

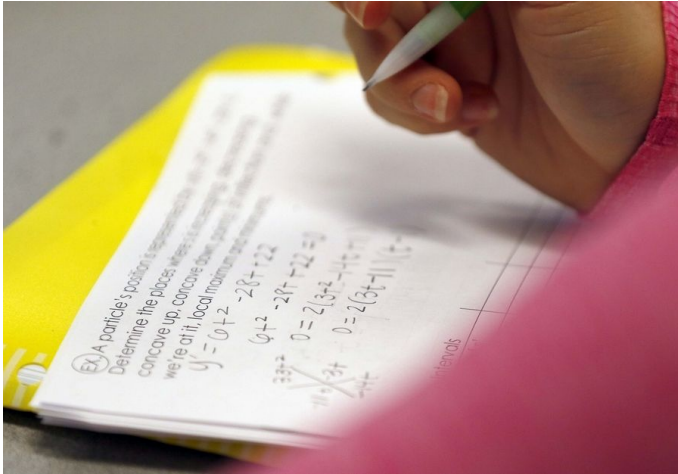

What you need to know about school report cards coming out Monday

Parents and educators will get a glimpse into how their schools and students are performing statewide when the 2023 Illinois School Report Card data comes out Monday.

The annual school report card provides a snapshot of how students are progressing on a wide range of educational goals. School quality is measured through multiple indicators of student success -- standardized tests, alternative assessments, academic growth, English language and mathematics proficiency, science scores, fine arts participation, success on college entrance tests and graduation rates, as well as factors such as chronic absenteeism and school climate surveys.

Here are five things you need to know about the report card:

- Standardized tests: The Illinois Assessment of Readiness in English language arts and math administered each spring to students in third through eighth grades; the Illinois Science Assessment taken by fifth-, eighth- and 11th-graders; and the SAT college entrance exam taken by 11th-graders.

The tests measure student growth and proficiency in meeting state standards.

- **Student growth percentile:** It shows year-to-year progress toward meeting learning standards, that is how much a student grew compared to academic peers who started at the same level. Find out more at isbe.net/Documents/Student-Growth.pdf.
- **Proficiency:** It breaks down the percentage of students meeting or exceeding state standards, as well as the percentage of students approaching proficiency bench marks.
- **Summative designations:** The Illinois State Board of Education categorizes schools in one of four groups: exemplary, commendable, comprehensive and targeted. Schools in the exemplary category are among the highest performing top 10%, while schools in the targeted category are among the lowest performing 5%. - **Equity Journey Continuum:** An informational tool to help districts view their data through the lens of equity. It identifies gaps in student achievement, opportunities, and supports making the data more useful for districts to improve outcomes for students.

Parents will receive individualized report cards showing their student's assessment results, while districts can see how each school and how sub groups of students performed on the assessments to help identify gaps.

The 2023 Illinois Report Card goes live 9 a.m. Monday at illinoisreportcard.com.

Sixteen players ran the ball for South Elgin, but London Leflore was best. His message? ‘All of us are trusted.’

All hands on deck.

Junior London Leflore and his teammates in **South Elgin's** running backs room are firm believers of the philosophy continually espoused over the years by coach Dragan Teonic.

Of course, many of them are also members of the Storm's strong defense.

"We're really flexible about it," Leflore said of the running backs committee, the backbone of **South Elgin's** triple-option attack. "We love that everybody on our team can run the ball.

"Everybody's athletic. First, second, third string, all of us are trusted with the ball."

Leflore was trusted as the lead back Saturday, carrying a team-high 11 times for 69 yards and one touchdown during a 55-6 rout of Lane Tech in a Class 8A first-round playoff game.

A whopping 16 players ran the ball as **South Elgin** (9-1) totaled 287 yards on 39 carries, with five players scoring TDs. The Storm limited the Champions (6-4) to 101 yards.

"It's definitely fun," said Leflore, who doubles at linebacker. "We try to get everybody in, middle linebacker, outside linebacker, defensive backs. Everybody rotates in.

"It's fun playing on both sides."

South Elgin also had nine players score, including one on defense and one on special teams, in advancing to the second round to meet Warren (8-2), which beat Oswego 39-3.

The Storm finished with 351 yards in recording the 100th career win as a head coach for Teonic, who has had stints at Harper College, Hersey and Larkin as well as **South Elgin**.

“That’s great, but more importantly, we’re really just trying to push through as a program and get to the next level, which we’ve yet to do,” Teonic said. “We’re unique to be four years in a row and win a playoff game, which is difficult to do. Not many have done it.

“It’s hard to be in this position, so you never take it lightly. We keep knocking on the door and see if we can push through. It’s not about winning the conference. We’re attempting to win the state championship — a really difficult thing to do.”

Junior quarterback Kevon Brooks has kept Teonic's option offense clicking in the absence of injured starter Jack Ginnan. The Storm scored on all five possessions in the first half.

D'Andre Bartee II, Darrion Thurman, Ari Kravis and Leflore had TD runs of 7, 19, 6 and 5 yards, respectively, as **South Elgin** took a 41-6 lead. Brooks connected with Francesco Macaluso on a 15-yard TD pass, which featured an outstanding one-handed grab by the sophomore tight end.

Junior defensive back Stewart Williams Jr., who is also the team's third quarterback, intercepted a pass in the second quarter and returned it 16 yards to set up one of those TDs. He later returned a punt 64 yards for a TD.

"I struggled with catching the punt last week and let one drop," Williams said. "I made a point to practice it this week.

"I saw it, caught it and had one guy to beat at about the 45. I made him miss and then saw my blockers ahead and just followed them down the field to the end zone."

Brandon Berrios added a 10-yard TD run and Nicolas Barkho returned an interception 46 yards to close out the scoring in the third quarter, which featured a running clock.

The Storm don't have a running back who has reached 500 yards for the season, but eight players have gone for 150 yards or more.

One of those eight is Leflore.

"It's unique," Teonic said. "We switch them around a lot, but they all play defense. You want them on the field as much as possible. This is the only way we know how to roll."

Teonic reaches 100 milestone in South Elgin's first-round blowout

Thirty-five years ago, a young 8-year-old boy along with his family emigrated from the former Yugoslavia to the Chicagoland area where they eventually settled in the west suburbs.

It was there that he developed a love for the game of football -- the American kind.

Through playing at Morton High School for Jim Delach and at Harper College for John Eliasik, that love blossomed into an interest in coaching and teaching the game. That first began as an assistant to Otto Zeman at Riverside-Brookfield over 20 years ago and then to Eliasik at Harper where he went on to succeed him in 2006 guiding the now defunct program to its third and final National Junior College Athletic Association non-scholarship national title two years later.

Then, a move to the prep coaching game took place two years later in 2010 beginning at Hersey, then to **Larkin** four years later followed by a move five miles south to **South Elgin High** in 2018.

On Saturday afternoon, that individual, Dragan Teonic, won his 100th game as head coach as his squad took care of Chicago Lane Tech 55-6 in Class 8A first round action that sends the No. 6 seeded Storm (9-1) to round two next weekend where it will host No. 10 Warren (8-2), a 39-3 home winner over No. 23 Oswego (6-4).

"It's awesome," said Teonic, now with a mark of 100-66 in his head coaching career, as he held his 4-year-old daughter Elena shortly after the contest concluded. "But more importantly we're really just trying to push through as a program and get to the next level (which) we have yet to do."

On Saturday, **South Elgin** pushed their way past a Lane Tech program that was making its second straight postseason appearance and 28th overall by finding pay dirt in each of their first six possessions. Sixteen different ball carriers got in the act led by London Leflore's 63 yards on 10 carries which featured a 5-yard TD jaunt in the second quarter. The Storm were comfortably ahead 34-6 with 3:42 remaining until halftime.

South Elgin finished with 265 yards on the ground (329 yards total) behind a line consisting of seniors Joey Cronin, Tommy Roath and Diego Cabello, and juniors Jayvin Thongsakounh and Aaron

Ayares.

"On the (offensive) line it's basically like a brotherhood," Cronin said. "Ever since summer camp you try a bunch of guys at different positions and over the season we found the right guys at the right spots and over that time we grew together, learned what we're best at and really just became one big family."

The Storm's defense also kept that family mantra by holding the visiting Champions (6-4) to just 97 yards. Only a 4-yard keeper by quarterback Noah Mayra in the second quarter was the lone blemish.

Lane Tech's season will continue on next weekend as it returns to the CPS/Prep Bowl playoffs while Teonic observed the program's fourth consecutive year with a postseason victory.

"It's unique," he said. "(It's) difficult to do and there's not many schools that have done it and it's hard to be in this position so never take it lightly (and) keep knocking on this door and see if we can burst through."
