Elgin's annual MLK prayer breakfast returns in person to ECC

After a two-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Elgin's 38th annual prayer breakfast celebration honoring the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. returned in person Saturday at Elgin Community College.

Event co-chair Janice Hare kicked off the celebration with an uplifting speech in front of a packed audience.

"It was just wonderful to see everybody in that room today," said Danise Habun, co-chair of the celebration committee. "This year, we just kind of came back with a bang awarding 12 scholarships, four humanitarian awards. It was just beautiful."

Twelve seniors from three high schools -- Larkin in Elgin, South Elgin and Elgin Academy -- were awarded scholarships, given annually to students who have demonstrated an active interest and meaningful involvement in the areas of human rights, civil rights, social justice and/or world peace. The award amount ranges from \$500 to \$1,000.

The prayer breakfast is part of the Elgin Human Relations Commission's weekend of activities celebrating King.

The weekend celebration includes the Illinois premiere of the documentary "Invented Before You Were Born." It will be screened for free from 4 to 6 p.m. Sunday in the Larkin High School auditorium. The film follows the story of white siblings Jonathan and Rachel Knight. They discover they are the descendants of a Kentucky slave owner who freed 65 enslaved people and gave them land, homes, tools and money to establish themselves as free Blacks in America.

Traci Ellis -- an author, Larkin High School graduate and former Elgin Area School District

U-46 school board member -- is among the descendants of the freed people.

A Q&A session featuring filmmakers Jonathan Knight and Le Datta Grimes, as well as Ellis will follow.



Hard-nosed defense has been a common staple of Larkin's basketball program in recent years.

This season, however, has been a little different story, according to Royals coach Deryn Carter.

"It hasn't been that way this year for us," Carter said of the team's defensive prowess.

That tough man-to-man, trapping defense returned during Larkin's 67-38 Upstate Eight Conference victory over cross-town rival Elgin (8-11, 1-8) Friday night on the Royals' home floor.

After holding the Maroons without a field goal for the final 5 ½ minutes of the opening half while building a 37-24 halftime advantage, the Royals (7-11, 5-4) clamped down once again in the second half, not allowing a basket for more than 10 ½ minutes.

Leading 42-35 with 3:09 left in the third quarter, the Royals went on a 25-0 run over the next 10-plus minutes to seal the decision.

"We need to be that and we haven't been that," Carter said of his team's tough defense.

"Hopefully, this is a good stepping stone to build off defensively."

Junior guard Jakob Blakley, who scored a game-high 24 points with 4 rebounds, agreed with his head coach.

"I think our defense was the difference, getting those stops -- especially those turnovers where they (Maroons) threw it out of bounds or those steals where they threw it right to us. Our defense changed the outcome of that game."

Adrian York added 12 points for the Royals, while Logan Leaver and Darnell Wilder chipped in with 9 and 8 points, respectively.

Larkin received a huge lift from its bench, which outscored Elgin's reserves, 22-2.

"They came in and provided a spark for us," said Carter.

"For the most part, I was happy with what our guys brought to the table."

Sidelined since last summer by an injury, Blakley appears to be rounding into form quickly since his return to the court late last month.

"I feel like speed-wise, I'm 100 percent," said Blakley, who shot 7 for 13 with a pair of 3-pointers. "Because I took six months off, some of my reads still aren't there. It takes some time to come back, especially on my transition layups."

Carter feels the same transition taking place with his team.

"Playing the first half of the season without 'Cheese' (Blakley), and then in and out, in and out of the lineup, we're trying to get our rhythm for sure," said Carter.

"We've got another one tomorrow (at Prairie Ridge), but I think we're moving in the right direction."

Junior guard Maddox Hollian had 16 points and 12 rebounds for Elgin.

"The effort is there, but we deviate from our plan at times," said Elgin coach Brett Johnson.

"We had to play a workmanlike game against them tonight, and we got away from that when their pressure got to us."

The Maroons took some positives from the loss.

"I asked them in the locker room, 'how did this compare to last year when you lost by 70 (87-17) and 66 (86-20)?'" said Johnson. "They felt like the game was competitive."

Prior to the boys' game, Larkin's girls defeated Elgin 56-50 behind a 28-point performance from senior forward Baylei Johnson, who recently topped the career 1,000-point and 1,000-rebound marks. Freshman Sanaii McPherson added 12 points for the Royals (9-10, 6-4).

Elgin (7-14, 0-10) was led by Alyssa Wysuph's 17 points. Izzie Castro and Izzy Vidallo added 13 and 11 points, respectively.

South Elgin stops Bartlett, improves to 8-1 in UEC

South Elgin must have felt like a heavyweight boxer.

The Storm absorbed every punch Bartlett dished out, got off the mat and eventually won the bout.

Spearheaded by 22 points from Elias Cole Williams which included a resounding dunk to end the game, the host Storm edged Bartlett 66-61 in Upstate Eight Conference action in South Elgin Friday night.

"We have lost games like this," said South Elgin coach Phil Church. "Bartlett kept coming, We showed a lot of growth and it is a testament to these kids."

Cole Williams, who was 10-of-15 from the floor, added 8 rebounds with 3 assists for the Storm (11-8, 8-1).

"The dunk at the end was awesome, " said Cole-Williams. "I loved it. This was a great win. We knew we couldn't relax. We had to push hard."

Church is enjoying the progress of Cole-Williams.

"Eli is starting to get some schools to notice him," said the Storm coach. "He is going to garner more defensive attention. He had a great game."

Jake Tiaokhiao added 17 points with a pair of 3-pointers and Victor Sison contributed 15 with 2 treys.

Connecting on 5-of-8 from 3-point range, the Storm led 33-17 with 3:36 left in the first half.

Bartlett (13-6, 6-3) kept its poise and ended the half on a 14-5 run to slice South Elgin's lead to 38-31 at intermission. Ethan Hedeen had 5 points including a 3, Martin McCarthy scored 4 points and Kelton McEwen buried a 3 during the Hawks' comeback.

Bartlett methodically whittled away at South Elgin's lead and eventually tied the game at 59 on a layup from Keegan Kunzer with 1:10 left. Bartlett couldn't get any closer.

Hedeen, in his first start, scored 17 points with four 3-pointers.

"Ethan was phenomenal in his first start," said Bartlett coach Jim Wolfsmith. "He played great."

Playing without leading scorer Nathan Scearce, Kunzer scored 12 and McEwen added 10.

"We didn't defend early and we were impatient," said Wolfsmith. "We didn't get enough stops at the end. They knocked down free throws and we didn't (9-of-18)."

Something Wilder

Senior guard sparks big second quarter with 6 points, 4 rebounds, 3 steals and 2 assists for Larkin

Senior guard Darnell Wilder has settled on his identity for Larkin.

Even though the Royals have been searching this season for the best way to fuse the different pieces of their team together, Wilder is secure about his role in the process.

"I just know whenever I am out there, I have to bring the energy and set the tone," Wilder said. "I wanted to be the one who changed our focus and level of intensity."

The 5-foot-11 Wilder, who relies upon a defensive menace, ball-hawking attitude in his capacity as an all-around player, was referring to the start of the second quarter.

He scored eight points in the first half Friday night, sparking host Larkin to a 67-38 Upstate Eight Conference win over archrival Elgin. And the second quarter was key.

Larkin (7-11, 5-4) broke the game open with a 15-2 closing burst at the end of that tell-tale quarter. Wilder started it off in style, opening with a steal and breakaway.

He scored six of his points for the Royals during that crucial surge. He also had four rebounds, three steals and two assists.

"This is my third year on the varsity," Wilder said. "I started out trying to shoot the basket, but right now, I'm really trying to focus on how to be the best defender on the team."

Junior guard Jakob Blakley scored a game-high 24 points for the Royals. Senior guard Adrian Colen-York had 13 points, four rebounds and two steals.

Junior guard Logan Leaver scored nine points on three 3-pointers.

Junior guard Maddox Hollian led Elgin (8-11, 1-8) with 16 points. He scored 14 of Elgin's first 21 points as the Maroons hovered around the Royals.

The left-handed Hollian, who's averaging 18 points, showed the ability to knock down perimeter shots. He also used jab steps and quickness to get to the basket.

"I like to get to the midrange of the floor and pull up," Hollian said. "When I get into the paint, I like to get the ball to our shooters in the corner.

"Once teams see me hit the first couple of shots, they realize I'm a shooter and guys start coming out to close out. That creates driving opportunities."

Junior forward Angel Nunez was the beneficiary for Elgin. He nailed two 3-pointers during the third quarter and finished with nine points.

Larkin, however, allowed just five baskets in the second half.

Colen-York and Wilder helped put the clamps on Hollian in the second half, limiting him to just one basket.

"This is my third year on the varsity, but my game has evolved during that time," Colen-York said. "I have gotten in much better condition, and I just improved.

"Like most guys, I came in thinking about naturally wanting to score and see what I could do offensively. I like my defense. I also like having the ball in my hands. I was able to do some things off the dribble and get to the basket."

Last season, the Royals reached a Class 4A supersectional, losing to eventual state champion Glenbard West.

The rivalry game against Elgin offered necessary toughness and direction.

"Our starting lineup never really played together until this year," Wilder said. "We knew (Friday night) was the time to really get our season together.

"We haven't really been playing with a lot of energy. (Friday night) was the chance to really turn it on."

Wilder's defense during the second quarter turned the tide. Larkin then scored the first 19 points of the fourth to turn the game into a rout.

"There's a lot of basketball left and we're trying to win a regional," Wilder said. "This is our first time of really playing together.

"We are just trying to figure things out from here."
