Elgin Area School District U-46 staff to attend professional development on teaching the Holocaust

As part of professional development for teachers being held on Friday, Jan. 27, a group of Elgin Area School District U-46 high schoolers will conduct a table reading of a play based on the accounts of Holocaust survivors.

The professional development session coincides with International Holocaust Remembrance Day.

The play, "Thin Edge of the Wedge," was written by Phyllis Zimbler Miller, a 1966 graduate of Elgin High School. It is based on first-hand accounts she published, and interviews she conducted, while working as a reporter and editor for the Jewish Exponent, an English-language weekly newspaper in Philadelphia in the 1970s.

In addition to featuring survivors' stories, the play also includes characters whose brave acts saved lives during the Holocaust.

"The whole project is not only about learning about the Holocaust but also to encourage young people to speak up about anti-Semitism and all hate," said Miller, who now lives in the Los Angeles area but will be making a trip to Elgin to attend the table reading. "By having kids do staged readings, they really are able to feel the stories."

The professional development session will be attended by all <mark>U-46's high school Language Arts, social studies, and theater teachers</mark>. Illinois requires that each public elementary and high school include in its curriculum a study of Holocaust history.

Representatives from the Illinois Holocaust Museum will also be present to discuss how teachers can use the museum's digital and physical artifacts to allow their students to see history through the eyes of those who experienced it.

Teachers will spend time after the presentations collaborating on how to best utilize these primary and secondary sources in their class lessons. The focus will be creating rigorous lessons that encompass the Illinois State Board of Education's Social Studies Perspectives standards and Language Arts standards centered around character, theme, and supporting main ideas with textual evidence.

About a dozen students active in South Elgin High School's theater program will be conducting the table read on Jan. 27.

They also are performing it at a free event open to the public on the evening of Thursday, Jan. 26, at Congregation Kneseth Israel in Elgin. Students from South Elgin High School's Beacon Academy of Media and Digital Arts are filming the table reads, interviewing Miller, and making a trip to the Illinois Holocaust Museum to create a short documentary.

Jan. 27 was chosen by the United Nations General Assembly as the designated International Holocaust Remembrance Day because it was the date of the liberation of the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp complex in 1945.

Chellettes take fifth out of 17 schools at IHSA 1A South Elgin Sectional

SOUTH ELGIN — Seniors Miranda Dubek and Macy Ramos have danced competitively at Rochelle Township High School for each of the last four seasons. Even with their collective experience, nerves were still high as the seniors looked to lead their team back to the IHSA State Championship meet in Bloomington for an unprecedented fifth consecutive season.

Rochelle was one of the 17 schools in Class 1A vying for a slot in the state meet on Saturday, when the Chellettes took the floor for the IHSA Sectional at South Elgin High School. While there was uncertainty in the room before the show, the emotions became joyful when Rochelle was announced as one of the six finalists for next weekend's state meet. The Chellettes finished fifth out of 17 schools in Class 1A with a score of 78.83 to clinch their berth in the state meet.

"I was extremely nervous because we knew there were a lot of teams there," Dubek said. "There were a lot of tears from us crying when we were announced and I remember Macy turning to me and screaming in my face... We definitely have a reputation that all of the dancers on our team understand and keep up with. When new dancers come in, we get them ready and show them the mindset that we need to have in order to push ourselves far enough to make it to state."

Rochelle's routine is set to the music of Scottish artist Dylan Fraser, whose song "The Storm" booms in the background as the Chellettes move to the music. Senior Abby Dall described the routine as a hard-hitting jazz performance, which teammates said contrasts from the kinds of routines Rochelle has shown in recent years. The 2022-23 season was Rochelle's first under new head coach Haleigh Nelson, who took the competitive program over from Kass Smith.

"It was hard adjusting to a new coach because we were all so fond of Kass and we felt like we had created a family, but we feel like [Haleigh's] a part of our family now," Dall said. "We came together and we learned from girls who came before us that we have to give everything we have because if we don't do that, then we have no chance of making it to state. We give our all during every practice and we motivate each other to give our all and work as hard as we can."

From the music to the choreography and the attire, Rochelle will seek to take the competition by storm when the girls begin their run at the IHSA State Championship, which starts with preliminary performances on Friday before concluding with final performance on Saturday. For the team's senior dancers including four-year members Dubek and Ramos, the competition will serve as one more chance for the girls to share their talents as well as their time together.

"It was a nerve-racking day at the sectional because we weren't sure if we'd make it based on the season we've had," Ramos said. "Hearing our name called made all of us go crazy. I thought our performance went pretty well and even though it wasn't perfect, I felt like we took a huge step forward from where we were earlier in the season. Our routine is a genre of dance that we aren't used to, but we've been able to express ourselves a lot more. I'm excited to perform under the lights one more time and it'll be a really fun experience to have before graduation."
