U-46 pushes back plan to move 6th-graders to middle school buildings until 2025-26 school year

Plans to move District U-46 sixth-graders into middle school buildings will be pushed back a year because of construction-related issues, officials said.

"The delay means that 6th grade will remain a part of elementary school for the next two school years and then become a part of middle school for the 2025-26 school year," district Chief of Staff Brian Lindholm said.

ARCON Associations, the architectural firm converting Hawk Hollow Elementary in Bartlett into a middle school, recently advised the district that problems in scheduling electrical,

mechanical, concrete, steel contractors and obtaining needed materials was going to push their timetable back, he said.

The work includes construction of an addition, and the "longest lead time item at this point is the electrical transformer needed to power the addition," Lindholm said.

In order to complete the work, plans to close <mark>Hawk Hallow</mark> at the end of the school year remain in place so the renovation and building work can be done, <mark>Superintendent Tony Sanders</mark> said in a message he posted online to parents.

Garfield Elementary School will also close at year's end as planned, Lindholm said.

"It will be retired at the end of this school year, and then its students will begin attending either Channing Elementary or Huff Elementary, depending on where they live, for the 2023-24 school year," he said.

Because of the delay, the district will be able to consider updates necessary at some of its other middle schools, especially Elgin-based Ellis, Larsen, Kimball, and Abbott, as they prepare to add a new grade level, Sanders said in his message.

Among the things they're looking at as they plan out what's needed to accommodate more students in buildings, Lindholm said, is confirming "the effective capacities of each building to support this shift, including instructional space, learning commons areas, science labs and cafeterias."

Middle school boundaries also will need to be adjusted as they prepare to make Hawk Hollow the district's ninth middle school and relocate about 2,500 6th-graders into the other middle schools by August 2025, he said.

Simultaneously, administrators will be assessing enrollment forecasts at the elementary and high schools to determine if any other boundary adjustments are needed, Lindholm said.

Additionally, they'll have more time to redesign the middle school day, update curriculum and resources, develop plans for social-emotional learning and provide professional development for teachers, Sanders said.

Since sixth-grade is currently considered an elementary school level, sixth-grade teachers will have an additional year to earn the necessary endorsement needed to teach in middle school or apply for teaching jobs at the elementary level, he said.

Hawk Hollow's switch to a middle school is not predicated on the April 4 election referendum in which voters will be asked to approve the sale of \$179 million in building bonds to pay for up to \$380 million in capital improvements, but other changes are, the superintendent said.

He also reiterated that voters need to be aware that approving the bond sale will not result in property taxes going up.

Dist. U-46 Board approval continues ACE funding

The Board of Education in <mark>School District U-46</mark> voted 6-0, board member Veronica Noland being absent, on \$88,000 in funding for the Alignment Collaborative for Education (ACE) at its Monday, Jan. 9 meeting.

The amount was the same as requested last year by ACE, but its 73 percent higher than the \$51,000 approved in 2021.

In a letter with this request from Nancy Coleman, ACE's executive director, and Bill Wright, ACE's board chairman, ACE states it has reached "over 6,000 students for the calendar year 2022," and the goal is for over 8,000 by May 2023.

ACE expects \$233,645 in revenue for 2022-2023, but no ACE budget was provided. Last year, ACE said it had \$220,000 in revenue with 65 percent going towards two full-time staff, Coleman and executive assistant Adriana Armstrong. A third staff member has been added, according to the letter.

"School District U-46's funding of \$88,000 generously supported 38 [percent] of Alignment's needed operational budget with the remaining 62 [percent] being funded from business, community, municipal, and post-secondary support," the letter stated.

"With that level of support, Alignment was able to add a program manager, Edgar Montes, to the Alignment team, allowing the organization to offer more programming resulting in serving a record number of students."

ACE, comprised of business and government entities with a stated purpose to serve <mark>U-46</mark>, was founded in 2013 with an original promise that it would be fully funded through private donations, but U-46 taxpayers remain the largest individual funders of ACE.

That promise is no longer valid as Coleman made no promises last year not to ask for future increases from the taxpayers saying "the more students that we serve, the more funding that we're going to need."

Completed projects listing provided to U-46 trustees

There was over \$24 million spent on capital projects in School District U-46 last summer.

That was according to Patricia Waldau, director of plant operations, who presented a summary to the Board of Education earlier this school year.

"It was a particularly trying construction year with several unprecedented challenges, from the operating engineer's union strike, material delays and supply chain issues," Waldau said. "But I'm happy to report that even with those obstacles, the plant operations team was able to complete a robust list of capital projects and generate substantial savings from the energy efficiency programs and incentives."

Included was the first phase of an update at Streamwood High School for its pathways program. Auditorium lights were replaced at Bartlett High School.

There were flooring projects, such as library carpet replacement and tiling projects at seven schools, gym floor refinishing at three schools, athletic facilities and stadium upgrades at three high schools, interior upgrades (ceiling, office renovations, etc.) at six buildings, chiller replacements at eight schools, boiler replacements at five schools, parking lot repaving at four locations, exterior upgrades (sidewalk, roofing, etc.) at eight schools and building access and security controls (security access and playground cameras) at 14 schools.

The district saved \$554,820 through incentives and rebates on various projects. It also received \$99,113 through a demand response "reduction event," Waldau said, in which all secondary schools participated in reducing energy consumption on July 6.

"Demand response provides the opportunity for the district to play a significant role in the operation of the electric grid by reducing or shifting our electricity usage during peak periods," Waldau said.

Waldau said the district uses a consultant, ClearResult, for energy management. Additionally, eight sites were Energy Star certified which means the buildings performed in the top 25 percent nationwide with similar buildings for energy conservation.

U-46 also has its own energy incentive program where it awarded five locations for energy conservation resulting in prizes from the district including a roof ladder, custom entry mat, chair dolly/desk mover, commercial freezer, projector screen, revamped sign and snow blower.

Fox boys basketball notes: Lothery, Harvest Christian soaring to new heights

Harvest Christian Academy might be one of the smallest high schools in the area with an enrollment of 165 (according to the IHSA).

That hasn't stopped the Lions from possessing one of the area's top boys basketball records -now 19-5 after Tuesday's 47-40 showdown win over state-ranked South Beloit (16-5).

Coach Bryan Bradshaw's team, fresh off an impressive 69-47 road victory over Richmond-Burton last Saturday, also fields one of the area's top scorers in Ben Lothery. Lothery, a 6-foot-1 senior guard who averages 21 points and 3.3 assists per game this season, continues to improve his all-around game, according to Bradshaw.

"Ben has grown as a scorer," said Bradshaw. "Early on in his career, he was a great three-point shooter. His knack for getting to his spot and in the paint has grown and made him more dangerous as an offensive threat."

How much of an offensive threat is Lothery?

In early December, Lothery poured in a career-high 38 points with seven 3-pointers during the Lions' 90-49 victory over Schaumburg Christian.

Last week, Lothery scored 22 points with five 3-pointers during the Lions' 49-41 overtime loss to Stillman Valley, then returned later that day and scored a team-high 28 points with six 3-pointers, and added 3 assists and 3 steals in Harvest Christian's 66-48 victory over North Boone.

"I always knew that Ben had a great eye for finding open spots and creating opportunities for him and others to score," said Bradshaw. "He has great knowledge of the game and can see plays develop before they happen."

While Lothery has thrived as the Lions' outside shooting threat, 6-4 junior forward Kaden Meeker has provided the team an inside presence.

Meeker scored 15 points with 8 rebounds against Richmond-Burton, and added a near carbon copy with 15 points and 7 boards in the Lions' 44-42 loss to Hinckley-Big Rock last Thursday -- Harvest's first home loss (8-1).

Other contributors include seniors Dan Winkleman, Antonio Wilder, and junior JJ Gonnam.

Gonnam scored 14 points against Richmond-Burton, while Wilder added 11 points on 3-of-3 shooting from beyond the arc, and Winkleman had 9 points on three 3-pointers.

Harvest Christian owns a 5-0 mark in Northeastern Athletic Conference play.

"Our mindset is on finishing the remaining games strong and secure one of the top seeds in our sectional," said Bradshaw. "We will try to be playing our best basketball when regionals roll around."

South Elgin update:

Despite last Saturday's 75-45 non conference loss to Burlington Central, South Elgin remains in Upstate Eight Conference title contention with 3 regular-season weeks remaining.

The Storm (13-9) improved to 10-1 -- tied with Fenton in the UEC -- with last Friday's come-from-behind, 58-56 home triumph over Larkin.

First-year head coach Phil Church's team owns a 5-1 mark in conference games decided by 7 points or fewer, with the lone loss coming at the hands of the Bison (61-60) on Dec. 20.

The UEC co-leaders meet again on Feb. 7 in Bensenville.

"I think I've got the most seniors that people play, regardless of whether they played a lot last year," said Church, who started an all-senior lineup with Sean Harvey, Mason Montgomery, Victor Sison, Jake Tiaokhiao, and Elias Cole Williams against Larkin.

"I think when you look at the scale of the conference right now, and we talk about probably the four purest players who are juniors. You've got two at Bartlett (Kelton McEwen and Nathan Scearce), there's one at Fenton who is hurt (Xavior Gonzalez), and (Larkin's Jakob) Blakley.

"Next year, this conference is going to be loaded, so we'll take the wins while we get them."

Led by Cole Williams and 6-7 forward/center Harvey, South Elgin now finds itself as a team circled on opponents' schedules.

"I think it's a testament to guys who are under the radar and kind of have a chip on their shoulders," said Church. "Now, they're learning to play when that bulls-eye is on their backs."

Larkin update:

Larkin slipped to 9-14 overall following Saturday's 77-43 loss to DuKane Conference front-runner Wheaton Warrenville South (19-2).

One night earlier, the Royals let a 10-point, fourth-quarter lead slip away in their 2 point-loss to South Elgin despite a 28-point effort from junior guard Jakob Blakley.

Now, the defending Upstate Eight champions have set their attention to next month's postseason.

"We're out of the conference race now," said Larkin coach Deryn Carter, whose team is 6-5 in the UEC but 4 games in back of both Fenton and South Elgin.

"All we're trying to do is get ready for a regional championship. Hopefully, we're building up some scars and some calluses and we're ready to go come regional time."

First, the good news.

Elgin update:

Elgin (8-14, 1-10) has doubled its win total from a year ago (4-23) under the direction of first-year Maroons head coach Brett Johnson, and led by junior guard Maddox Hollian.

Now, the not-so-good news.

Weekend defeats at the hands of Kaneland (73-44) and Brooks (59-48) extended Elgin's losing streak to 8.

"I think it's a long process and hopefully come the end of the season and playoff time, we can continue to get better and learn from these losses," said Johnson.

The Maroons host Bartlett (14-8, 7-4) Friday night.

Scharnowski nears 1,000:

After scoring 34 points Tuesday in a 61-45 win over Dundee-Crown, Burlington Central senior Drew Scharnowski is 19 points away from 1,0000.

Examiner of Streamwood – Streamwood girls hoops still seeking consistency

The <mark>Streamwood girls basketball team</mark> struggled to slow down Glenbard East in a 55-22 Upstate Eight Conference loss on Friday, Jan. 20 at Glenbard East.

The <mark>Sabres'</mark> plan coming in was defense, and it worked for nearly the whole first half. Trailing 20-14 in the final minute before halftime, <mark>Streamwood</mark> was facing a manageable sixpoint deficit.

However, Glenbard East hit a pair of three-pointers in that final minute for a 12-point advantage at the break then outscored **Streamwood** 29-8 in the second half.

"We tried to focus on defense and went one-on-one with their top scorer, and we held her to two points in the first half," said Streamwood coach Elizabeth Endriukaitis. "We wanted to make everyone else hit their shots, and I think as soon as they hit those back-to-back threes they felt a sense of relief with that because we were doing a good job on them defensively."

Endriukaitis added: "The second half hits and they go on a run, and again we just can't get over that hump. We're still struggling with some individualism. We've got to get past that and play as a team."

Brianna Coffey led the <mark>Sabres</mark> with eight points, and Leana Williams and Jamia Gatlin both had six.

Endriukaitis said her squad, which is 2-19 overall and 1-10 in the UEC, needs to find consistency.

Streamwood had opened the week with a 60-29 UEC loss to East Aurora on Tuesday, Jan. 17 at Streamwood. The previous week, the Sabres fell 47-15 against West Chicago on Tuesday, Jan. 10 before battling in a tough 61-56 loss to Fenton on Friday, Jan. 13, both those UEC games at Streamwood.

"We went from scoring just 15 against West Chicago to giving Fenton a good run, and that was just an awesome game," Endriukaitis said. "Then we struggle against East Aurora and Glenbard East. We're like Jekyll and Hyde. We play well and then we struggle for two or three games straight. We just have to find consistency."
