Elgin area braces for strong winds and sub-zero temps after first winter storm dumps holiday snow

Flakes began falling about 10 a.m. Thursday across the Elgin area, the start to the area's first snowstorm of the winter that brought with it gusty winds, an arctic air blast and dangerous wind chills.

The forecast prompted early closings for local schools, libraries and government offices, additional hours for the Elgin warming shelter and Elgin's Congregation Kneseth Israel decision to move its services online so congregants wouldn't have to brave the elements.

"The weather is certainly wintery, and in the interest of keeping everyone safe and warm, (our synagogue) will be closed until Tuesday, Dec. 27," Rabbi Margaret Frisch Klein said in a social media post Thursday morning.

Local police cautioned people to avoid traveling over the next few days, if possible.

"The first significant snow tends to be more problematic as drivers get used to driving in hazardous weather conditions," Elgin police Sgt. Mike Martino said. "As is the case in any snow event, we recommend that if you have to drive, please leave early and give yourself extra time and use extra caution on the roadways. We want people to get to their destinations safely over the holidays."

Elgin's Public Works Department staff started preparing for the storm Monday, Assistant City Manager Karina Nava said. "Crews have been anti-icing city streets Tuesday and Wednesday in advance of the weather," Nava said.

Anti-icing involves putting down a liquid mixture of salt brine, calcium chloride and beet juice prior to a snowfall to help prevent snow and ice from bonding to pavement, she said.

Once the snow started falling, Elgin crews went into a plowing rotation that was to stay in effect for the duration of the storm.

Nava suggested residents check Elgin's Facebook page for updates and offered cold-weather reminders, such as exercising extreme caution if going out is necessary.

"Snow routes are being enforced," she said. "Any car parked along a designated snow route, which is marked with signs, will be ticketed and towed if left for 24 hours after two or more inches of snow have fallen."

In advance of the storm, several government bodies announced plans for early closures.

While School District U-46 kept its regular class schedule Thursday, the last day before winter break, Algonquin-based Community School District 300 opted to close its buildings at 1 p.m.

Elgin Community College also shut its locations and facilities early, closing at noon Thursday and remaining closed through Tuesday for winter recess.

The Gail Borden Public Library District had decided by Wednesday afternoon that it would lock the doors on its Elgin and South Elgin locations at 5 p.m. Thursday and to stay closed Friday. With plans already in place to not open Saturday and Sunday for the holidays, officials told patrons to not worry about returning items until next week as drop-off bins won't be available.

Also closing early were the Fox Valley Public Library District branches, the Kane County

Courthouse and Circuit Clerk's Office, and all Kane County nonemergency departments, all of

which will remain closed until next week.

The temporary emergency warming shelter at First United Methodist Church, 216 E. Highland

Ave., was to open at 7 p.m. Thursday and remain open through 7 a.m. Friday before opening

again at 4 p.m. Friday and remaining open until 7 a.m. Monday.

The National Weather Center forecast predicted about 3 inches of snow could come with the

storm as well as overnight wind gusts up to 30 mph, an overnight low temperature of 8-below

and wind chills as low as 15 below.

More snow is possible Friday, with wind gusts climbing to 45 mph causing blizzard conditions.

The daytime high Friday was expected to be 1-below and wind chills will feel like 35-below, the

forecast said.

46th Ed Ewoldt Invite at WW South

When: Dec. 29

Skinny: Lincoln-Way East will look to repeat during this one-day event, however Lyons

Township is the likely favorite in this 16-team field which includes Downers Grove North,

Elgin, Hoffman Estates, Larkin, Waubonsie Valley, West Chicago, Wheeling and host WW

South.

Competition will begin at 9 a.m., with finals scheduled approximately at 2 p.m.

Donald Flavin Invite at DeKalb

When: Dec. 29/30

Skinny: This two-day mega-tournament is a must-see for area fans with an eve-popping field

that boasts six of the top eight 3A teams in the state, and the top two in 2A, Joliet Catholic

Academy and Washington.

No. 1 Marist, followed by No. 3 Marmion Academy, No. 4 St. Charles East, No. 4 Lockport, No.

7 Yorkville and No. 8 Prospect gives this tournament enough star power to light up the sky.

There are several returning state champions here as well, beginning with No. 1 Ben Davino (St.

Charles East) and Marmion Academy senior Jameson Garcia, who could meet at some point if

both stay at 126 pounds.

Oklahoma State-bound Brayden Thompson (Lockport) is the No. 2 man in the country at 182, while senior and Illinois-bound Will Baysingar will lead a power-packed club from Prospect that will look to make their mark here.

51st Midlands

When: Dec. 28/29

Skinny: While this high profile tournament is a college tournament, fans will flock to the NOW Arena to see some of the best collegiate men and women, including several who have enjoyed memorable prep careers in the area.

Former Illinois State champions Eric Barone (Crystal Lake South), Trevor Chumbley (Marmion Academy), Michael Cullen (Cary-Grove), Markus Hartman (Barrington), Will Lewan (Montini Catholic), Patrick Schoenfelder (Antioch) and Matt Wroblewski (Prospect) have all competed at this marvelous tournament that moved back to Hoffman Estates after one year on the campus of Northwestern University.

Mikey Caliendo, state champion from Batavia, and currently No. 12 in the nation at 165 pounds at North Dakota State will likely be a part of an extraordinary field of a list of talent that will be released soon.

Both the men's and women's final session on Friday evening is set to begin at 6 p.m.

Scouts? South Elgin's Sean Harvey gives opposition something to talk about against Fenton. 'It's all about experience.'

South Elgin's Sean Harvey did his best to mentally prepare for this season, knowing that every situation he might encounter on the court would be a new experience.

Harvey is one of five seniors who sat behind a veteran starting lineup last season, so the lanky 6-foot-8 forward knew his life on the varsity was about to change.

"I knew it was something I couldn't wait to get used to," Harvey said. "I knew I had to get into that mindset early on. It's definitely an adjustment.

"Coach told us early in the season, you guys pretty much didn't see any playing time last year. You're going to get scouted for the first time."

Harvey gave the scouts something to talk about Tuesday night for the host Storm during a 61-60 Upstate Eight Conference loss to Fenton.

Putting together one of the best performances of his burgeoning career, Harvey ended up 9-for-16 from the field and scored a team-high 22 points for South Elgin (6-6, 5-1).

Harvey, who missed parts of the fourth quarter with leg cramps, shot 2 of 5 from 3-point range. He showed off an array of moves in the high post, working a midrange game and even getting into the lane for a dunk.

"We knew what they were going to give us so we had a game plan going into it," Harvey said. "I knew I was going to get some looks. I just had to make sure I stepped up and capitalized on them."

South Elgin trailed 53-44 going into the fourth quarter.

The Storm opened the fourth on an 11-0 run, however, clamping down on defense to the point that Fenton (9-3, 6-0) was held scoreless until the 2:45 mark as South Elgin took a 55-53 lead.

Harvey started the rally with a layup. Shailen Shukti followed with a 3-pointer and Elias Cole-Williams hit a pair of free throws. Then the defense started to pay off.

After forcing only two turnovers the first three quarters, the Storm grabbed a 55-53 lead as Victor Sison and Shukti scored on consecutive layups off steals. Sisson finished with 16 points.

"I thought we struggled early with on-ball defense," South Elgin coach Philip Church said. "We got beat to the basket pretty easily. The guys stepped up in the second half, took the challenge and did a better job."

Harvey forced a 57-57 tie on a jumper from the wing with 1:04 left. Fenton responded with four points in the final minute to push the lead to 61-57.

<u>Mason Montgomery</u> hit a 3-pointer with two seconds left to cut the deficit to one, but the Storm were out of timeouts and time expired.

"That is the learning piece with those guys," Church said. "We can't just be bailed out by a timeout like you did in a JV game or a sophomore game a few years ago. It doesn't quite work like that anymore."

That's what Harvey took out of the tough loss.

"It's all about experience, really," Harvey said. "It's not about that last possession. It's about finding different possessions every quarter.

"Coach always says win by two possessions every quarter and that's a double-digit win. We'll look at some film and find where we can get those possessions."

South Elgin plays Fremd on Thursday, weather permitting, before heading next week to the Hinkle Holiday Classic at Jacobs.

Harvey hopes the **Storm** can find some answers.

"It's going to be a lot of stuff, just seeing what did we prepare for, did we execute and what can we do next time?" Harvey said. "A lot of that is applying ourselves in practice and in game prep.

"We're not used to it yet. Once we adjust to this new high-level game we'll be a lot more prepared."

Blakely's back: After taking it slowly, Jakob Blakely returns from knee injury to boost Larkin past Streamwood. 'It all paid off.'

Larkin's <u>Jakob Blakely</u> entered the summer as one of the top junior guards in Illinois.

And then came the injury.

Over the past few months, as the 6-foot Blakely worked his way through the arduous rehabilitation process, moments of doubt understandably crept into his mind.

"It was really discouraging," Blakley said. "You're really limited as to what you can do. Part of you kind of thinks that you won't be back.

"You keep on working every day, take it day-by-day, baby steps, and you end up back on the court."

That moment came Wednesday night for Blakley. He led all scorers with 18 points and added four steals for the Royals in a 70-29 Upstate Eight Conference win over Streamwood.

Although Larkin coach <u>Deryn Carter</u> said Blakely had been cleared for a couple of weeks, the <u>Royals</u> played it slow in what is a critical season for Blakley's college future.

<u>Darnell Wilder</u> added 16 points for <u>Larkin</u> (4-6, 3-3). Genaud Phillips led <u>Streamwood</u> (0-11, 0-6) with nine points.

"It felt great to be out there and give my team a win, especially with the energy I brought," Blakley said. "It definitely paid off, all the physical therapy hours, the weightlifting, all the basketball work.

"It all paid off. I was happy to be back out there to show that it paid off."

Without Blakely, Larkin was up and down with a brand-new lineup.

Having him back, however, brought it all together in one of the most complete performances of the season for the Royals, whose stifling defense forced 25 turnovers.

"He brings a lot of things to the table," Carter said of Blakely. "But there were a lot of other things that we brought to the table that he alone didn't do.

"He brought out the spirit of the team, the enthusiasm of the team. He's a leader for a reason. Those other guys brought it, too. He was the leader of that, and that's what we expected out of him."

Carter was always there as Blakley slowly worked his way back.

"Just because of the athlete he is, he was actually cleared for a few weeks," Carter said. "We slow played it, and rightfully so. He's got a lot riding on it. That's an expensive knee.

"We're excited because now that he's back, he's back."

Blakley scored his first basket at the 2:46 mark of the first quarter, fittingly on a layup after a steal. He then hit an 18-footer from the wing and converted a driving layup.

All of those baskets came during a 16-3 burst that opened a 20-12 lead early in the second quarter.

Blakley added seven more points in the second quarter as Larkin took a 38-19 lead into halftime. He scored five more points in the third quarter before sitting down.

"I knew he was going to be out of shape," Streamwood coach Quentin Ruff said of Blakely. "I knew he was going to be rusty. But he still has an effect on the game, very much.

"It was good to see him out there."

It was a special night for Ruff, a 2013 Larkin graduate who went up against his former coach for the first time.

"This was one for the books," Ruff said. "Something I'll remember regardless of the scoreboard."

Now that Blakley is back and his injury is behind him, Carter believes it's just another chapter in his journey.

"Not to speak for him, but in a weird way, when it's all said and done, it's going to be a road he's going to say was a big piece of where he's going to end up," Carter said. "Whether it was a little bit of a reset, sitting on the sidelines, watching things, he approached it the right way.

"In the big picture, it's going to be a positive."

LePage will be plenty busy watching his freshman daughter, Laken, play for the Gators' girls varsity basketball team in the Northern Illinois Holiday Classic at Johnsburg (through Dec. 22), while coaching his senior son, Cooper, as the Gators compete in the Hinkle Holiday Tournament (Dec. 27-30) at Jacobs.

Please excuse Crystal Lake South boys basketball coach Matt LePage if he forgets what day it is over the next week or so.

LePage will be plenty busy watching his freshman daughter, Laken, play for the Gators' girls varsity basketball team in the Northern Illinois Holiday Classic at Johnsburg (through Dec. 22), while coaching his senior son, Cooper, as the Gators compete in the Hinkle Holiday Tournament (Dec. 27-30) at Jacobs.

Dundee-Crown plays host to its 39th annual Charger-Komaromy Classic (Dec. 26-29), which includes Huntley (11-1), Hampshire, South Elgin, and St. Charles North. Huntley opens against Buffalo Grove at 2:30 p.m. on Dec. 26, while the North Stars face Maine West at 5:30 p.m. on Dec. 26. South Elgin faces Maine South at 10 a.m. on Dec. 26, while Hampshire plays Lake Park afterward at 11:30 a.m.

Batavia and Geneva are headed to the Fremd Invite at Morton Community College (Dec. 27-30), with the Bulldogs squaring off against Lincoln-Way West at 5 p.m. on Dec. 27, while the Vikings face Marist earlier that day at 12:15 p.m.

"We really look forward to Christmas basketball," said Geneva coach Sarah Meadows. "There's great talent at this tournament, and it's a great challenge for us."

On the boys side, Elgin and Jacobs will stay home for the holidays as tournament hosts.

Aurora Christian heads to Bloomington for the State Farm Classic (Dec. 27-30); Aurora Central Catholic, Elgin, Elgin Academy, and Westminster Christian play at Elgin (Dec. 27-30); Bartlett, Cary-Grove, Larkin, and Streamwood join CLSouth at Jacobs (Dec. 27-30).

Geneva, Dundee-Crown, and Huntley play in the Chuck Dayton Tournament at DeKalb (Dec. 27-30).

"Playing at DeKalb allows us to play different teams and styles," said Geneva coach Scott Hennig. "We won't play any teams from the DuKane Conference.

"It's a great tournament, and the DeKalb athletic department runs a first-class event."

Batavia plays in the Jack Tosh Invite at York (Dec. 26-30); Harvest Christian is in the EC Nichols Tournament at Marengo (Dec. 22-23, 27-28); Hampshire competes in the Wheeling Tournament (Dec. 27-30); and St. Charles East opens against H-F on Friday at the Hinsdale Central Holiday Classic (Dec. 23, 26-28).

"We see teams we don't normally see," said Saints coach Patrick Woods. "We kind of treat it like a mini-state tournament.

"One of the best teams I had here that made it to the sectional finals -- we went o-4 in that holiday tournament. I don't think people realize that but it just got us better."

Burlington Central, Marmion, and Kaneland drew the top 3 seeds at the 59th annual Plano Christmas Classic (Dec. 27-30).

"The atmosphere at Plano is second to none," said Rockets coach Brett Porto. "If you're fortunate to advance throughout the tournament, the crowds fill up the bleachers like nowhere else around.

"The players love to be in that environment, and there are few places that can provide that nowadays."

St. Charles North and West Aurora head to the 91st Pontiac Holiday Tournament (Dec. 28-30).

"I like everything about that tournament," said North Stars coach Tom Poulin, whose team opens against top-seeded Simeon at 7:30 p.m. on Dec. 28. "It's the first one ever in America. They talk about having had to take five years off for World Wars.

"The town shuts down. The most important thing in the world is the tournament that week. They treat you like pros. They launder your uniforms, pay for your meals, pay for your hotels, and pay for your gas. You don't pay a dime. They just take care of you."

The competition is second to none, as well.

"You're going to run into Simeon, Curie, New Trier, Benet, OPRF, (Peoria) Manual, Bloom -- it's just amazing," said Poulin. "I love it."

Not one but two hard-throwing pitchers from the same high school baseball team selected in the MLB draft and wooed by millions in signing bonuses?

Unprecedented.

A basketball recruit choosing one of America's blue blood programs?

Not unprecedented but still rare.

The best choice for No. 1?

Flip a coin.

Here are the Aurora and Elgin area's top 10 stories of the year in boys sports:

10. Breakthrough performance on the mat

That didn't take long. Powered by individual champion <u>Jackson Gillen</u> (170 pounds) and runner-up <u>Isaac Bourge</u> (120), Yorkville Christian <u>won the Class 1A dual meet state title</u> in the wrestling program's second season. The school's first state trophy, it was matched only a few weeks later by the basketball team.

9. Five wrestlers reach state podium's top step

Four area wrestlers joined Gillen in capturing individual state titles. <u>Jameson Garcia</u>, a junior from Marmion who has since committed to Harvard, won the Class 3A title at 113. St. Charles East sophomore <u>Ben Davino</u> won the Class 3A championship at 120 and added a national freestyle title over the summer. In Class 2A, Aurora Christian seniors <u>Joe Fernau</u> (126) and <u>Braden Stauffenberg</u> (152) also won championships.

8. Batavia wins state title in track

Batavia coach <u>Dennis Piron</u> added to a legacy that includes two state football titles when his track team <u>won the Class 3A championship</u>. Wins from <u>Jalen Buckley</u> in the triple jump and the 1,600 relay of <u>Vincie Solano</u>, <u>Jake Hohmann</u>, <u>Drew Gerke</u> and <u>Jonah Fallon</u> led the way.

7. Yorkville Christian wins state in basketball

Hardened <u>by a challenging schedule</u> filled with quality Class 3A and 4A opponents, Yorkville Christian was more than prepared for a thrilling run to <u>the Class 1A state championship</u>.
