routes most days. There is a "just do the best you can" mission to get 22,000 students, out of the more than 35,000 students in the district, to and from 57 school buildings and special programs as far away as Palatine, Des Plaines and Woodstock.

Sometimes, drivers said, there aren't enough bus assistants to pair with special education students -- including some who need an assistant to prevent them from self-harm during the drives.

It's not that the district isn't trying to address the staffing shortage, district officials said in a written statement.

"We are continually looking to bring additional qualified drivers and assistants to join our

team through job fairs, referral bonuses and other recruitment efforts," the statement reads. "Since the COVID-19 pandemic, U-46, like many school districts across Illinois, has faced a shortage of bus drivers."

District officials also indicated in the statement they are hopeful that opening negotiations for a new or modified union contract with the bus drivers will result in solutions with which everyone can agree.

## Girls tennis: Simbulan-Foster, Glenbard South dominate Upstate Eight tournament

Lorenza Simbulan-Foster has certainly climbed the ladder of success in the Upstate Eight Conference in four years.

The Glenbard South senior was fourth as a freshman and second as a sophomore and junior.

The No. 1 seeded Simbulan-Foster climbed the ultimate mountain Saturday by claiming the UEC first singles title with a 6-0, 6-0 win over East Aurora's Melanie Galindo.

"It feels awesome," said Simbulan-Foster. "I feel I am more consistent and better in the mental part of the game."

Simbulan-Foster will attempt to make a fourth straight trip to the 1A state tournament next Saturday at the Timothy Christian sectional in Elmhurst.

The Raiders senior is hoping to improve on last season's 9-12 finish at the state meet.

"Lorenza is a very talented player," said first-year coach Kevin Schillerstrom. "She has a very strong baseline game."

Simbulan-Foster's effort helped propel the Raiders to the UEC team title with 78.5 points. West Chicago was second with 57.5 points and Glenbard East third with 53.5 points.

Augusta Leimonas took top honors at No. 3 singles defeating Suhani Patel of Bartlett 6-2,

Top-seeded seniors Allie Mizwicki and Emily Puchalski defeated No. 2 Ashwita Sankar and Sheereena Patel of Bartlett in the title match 6-2, 6-2.

The Glenbard South duo was third in the conference a year ago.

"We work well together," Mizwicki said. "We have gotten better as the season has gone on."

"We hope to get to the second day of the sectionals," Puchalski said. "We improved from last season."

The Raiders swept the four doubles titles with Emily Zeikus-Bekah Brzenski (2), Erika Hartman-Joy Shim (3) and Skylar Fischer-Lexia Hagedorn (4).

"It is a feather in their cap to win the conference," said Schillerstrom. "It has been a transition year. It is three coaches in four years for the seniors. The season starts at Timothy Christian next week."

Second-place West Chicago was led by No. 2 singles Julia Koput and No. 2 doubles Judith Benitez and Ayellan Vellikans, No. 3 doubles Derilyn Espinal-Zitary Garcia Medina and No. 4 doubles Ariley Jacobo-Brianna Guerreo who were second.

Elina Velasco was third at No. 1 singles and Addison Jeffrey and Mairy Jury were fourth at No. 1 doubles.

Glenbard East was paced by Claire Flanagan, the No. 2 seed, who upset top-seeded Koput in the title match, 6-4, 6-1.

Ella Book-Kaitlin Murphy were third at No. 1 doubles and Helen Jones was fourth at No. 1 singles. In doubles, No. 2 Alyssa Borbath-Leila Nehra and Lindsey Elias-Milana Szcybura were all fourth.

**Bartlett** was fourth with 44.5 points.

Sankar and Patel were runner-up at No. 1 doubles.
