Film ties white slave owner to Black relatives

Elgin woman among descendants

The documentary film "Invented, Before You Were Born" follows the story of white siblings Jonathan and Rachel Knight, who discover they are the descendants of Kentucky slave owner Richard Bibb.

The Knights confront their family history and it leads to meeting their relatives, the Black descendants of the people enslaved by the Bibb family, one of whom is Elgin resident Traci O'Neal Ellis, a former School District U-46 board member, Larkin High School alumna and daughter of Ron O'Neal, U-46's first Black principal.

The film will have its Illinois premiere at 4 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 14, at Larkin High School as part of the city of Elgin's 38th annual Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration. Ellis will participate in a panel discussion with filmmakers Jonathan Knight and Le Datta Grimes after the screening.

"I'm really excited about being able to premiere it in Elgin," said Ellis, who first met her white relatives four years ago at a reunion held at the family plantation in Russellville, Kentucky, which is being restored as a museum.

"It's part of my family story," Ellis said. "The documentary filmmaker and I are biologically distant cousins through his family, who were enslavers, and my family, who were enslaved. I am a descendent of both the enslaved and enslavers."

Richard Bibb, a major in the Confederate Army during the Civil War, emancipated his slaves upon his death, she said. A nonprofit now owns the plantation house and has started restoring it as a museum that will tell Bibb's story.

When museum officials reached out to family members about the reunion, many had no idea they were related to Bibb, Ellis said. Her connection is through her maternal grandmother's side of the family, she said.

It was a startling experience to stand in the unventilated room where enslaved women and children would have been kept at the plantation and to view the shackles and original signs advertising slaves as having qualities like good teeth, as if they were selling a horse or a cow, Ellis said.

"I said in the film, 'This is what hell must feel like,' " she said. "The story became real."

Her family's story is "traumatic, but it's also comforting to just know," Ellis said. "I come from people who they tried to break but were unbreakable. They survived unthinkable and unimaginable horrors. They persevered."

Prior to the documentary, her family had no information about their roots or where they came from, she said. "I would wish for everyone to learn who they are," she said.

The Bibb family held another reunion in September, and she and Jonathan Knight have kept in touch over the last four years, Ellis said.

"We've embraced each other — even as distant as we are — as cousins. We have been intentional about staying in touch," she said. "Neither one of us asked for this. Neither one of us had anything to do with the story. "(We're trying to) make something good come out of what is a pretty horrific story."

Topping the charts

<u>David Douglas Jr.</u>, a 6-foot-5 senior guard from Yorkville Christian, is equally adept at slashing to the basket or converting from beyond the arc.
