Streamwood High School's fall play: 'Almost, Maine'

Streamwood High School's Fine Arts Department will present John Cariani's "Almost, Maine" at 7 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, Oct. 26-27 and at 11 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 28, in the school's auditorium. The show is directed by Linnea Grooms.

Almost, Maine is a place that's so far north, it's almost not in the United States. It's almost in Canada. And it's not quite a town because its residents never got around to getting organized. So it almost doesn't exist. One cold, clear, winter night, as the Northern Lights hover in the star-filled sky above, the residents of Almost, Maine, find themselves falling in and out of love in unexpected and hilarious ways. Knees are bruised. Hearts are broken. But the bruises heal, and the hearts mend - almost- in this delightful midwinter night's dream.

At its core, "Almost, Maine" is nine separate stories with no more than three actors on stage at a time dealing with love and loss. The audience sits on stage with the actors and become part of the

magic.

The crew is designing and constructing the set, designing and controlling the lighting, organizing all of the props, and handling all of the sound engineering. Costumes are being designed by Ashley Santiago.

School District U-46's contract with its transportation union doesn't expire until June 2025, but negotiations will be starting early in effort to draft a deal that might be more attractive to bus driver applicants, officials said.

Drivers are working under a contract signed in April 2021 but both sides agreed in September that collective bargaining for a new package would begin this year, district spokewoman Tara Burghart said.

"This would be an earlier start to contract negotiations than in the past," she said.

Bus drivers speaking at recent school board meetings have said they are being paid less than drivers in other districts, a situation that's contributing to a driver shortage and resulting in drivers being overworked.

Starting U-46 bus driver pay is \$19.50 an hour, significantly less than the \$22.68 paid by St. Charles School District 303 and the \$25 rate at Palatine School District 15, union officials said.

"It's been at least two years that we have been struggling with transportation," said Heather Weiss, president of the District U45 Transportation Union.

The district employs 265 school bus drivers and has about a dozen drivers on call on an as-needed basis, Burghart said. That's 11 fewer driver than they had last year.

Of the 48 job openings in the transportation department, 34 are for bus drivers, Burghart said. Because of the shortage, some students are arriving late to school, which impacts instruction time, Weiss said.

"Our special education students need consistency, and that is definitely taking a hit with the shortage because we have to double up routes. This causes drivers to be overloaded and students to be late to school and even home," Weiss said.

Burghart acknowledged this has been a problem.

"We do have routes that run late to school because of the driver shortage, which is why we are working hard to bring more qualified drivers and assistants onto our team," she said. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, U-46 and many other school districts have not been able to hire enough drivers, Burghart said. The district has been holding job fairs, offering referral bonuses and using other recruitment efforts to close the gap, she said.

"We are working diligently to resolve the staffing challenges that school districts across the state are facing so that our transportation services run smoothly and (we) work closely with our schools to ensure that our routes are not overloaded," Burghart said.

Weiss said the union has been told that U-46 officials recognize the need to offer more competitive wages.

"Our school bus drivers and assistants play a vital role in our school district, ensuring that more than 22,000 students travel safely between their schools and homes each day. We appreciate their dedication and service," Burghart said. "We are committed to finding a resolution that recognizes their valuable contributions to our school community."

- Daily Herald -Few suburban schools follow state's radon testing recommendation

Kirsten Schmidt of Westmont-based Radon Detection Specialists places a radon detection device in a room at Millburn Elementary School after construction was completed recently to remediate unsafe levels of the radioactive gas detected there.(Joe Lewnard | Staff Photographer) Despite recommendations that schools be tested for radon every five years, 85 out of 100 suburban school districts have not done so -- and more than half of the 15 that did found elevated levels of the radioactive gas in at least one building.

Even among districts that tested, most did not test all their buildings as recommended.

That's according to a Daily Herald investigation into the 100 districts' compliance with an Illinois State Board of Education recommendation that school buildings be tested every five years for the gas that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and U.S. Surgeon General's office estimate is responsible for more than 21,000 lung cancer deaths annually.

"I wouldn't be surprised if this is the first time some of these school districts are hearing the word 'radon,'" said Patrick Daniels, a health physicist and radon program manager for the Illinois Emergency Management Agency. "Radon is a very big risk most people aren't aware of, or don't understand."

The radon testing recommendation was part of a 2009 legislative package that also "requires" school districts to report test results to IEMA, though compliance with this aspect of the law appears scattershot as well.

"Our district wanted to be proactive and comply with some of the new recommendations that have been coming out so we could be ahead of the curve if it became required," said Scott Ney, director of facility operations at Geneva Unit District 304.

Six of the district's 11 buildings were tested in 2021, costing the district \$12,200, according to records obtained through a public records request. The other buildings are slated to be tested soon, Ney said.

Of the 417 detectors deployed in those six buildings, five showed radon levels above 4 picocuries per liter of air, the accepted limit. Another \$6,914 was spent to remediate the problems.

"Mitigation costs can vary depending on the location of the leak in the building," said Dan Potter, who operates DuPage Radon Contractors and also runs the Illinois Radon Policy Task Force. "But these radon mitigation systems are pretty dependable, and once they're installed, they work."

Millburn Elementary District 24 officials in Lake County just installed a system a few weeks ago after elevated levels were discovered in an elementary school. Testing and remediation costs

combined were \$11,345, records show.

"We wanted to make sure everyone's safe, that's our priority," said District 24 Superintendent Jason Lind.

Some of the largest suburban school districts -- including Elgin Area **District U-46**, Indian Prairie Unit District 204, Northwest Suburban High School District 214 and Wheaton Warrenville Unit District 200 -- have not done any testing, records show. Officials from some of those districts noted the state is only recommending the action, not requiring it. District 200 officials said testing hasn't taken place at any of its 20-plus buildings because "our schools do not have basements."

"It doesn't have to be a basement, it's anything with ground contact," said Kirsten Schmidt, vice president of Westmont-based Radon Detection Specialists. "We find high levels in rooms on slabs all the time."

The state law reads that districts should test in "every occupied school building."

Since the 2017-2018 school year, Elk Grove Elementary District 59, Leyden High School District 212, Northbrook Elementary District 27 and Northbrook Elementary District 28 in suburban Cook County reported test results. Elevated levels were detected in a classroom in District 28.

In DuPage County, Downers Grove Elementary District 58, Glen Ellyn Elementary District 89 and Naperville Unit District 203 reported testing in just some of those districts' buildings. Elevated levels were found in two classrooms at one of the four schools tested in District 58 and one classroom in District 203 also reported unsafe levels, reports show.

In addition to District 304, East Aurora Unit District 131 was the only other school district in Kane County to perform tests in the past five years. St. Charles Unit District 303 performed tests six years ago and Kaneland Unit District 302 tested in 2013.

District 131's testing in 2018 was one of the most comprehensive in the suburbs. In all, 1,603 detectors were deployed at 25 district buildings resulting in 36 unsafe readings at eight different schools. The cost to the district for both testing and remediation was \$35,600, district records show.

In McHenry County, Huntley Unit District 158 tested nine schools in 2022. Only one of the 90 detectors deployed recorded unsafe radon levels.

Barrington Unit District 220, Fremont Elementary District 79, Lake Zurich Unit District 95 and

Woodland Elementary District 50 were the only Lake County school districts beside District 24 to report radon testing in the past five years. All but District 50 reported some detectors with elevated radon levels. Both District 220 and District 95 officials reported spending nearly \$60,000 each to test and remediate leaks.

District 79 officials took advantage of a state program that trains staff on how to use radon detectors, and performed the testing with state-issued equipment, saving thousands of dollars.

Schmidt said the tests are small, well-marked unobtrusive devices placed in classrooms and other spots where people congregate.

"It's not uncommon to find elevated levels, but I've never had a case where we've had to shut down a room or anything," she said. "It's really about prolonged exposure, so how long is too long to go without testing? It's always fixable."

Radon exposure is more likely to affect teachers more so than students, Schmidt said. That's because teachers and other district staff are apt to remain in the same room year after year.

Teacher unions back the ISBE recommendation.

"The Illinois Federation of Teachers supports efforts to ensure our schools are safe and healthy for all students, teachers and staff," said IFT President Dan Montgomery. "To that end, we urge districts to conduct any ISBE-recommended testing, such as radon testing, that impacts the health and safety of our members and the students they serve."

Potter's task force is looking to draft legislation that would change radon testing from a recommendation to a requirement. The group formed less than two year ago and was already successful in passing legislation requiring landlords to test for radon in rental units, which goes into effect next year.

"We've known that radon kills for 30 years now," Potter said. "We're trying to get a mandate for school testing."

IHSA state playoffs

Dates and times will be announced Monday afternoon.

Class 8A

No. 30 Glenbrook South (4-5) at No. 3 Barrington (9-0) Quick look: Barrington, which has scored 336 points, enters the playoffs unbeaten for the first time since 2017. This is the highest seed for Barrington since that year. Glenbrook South is one of four 4-5 teams that qualified for the state playoffs.

No. 27 Lockport (5-4) at No. 6 Maine South (8-1)

Quick look: Maine South has won eight straight and feels it is back where they belong as one of the top seeds. The Hawks, who are CSL champions, average 35.6 points a game. Lockport has won just two of its last six games.

No. 23 Oswego at No. 10 Warren (7-2)

Quick look: After an 0-2 start, Warren has earned its sixth consecutive playoffs appearance. The Blue Devils allowed 68 points in their first two games and just 48 in their final seven with three consecutive shutouts. Oswego won its way in the playoffs.

No. 21 Lyons (6-3) at No. 12 Stevenson (7-2)

Quick look: The Patriots are back in the playoffs for the second year in a row. After a 2-2 start, Stevenson has won five straight and matched their win total from a year ago. Lyons has allowed just 92 points this season and had three shutouts.

No. 17 Palatine (6-3) at No. 16 Neuqua Valley (6-3)

Quick look: Neuqua earns the home field because of playoff points 49-46. Palatine's Dominik Ball has rushed for 1,291 yards this season and a school record 4,068 for his career. Neuqua won its final four games.

No. 28 Homewood-Flossmoor (5-4) at No. 5 York (8-1)

Quick look: Last year, the Dukes reached the 8A semifinals before running into eventual champion Loyola Academy. This season, senior QB Sean Winton leads the Dukes. H-F defense allows 27 points per game.

No. 26 Lane Tech (6-3) at No. 7 South Elgin (8-1)

Quick look: The five-time defending UEC champs are young but talented, led by junior TE Ishmael George and junior MLB London Leflore. Lane Tech is making its second straight postseason appearance following a dry spell.

No. 25 Niles West (6-3) at No. 8 Huntley (8-1)

Quick look: Running back Haiden Janke is a workhorse in the backfield for the Red Raiders, who ended the regular season on a five-game winning streak. Led by QB John Bae, the Wolves reached the playoffs after finishing 2-7 last season.

No. 20 Naperville North (6-3) at No. 13 Glenbard West (7-2)

Quick look: A couple of perennial heavyweights collide in Glen Ellyn, as the Huskies and Hilltoppers have combined to play 152 postseason games. Tailback Cole Arl leads the Huskies' attack. Glenbard West has reached the playoffs 17 consecutive full seasons.

No. 19 Downers South (6-3) at No. 14 Naperville Central (7-2)

Quick look: The Mustangs rebounded from an 0-3 start to win their last 6, led by tailback Deon Davis, who has scored 10 TDs in the last four games. Anchored by Christian Kuta, the Redhawks captured their first DVC title since 2018.

No. 29 West Aurora (5-4) at No. 4 Edwardsville (8-1)



- Daily Herald -West Chicago becomes eligible for playoffs with victory against Larkin

West Chicago's two-decade playoff drought most likely ended Friday night.

Behind 5 touchdowns by Vincent Muci and a gritty defense, the Wildcats won their fifth game by beating Larkin 35-19 in Upstate Eight Conference action in West Chicago.

With 36 playoff points coming in, the Wildcats (5-4, 5-4), who haven't been to the postseason since 2002, figure to be in good shape when the pairings are announced Saturday night.

West Chicago broke the game open with 3 fourth-quarter touchdowns.

Leading 28-19 after Erick Myrick's 96-yard kickoff kept **Larkin** close, the Wildcats got the ball with just over nine minutes left. In a drive that epitomized their season, the Wildcats moved 65 yards in 13 plays, all on the ground, burning all but 1:17 of the clock. All but 1, including the last 9, were runs by Muci. On third and goal from the 17, on his 42nd carry of the night, the senior tailback broke three tackles to go in for the clinching score.

Muci also scored on runs of 5, 2, and 3 yards and took a blocked punt to the end zone to open the scoring. He finished with 183 yards.

Before that last drive, Muci had just one thought: "Carry the rock. We've got to score. If we get it right here, we end it, it's over."

Fans ran onto the field and celebrated with the players after the final buzzer.

"It's just amazing," Muci said. "Just having this opportunity after coming from a losing program, just turning it up these last few years, it's been great."

The turnaround from last year's 1-8 record started with some soul-searching among coaches last November.

"After what we went through last year we sat together as coaches and said, 'What do we need to change?," said West Chicago coach Adam Chavez. "We said, we're not going to win by beating anybody with athleticism, with speed. We're going to beat people with toughness and physicality. That started in the weight room, getting the kids in the weight room. Doing whatever we can, just getting that mentality of being tough and being physical. It started after Thanksgiving of last year."

The Wildcats got an early lift from their special teams, blocking a **Larkin** punt on the game's first possession. Muci scooped in and returned it for the score. After a defensive stop, Muci put West Chicago up 14-0 with his first rushing touchdown.

But the Royals battled back with touchdowns by Jalen Miller on runs of 14 and 1 yards. The Wildcats blocked the second extra point to lead 14-13 and that was the difference in the game until the fourth quarter.

Muci and the Wildcats scored twice in less than two minutes thanks to an interception by Tommy Doyle that he returned to the 3-yard line, setting up a 1-play scoring drive.

Myrick took the ensuing kickoff all the way to keep things interesting, setting up the Wildcats' final drive.
