U-46 eighth graders 'Explore' their futures at expo

While a representative from Colony Display talked about potential careers with the company, eight-grader Kitzya Morales-Tellez closely examined several clear display cases and colorful installations its welders and machinists had created for retail stores.

Before moving on to another exhibit, Kitzya said she's thinking about pursuing the welding educational pathway offered in School District U-46, although she was intrigued as well by several other careers she learned about Thursday at Explore 2022.

The event is U-46's annual expo designed to expose eighth-grade students to various professions and demonstrate the connection between academic curriculum and future careers.

"It's been fun, because they tell us about each program that could lead to careers and jobs when we're older," said Kitzya, a student at Ellis Middle School in Elgin, who was one of more than 2,500 eighth-graders who attended Explore 2022 at the NOW Arena in Hoffman Estates.

Michael Bullerman, Colony's human resources manager, said he enjoyed talking to the students, especially because he graduated from U-46's Streamwood High School.

"I'm really thankful to see something like this happen. I'm glad to be a part of it," Bullerman said. "It gives kids an opportunity to see jobs they may never think of on their own."

The Alignment Collaborative for Education, a nonprofit, local organization that brings together community resources and initiatives to support district priorities, once again partnered with U-46 to organize the event.

"It's all about seeing the excitement on the students' faces about making that career decision that doesn't have to be a final decision, but at least they are beginning to explore what they are interested in as possible career pathways," said Alignment Executive Director Nancy Coleman.

Eighth-grade students from the district's middle schools attended Explore during the school day in two different shifts. Ahead of time, each student worked in Naviance -- a digital college and career planning system -- to learn which career clusters align with their current interests and aptitudes. Using information gathered from Naviance and guided by counselors, students selected two career pathways to focus on.

About 60 local businesses, industries, governmental organizations, and nonprofits had exhibits at Explore and representatives who engaged in discussions with students. In addition, each of the district's five Magnet Academies had exhibits, teachers, and high schoolers present to talk to the students (the application process for Magnet Academies is now open to eighth-graders) and U-46's culinary, health sciences, automotive, welding and precision manufacturing programs were represented as well.

The veterinary assistant program at Burlington Central School District 301 -- which is offered to U-46 students -- brought along a real dog, Monte, who was quite a draw.

Another popular exhibit was brought by HLR, a civil engineering firm. It was a sandbox with a topographic map beamed onto it from a digital projector above.

Students pushed the sand into piles to form hills, valleys, and roads; placing their hands above the sandbox caused "rain" to fall, forming pools of water (represented by blue wavy lines) in the depressions in the sand.

"It was a very good example," Alex Kalinski, a student at Kenyon Woods Middle School in South Elgin, said after spending some time talking to HLR employees. "I liked how they explained and went into depth about everything, and then they gave us details about what you'd need to do if you wanted a job in engineering."

Alex and his friend Michael Lombardo, also an eight-grader at Kenyon Woods, both said they are interested in a career in engineering, and considering whether to apply for the Science, Engineering, and High Technology Magnet Academy at Bartlett High School.

Kunal Modi, a student at Eastview Middle School in Bartlett, said his favorite exhibit at Explore was one from Nicor Gas, although he enjoyed performing CPR on a patient simulator, too.

"Today was very fun," Kunal said. "It gave me some experiences I'd never usually get."

U-46 Superintendent Dr. Tony Sanders greeted students as they exited the school buses that brought them to Explore. After the previous two editions of the event were held virtually because of the COVID-19 pandemic, Dr. Sanders said it was good to be back in person.

"Nothing else can replicate this experience of being a hands-on and interactive introduction to career pathways," Dr. Sanders said. "It's great to be back at the NOW Arena, and I appreciate all our business partners who help make this event possible."

Larkin holds on for 1-point win over Bartlett

Larkin survived.

In a sloppy game for both teams, the Royals made just enough big plays to hold off Bartlett, 21-20, in an Upstate Eight matchup in Bartlett.

Dontain Williams scored for Bartlett to make it 21-20 with 5:29 to play, but Larkin's interior line blocked the extra point attempt to maintain the lead.

The Royals then drove to the Hawks' 21-yard line before turning it over on downs. But the Royals' defense came up big on the next series, stopping Williams for a 1-yard gain on fourth-and-three at the Bartlett 31.

Larkin was able to run the clock down to 40 seconds, giving the Hawks one more chance from their 26 with no timeouts left.

An interference penalty and a 20-yard completion from Giovanni Nguyen to Jalen Davis got the Hawks into Larkin territory, but Nguyen's Hail Mary attempt was batted down at the final buzzer.

Larkin scored all its points in the second quarter. Chevelle Clements scored on runs of 9 and 1 yards, and Jalen Miller added a 6-yarder. Clements' second TD was set up by Timothy Scott III's interception return to the 1-yard line.

The teams combined for 3 interceptions, 3 lost fumbles, and 245 penalty yards.

"We make it so hard on ourselves at times," said Larkin coach Grant Dietz. "We've just got to do the little things better, stay the course, and know that we haven't played our best football."

Larkin (4-3, 4-3) moved one step closer to playoff eligibility.

Bartlett moved the ball in the first half but scored only once -- on Nguyen's 38-yard strike to

Jacob Caradine.

The Hawks (4-3, 4-3) got within 1 score after halftime on a scoop-and-score by Ravi Banipal.

An interception by Marco Incandela set up Williams' score midway through the fourth quarter.

Nguyen completed 14 of 27 passes for 138 yards.

Although the Royals didn't always find the end zone, they were able to control the clock for

large chunks of the game with their ground attack.

Clements finished with exactly 100 yards on 22 carries, Miller had 42 and Kevin Malone added

28.

With a fourth win under their belts, the Royals will take it.

"We've just got to keep playing through all of the adversity that we have," Dietz said, "Whether

it's created by ourselves or anything else."

When: Friday, 7 p.m.

Previous matchup: Larkin 28, Bartlett 21 (2021 at Larkin)

About the Royals: Critical contest for the Royals when it comes to their playoff pursuit -- a pair of wins over the last three weeks are needed to become playoff eligible. "We have to do a better job on the little things of the game and keep up the intensity for four quarters," Larkin coach Grant Dietz said. "We have to do a better job blocking and tackling." Dietz said Michael Bresnen is becoming a leader on defense, while Tim Scott "keeps playing hard and is on the verge of a big game," he said. Also grading out well has been Damani Cannon, "understanding the offense and he is on the verge of a big game," Dietz noted.

About the Hawks: Bartlett, which with a win here becomes playoff eligible, broke a 2-game losing streak with a win over Fenton last week. "Bartlett plays hard," Dietz said. "They are improving each week and they are at home. They run the ball well and play well on defense. We must have stronger attention to our details. We must execute our offense, play hard and fast on defense and special teams. We must play through adversity regardless of the situation."

South Elgin (6-0, 6-0) at Elgin (3-3)

When: Friday, 7 p.m.

Previous matchup: South Elgin 29, Elgin 0 (2021 at South Elgin)

About the Storm: South Elgin sits atop the Upstate Eight as the league's lone remaining unbeaten. "Elgin has a big win already this year, crushing our rival (Bartlett) in Week 4," South Elgin coach Dragan Teonic noted. "They also have one of the best running backs in the conference. We have played Elgin every year since I have been here and they always pose similar issues, athleticism and unpredictability. We will have to tackle well in space and control the line of scrimmage." Junior kicker Bryan Cortez is 9-for-18 on onside kicks this year, "and is exceptional at placing the ball where we need it on all kickoffs," Teonic noted. Teonic also had high praise for the Storm's offensive line of Nathan Dinse, Tommy Roath, Eddie Ramirez, Hyun Jin Ko and Hernan Cortez. "Our offensive line is the reason we are still undefeated," he said. To that point, South Elgin has run the ball 240 times for 1,731 yards (7.2 yards per carry) and has 27 rushing touchdowns spread out across 10 players. The Storm also has lost only 3 fumbles in those 240 chances, while attempting only 81 passes. South Elgin won the toxic ratio (explosives minus turnovers) 11-6 over Glenbard South last week, committing just 1 turnover. An explosive is defined as a pass completion of 25 or more yards and a run of 15 or more.

About the Maroons: "South Elgin is good at what they do and they have depth throughout their team," Elgin coach Anthony Mason said. "They fly to the ball and they are good. We can compete with anyone, we just have to take advantage of our opportunities when given, work hard and execute, and that will allow us to play good football." Mason did note Elgin had a pair of red zone appearances last week against Glenbard East and generated no points. Punter Donovan Vences, a senior, has been playing well. "He had an amazing performance against Glenbard East after struggling against West Chicago in Week 5," Mason said. Vences had 223 punting yards with a long of 42 yards and put 2 punts inside the 20-yard line. Mason also

lauded the play of Matt Lawson. "Matt is everywhere on the field now," Mason said. "He's getting healthier and making plays on special teams, offense and defense."

East Aurora (1-5, 1-5) at Streamwood (1-5, 1-5)

When: Friday, 7 p.m.

Previous matchup: East Aurora 24, Streamwood 17 (2021 at East Aurora)

About the Tomcats: East Aurora holds a 20-14 win over Elgin and lost close conference games this year to Bartlett (21-14) and Larkin (29-21). "Aurora East wants to spread out the defense, but run the ball," Streamwood coach Keith McMaster said. "Our team has to cut out the mental mistakes. It cost us many times in the last game, whether penalties or blown assignments. Three of our losses came from beating ourselves mentally."

About the Sabres: McMaster continued on the subject of blown assignments. "Blown assignments cost us big-time in the last game, he said, referencing last week's 46-24 loss to West Chicago. "This was the most passing yards given up all season." Streamwood sits at minus-14 in the turnover category. "You can't win ballgames without controlling the football or taking it form your opponent," McMaster noted. The coach has been impressed with the play of the sophomores on the varsity, particularly on defense. Juniors Chris Marquez, AJ Trimino and Oscar Villapondo lead the team in tackles. "We are taking some lumps this season, but this team is young and can hopefully grow from this season," McMaster said. Streamwood did run for 241 yards last week. Jaiden Thomas had 110 yards on 23 carries and scored a touchdown, while John Ray scored 2 rushing touchdowns. Thomas also ran in a pair of 2-point conversions, while Juan Cortes enjoyed a 2-point run as well. Cortes ran for 80 yards on 18 carries.
