### **Illinois P-20 Network expands focus to include educator retention**

**Feb. 2, 2023**

For nearly a decade NIU has been home to the Illinois P-20 Network – a partnership of educators, policymakers and researchers who work with learners across the lifespan, from newborns and toddlers to higher education and ongoing adult education. The network's goal is to ensure that all Illinois residents benefit from the best possible learning experiences throughout their lives.

In the past two years, the P-20 Network has continued to grow – as of this fall, the Network represented 248 organizations, 1,645 schools, 98,460 educators and more than a million students throughout the state, and it continues to grow with new partners across Illinois

This past fall, at the network's first in-person meeting in just over three years, one particular concern was central: the educator shortage that's affecting Illinois and the rest of the U.S. The network of educators, K-12 school administrators, and community college and NIU faculty confirmed the issue was worth adding to their primary areas of focus. Now Educator Retention is a central focus of the network's work, along with Equity and Opportunity, Research and Data, and College and Career Readiness.

As Dean Elish-Piper recounted, at the core of the work of the NIU College of Education sits the responsibility to serve educators throughout their careers – beginning while they are still adolescents and starting to think about their careers, continuing through their postsecondary preservice education and into both formal graduate learning opportunities and professional learning opportunities for inservice educators. Additionally, as retirees have become integral members of our professional teams in school districts and postsecondary institutions, the College continues to innovate and develop new ways for those who have retired to continue to offer their expertise to our profession and for the good of students. The College is increasingly focused on engaging with educators throughout their careers, and this is also aligned with supporting educator retention.

According to Rodrigo López, NIU's new director of P-20 Initiatives, teacher retention is closely tied to the network's other central goals – especially Equity and Opportunity.

“We’re seeing a pattern right now where many educators are leaving” says López. “We’re noticing a steep drop off of educators in all types of districts during their first few years of teaching. Some are leaving the profession entirely, while others are seeking positions with greater support, resources and opportunities for staff. In order to provide equitable learning opportunities for all students across Illinois, we must stop this trend and work to encourage experienced, talented educators to stay, especially in low-income schools.”

While the educator shortage is complex, the P-20 Network fall meeting offered a range of exciting ideas and practical solutions for recruiting and retaining educators.

The meeting began with a series of short presentations by researchers and practitioners focused on targeted ways to recruit and retain teachers.

Dr. Laura Hedin, chair of the NIU Department of Special and Early Education, and Bob Cofield, director of school partnerships at Waubensee Community College, addressed creative ways to expand the career pipeline for people who might become licensed teachers.

Hedin discussed how colleges and universities can build a program to help paraprofessionals (who typically have an associate degree and work under a licensed teacher to offer student support services) become licensed teachers. Cofield detailed how to build a 1+1+2 program leading to teacher licensure – in other words, a program that involves one year of college credit during high school, followed by one year at a community college and two years of study at a university.

West Leyden High School Principal Arturo Senteno, Community Consolidated School District 21 teacher Alyson Sprehe and School District U-46 Assistant Superintendent Dr. Teresa Lance then addressed the issue of teacher retention, discussing how to support Latinx teachers and veteran teachers to increase retention, and how to recruit and retain a diversified teacher workforce.

Breakout sessions followed that allowed participants to engage in detailed discussions of topics such as teacher mentoring, diversification of the teacher workforce, dual credit teacher credentialing, and avoiding chutes out of the profession.

The practical application of research, and understanding of how policies impact schools and classrooms and the relationships that the P-20 Network offers have been essential for the wide-range of education organizations that comprise the Illinois P-20 Network. This explains why the network has grown from 65 organizations to nearly 250 in the past three years alone.

Ben Greer III, Associate Director for Adult Education and Program Support Specialist on the Illinois Community College Board says the fall meeting “was a wonderful opportunity to join in active conversations focusing on the educator shortage. The

commitment of the P-20 Network to supporting professionals will result in a high-quality educational system that benefits all learners in our state.”

Dr. Melissa Byrne, Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning in Barrington District 220, says, “The fall P20 Network meeting focused on the educator shortage and teacher retention was a great way to connect with colleagues throughout the region who are going through similar experiences recruiting, hiring, and retaining diverse, high quality staff. The opening sessions were thought provoking and perspective giving as to why students need to see themselves reflected in their teachers. Additionally, the breakout sessions allowed for participants to take a deeper dive into data and discuss dilemmas we are facing as districts. The closing activity afforded groups the opportunity to brainstorm priorities and next steps as we engage in this important work. In Barrington 220, our team has used what we learned to begin developing work areas in our strategic priority of inclusive education, including exploring the development of a grow your own teacher preparation program through our education pathway.”

As the Illinois P-20 Network moves into 2023, they welcome the opportunity to partner with NIU faculty and staff to continue collecting meaningful data and offering practical solutions for school districts, community colleges, other universities and state educational agencies. Since 2009, he has been an active member of the Illinois Principals Association, whose mission is to develop, support, and advocate for innovative educational leaders.

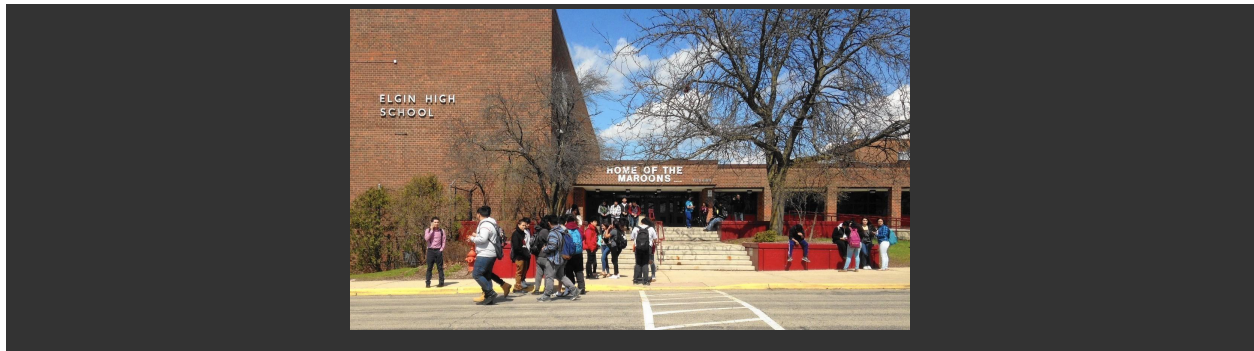
Spacone received the award on Jan. 25 at the Illinois Principals Association Kishwaukee Region Awards Ceremony in West Dundee.

### Arctic plants, environmental law and, yes, polar bears among topics of month-long science webinars at Elgin High School

Two environmental science teachers and their students at **Elgin High School** are overseeing a month-long series of webinars they say will help beat cabin fever, impart knowledge and, in some cases, maybe even offer a little sunshine along with the topic at hand.

“And all the webinars are free for anyone to attend,” said **teacher Brittney Mallen**.

The webinars are, collectively, part of National Biodiversity Teach-In, a virtual event produced by **Elgin High School** environmental science teachers and students for the past 10 years.

“This year, we will have seven speakers, every Friday in February,” said **EHS senior Ashka Patel**. “The teach-in will include a day where all of our presenters are women in order to honor the International Day of Women and Girls in Science.”

Patel is working on publicity for the teach-in. The teachers said that the 90 environmental sciences students at **EHS** are involved in pretty much every aspect of the event.

Mallen said the students reached out to scientists, organizations and people they think might make for good guests. A rotating group of 15 students heads over to the **School District U-46 administration building** on the February Fridays to be the crew overseeing the webcasts.

“In the 10 years, we have had 110,000 participants and over 27 countries have been part of this project,” Patel said.

**Teacher Brigid Trimble** said that has included students viewing together in a classroom at a university in Greece and even someone from Iran.

“The person from Iran had been blocked by the government, so the **Elgin High students and Tony Romero, an IT specialist** for the district, helped them navigate through a firewall,” Trimble said.

The array of presenters this year will come from as far away as India, the teachers said. The topics covered will include Arctic plants, environmental law, polar bears, wolves, elephants, snow leopards, amphibians, sharks, whales and bats.

Mallen said **EHS alum Autumn McGowan**, who has a fellowship with the Michigan chapter of The Nature Conservancy, will discuss reefs of the Great Lakes on Feb. 17.

Among those presenting on all-woman Friday, Feb. 10, will be Jillian Morris, a marine biologist and a shark conservationist; Bonnie Hamilton, who studies contaminants in the Arctic; Thea Bechshoft, who studies polar bear ecology; and Deanna Leonard, who focuses on whales.

Closing out the teach-in on Feb. 24 will be Rebecca Shaw, chief scientist and senior vice president at the World Wildlife Fund.

Jordan Gray, from the Turtle Survival Alliance in South Carolina, kicked off the series Feb. 3, the teachers said.

“He’s been a popular speaker, and he usually has turtles with him,” Trimble said.

**Coming off the bench suits Larkin's Armani Ivy just fine. Especially against Elgin. 'The best thing for me.'**

Most players prefer to be in the starting lineup.

Larkin's Armani Ivy is taking a different route this season, but it not only doesn't bother him, he actually prefers to see how the game is going before he joins the fray.

"I don't mind not starting," Ivy said. "I feel like coming off the bench is the best thing for me. I can see the game better on the bench than actually playing.

"I can see the flow of the game before I get out there. It's better for me to come out and help my team like that."

The important thing? Ivy is on the court at the end of the game, and the senior forward was critical down the stretch Friday night against crosstown rival Elgin.

The Maroons stormed back to cut Larkin's lead to two in the final minute. Ivy grabbed a key rebound and was fouled, calmly hitting both free throws with 10 seconds left to help the Royals hold off Elgin for a 55-49 Upstate Eight Conference win.

"When I got to the line, I thought I had to put them to sleep," Ivy said. "That's what I did. I just had to. It was like a mandatory thing."

Ivy is one of the few current Royals who played a prominent role on last season's sectional championship team. Larkin coach Deryn Carter said that experience has helped.

"I'd like to think it showed him how to win," Carter said. "It's taking him some adjustments, just like our whole team, but he's where he needs to be right now.

"He just has to get better over the next few weeks, and we can be a tough out in the playoffs."

**Larkin** (13-14, 10-5) took a 40-19 lead on Ivy's 3-pointer in the third quarter, but **Elgin** (9-16, 2-12) fought back.

The **Maroons** went on a 14-1 run in the fourth quarter, cutting the deficit to 51-49 with 32 seconds left on a 3-pointer from **Maddox Hollian**.

Hollian scored seven points in the fourth and **Angel Nunez** hit three 3-pointers in the quarter.

"I just told them, this game could make the change for the program," **Elgin coach Brett Johnson** said. "They wanted it. I challenged them at halftime. I said, 'I don't know if you can win this game because you don't want it.'"

"They went out there, took it to heart and did everything well. We beat **Larkin** in three quarters. We just had a really bad second quarter. It's a learning experience for these kids."

Hollian led **Elgin** with 16 points and 12 rebounds. Nunez added 12 points.

**Larkin** outscored **Elgin** 23-5 in the second quarter to take a 33-14 lead. The **Royals** had to hang on down the stretch to secure the win, though.

“We survived,” Carter said. “There’s no such thing as an ugly win in this rivalry, so we’ll take it.

“We would have liked to have won the game more comfortably, but that’s being greedy in a rivalry.”

Jakob Blakley led Larkin with 15 points. Ivy added 12, while Adrian Colen-York had 11 and Darnell Wilder chipped in with 10.

Ivy’s experience in big games from last season provides a boost, but he knows his younger teammates have to actually experience those moments to improve.

“It’s like a bedtime story,” Ivy said. “You want to say things, but you can’t really tell them how it is. They have to see it for themselves.”

That’s the big takeaway Ivy had from playing on last season’s historic team.

“Being part of last year was really special,” Ivy said. “That was a really, really special team. Winning for this team is the same expectation for me because I’ve been a part of it.”
