Prospect routs 16-team field

Prospect continued to flex its collective tournament wrestling muscle with a dominating performance at the 62nd Mudge-McMorrow Invitational Saturday afternoon inside Jean Walker Fieldhouse in Mt. Prospect.

The Knights crushed an impressive 16-team field when it scored 253 overall points with five individual titles and nine top three medals to outscore runner-up Joliet Catholic Academy (186.5) and third place Libertyville with 158.5 points.

"We have just about everyone back, and healthy, so there's no reason why we cannot compete with anyone in the state," said Knights senior Will Baysingar, who smashed his rivals at 132.

Elijah Garza gave the Knights the perfect start with his 106-pound championship, followed by Lennon Steinkuhler (138), Damien Puma (152) and Connor Munn (160).

Libertyville's Austin Gomez won at 182 while his teammate Owen McGrory claimed his title at 220.

"I'm lucky to have great teammates in the room, which helped me win my first tournament of my career," said the affable McCrory, who outlasted Casey Bending of Fremd, 7-5.

Sophomore Evan Gosz, No. 3 in the state at 126 pounds, showed why he enjoys his lofty status after his marvelous three-match effort to win his second major of the season.

Anthony Alanis (113) and Aaron Cramer (195), the dynamic duo from Grayslake Central, who

both were 2A state runners-up last season, gave the Rams their two titles on Saturday.

Alanis would decision Jason Hampton from Joliet Catholic Academy, 5-2, while Cramer, who recently committed to wrestle next season at SIU-Edwardsville, won a tough contest with Prospect freshman Jaxson Penovich, 4-3.

"In the end, it was my fitness that was the difference, despite the fact that I am getting over a respiratory infection," said Cramer, who went 47-2 a year ago.

At Hoffman Estates:

Over at the Mickey Marchese Memorial Tournament at host Hoffman Estates, it was Mundelein who would lift the championship trophy by a wide margin over runner-up Lane Tech.

The duo of Bryce Durlacher (120) and Benji Albavera (126) would lead the Mustangs with their individual titles to help their club collect 190 points, 51 more than Lane Tech (149), Machesny Park Harlem (135) and fourth place South Elgin (129.5).

Durlacher (40-4), who was fifth a year ago at the state tournament, beat James Zavala (Lane) 7-4 to run his record to 14-1, while his teammate Albavera registered an early pin to win his title.

"The experience of placing at the state tournament a year ago has given me the confidence (knowing) I can compete with the best in my weight class this season," said Durlacher, who hopes to follow in the footsteps of his older brother Dane, who wrestled at Illinois, and is currently a Mundelein assistant.

South Elgin senior Nico Clinite (145, 13-2) won his second straight championship here with a fall at 3:39, while his teammate, freshman Demetrios Carerra (14-1), won at 106.

Senior Josh Ellery (11-3) would treat the home crowd to a win at 195 with a pin, with No. 4

seed Skip Rozanski winning at 170.

Wheeling junior Patrick Tinsley (12-5), a 2A state qualifier a year ago, was the 132-pound champ.

Girls gymnastics: Carmel, Arends take titles at Conant

Ten minutes before the start of Carmel Catholic's vault rotation at Saturday's Conant girls gymnastics invite, Corsairs coach Sarah Mikrut Doyle went to work -- as an on-the-spot athletic trainer.

Doyle unsnarled gobs of tape from a pair of her Corsairs' ankles and legs. She then wrapped fresh tape around and around the same body parts.

"No idea, but it's probably a lot," Doyle said of the number of miles of tape she has applied to her gymnasts during a decorated coaching career.

"She does such a good job," Carmel freshman Alyssah Arends said of Doyle, the medical professional. "I'm not hurt; taping my ankles before vault helped me gain confidence."

The tale of the taped-up Corsairs on Saturday: secure, steady, sturdy, splendid.

Again.

Doyle's dandy athletes topped the 12-team field with a score of 143.425 points. Lake Park silvered (139.5), followed by Warren (139.2), Lincoln-Way co-op (136.05) and Lake Zurich

Carmel junior Sarah Arends (Alyssah's sis) paced the champs, capturing the all-around title (37.575) and garnering gold on the uneven bars (9.3) and balance beam (9.4).

"Our team's warmup session this morning was not good, not good at all," recalled Sarah Arends, who underwent ankle surgery in late March. "We struggled. But we regrouped, and a lot of that had to do with our coach getting us together and telling us to have faith over fear."

Warren senior Amanda Hamann -- a Carmel varsity gymnast as a freshman and still a big Doyle fan -- has talent and strength and speed, plus a Yurchenko-layout vault in her repertoire. No wonder she dashed, pounced, flew and landed her way to a first-place 9.725 in the sport's quickest event.

"I'm hoping to perform a layout full at our next invite (Jan. 4)," said Hamann, who tied for fourth place on vault at last winter's state meet and hopes to make the University of Iowa women's gymnastics team as a walk-on next winter.

"The vault doesn't scare me," the Blue Devil added. "Beam? That gets me jittery, a little."

Junior three-sport athlete Haylie Hinckley, of Wheaton's co-op squad, displayed steely resolve during her field-topping 9.55 floor exercise. She added a leap ahead of her first tumbling pass and described her music as "mysterious, dark and fun" afterward.

Hamann edged Hinckley 37.225-37.2 for runner-up honors in the all-around. Lake Park juniors Julia Bartnik (37) and Cali Keefe (35.950) finished 4-5.

"Julia," Lake Park coach Jake Luketin said, "is such a mentally strong kid. An injury forced her to miss her entire freshman season, and then she put in the work -- the hard work -- to make sure she was ready for her sophomore season."

Bartnik qualified for state on beam last winter, executing a first-place 9.225 routine atop the

unforgiving log at the LP sectional.

"If there's weakness in any of Julia's routines, she works to eliminate it," Luketin said.

Wheaton co-op finished sixth (132.25), followed by Conant (124.55), Schaumburg (123.975), Bartlett U46 co-op (123.625), Geneva (122), Prospect (120.9) and Hoffman Estates (118.4).

Dixon helps Geneva get back on track with win over St. Charles North

"He didn't play at all last year [on varsity], so this offseason, he made a goal," Geneva senior guard Mick Lawrence said of Dixon following Geneva's 61-45 victory over St. Charles North on Saturday.

Dixon finished with 17 points and four rebounds, as the Vikings got back on the winning track three days after a loss to Wheaton Warrenville South that was within a pair of possessions deep in the fourth quarter.

"He really wanted to play some more," Lawrence said of Dixon. "He really put in that work. He came out [this season], worked on his shot [and] really got bigger. He's been playing with way more confidence."

Lawrence saw Dixon beginning to emerge during a 58-55 loss to Bartlett on Nov. 29.

"He started to get in his own groove," Lawrence said. "He started getting aggressive ... so [it's] been kind of carrying on ever since then and being way more aggressive."

Geneva coach Scott Hennig echoed many of those exact sentiments.

"He's just a kid, who first of all, had a great offseason," Hennig said. "He got stronger. He got quicker. Put a lot of time in and it's starting to show on the court. Thought this was [his] best game so far. He's had some moments. He played really well over at Bartlett. I don't think he played terrible against Wheaton South. I thought he was a presence."

Giovenco's rise gives boost to emerging Elgin

Senior forward Micah Giovenco has been working hard with new Elgin coach Brett Johnson ever since Johnson took on the job of trying to turn around his alma mater.

A main point of emphasis was improving Giovenco's ability to finish around the rim.

Lo and behold, with 44 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter Friday night, Giovenco received the perfect opportunity to put all of those lessons learned to good use.

"I couldn't find anyone open," Giovenco said. "I had to do something. I knew we were down one. I had to go get some.

"He was giving me the paint, so I went straight through."

The host Maroons trailed all game until Giovenco drove to the basket and finished off a layup, clinching a 45-42 Upstate Eight Conference win over Streamwood.

"It was one heck of a night," Giovenco said. "I'm proud of our team. We fought real hard."

Johnson lauded Giovenco's effort after the win.

"I'm so proud of Micah," Johnson said. "For the skills he started with and how much he's improved, he is the glue that holds us together on both ends.

"He is constantly trying to go get the ball. He has no quit in him, and it shows."

The Maroons (3-4, 1-2) were down throughout, but Streamwood (0-8, 0-3) still only held a 42-38 lead in the final minutes.

Maddox Hollian hit a 3-pointer with 1 minute, 32 seconds left to bring Elgin within 42-41. Then Giovenco put the Maroons ahead with his only basket of the quarter.

Hollian, who ended up with 14 points, sealed the win on a layup with 26 seconds left.

Streamwood coach Quentin Ruff, who was an assistant at Elgin the past two seasons, knows all about Giovenco.

"Micah is a great kid," Ruff said. "He went down and made a great play. He's a big body. He's not the greatest finisher, so he actually surprised me with the way he finished that basket."

Johnson is starting to see performances like this from Giovenco on a regular basis. He led all scorers with 17 points.

"For him to have another game in a row where he's been productive, I'm excited for him," Johnson said.

Johnson is also hoping to bring the Maroons back to prominence. They won only one conference game each of the past two seasons and are coming off a 4-23 record.

That's what was waiting for Johnson when he took the job.

"They want to change what has been here before," he said of his players. "The effort is there. The intensity and desire are there.

"They're starting to get it. Wins will follow."

Johnson put the onus on the players to initiate changing the culture, which Giovenco embraces.

"All these guys want it," Giovenco said. "I know we all want it. We played like we wanted it and we showed it. I'm proud of our team."

Terrell Young and Joshua Wilder each scored nine points to lead Streamwood.

"The big thing I told them in there is we haven't gotten a chance to be in this position," Ruff said. "The great thing about this is you just learn from it.

"We have to make sure we don't make the same mistakes."

Johnson arrived from South Elgin and made an immediate impression on the team. The results are starting to show.

"He's a great guy — love him," Giovenco said. "The coaches want it just as badly as us. You love to see that from a coach."

The roots of that desire to win for Johnson started in Chesbrough Field House.

"It's surreal to be here 20 years after I graduated, coaching in this gym," Johnson said. "It's really exciting to be here (to) try to change the culture and get basketball back to where it can be."
