M/I Homes acquires land for Becketts Landing and The Townes at Becketts --- 4/17/2022

SOUTH ELGIN -- M/I Homes, one of the top homebuilders in the Chicago market, today announced an expansion of its Chicago-area portfolio with the acquisition of 84 acres of land for its upcoming Becketts Landing and The Townes at Becketts communities in South Elgin.

Located along McLean Boulevard, north of the McLean Fen Forest Preserve and south of Spring Street, Becketts Landing and The Townes at Becketts will include 170 single-family homes and 178 townhouses, respectively. M/I Homes is on track to start infrastructure and site work in May. Construction on the communities' first homes will begin this fall, with completions and first move-ins targeted for early 2023. Pricing will be announced ahead of the start of sales in June.

"Already, 2022 is shaping up to be one of our busiest spring and summer real estate seasons yet, and Chicago's northwest suburbs continue to be in high demand thanks to their established downtowns, strong school districts and wealth of conveniences and amenities," said Rick Champine, area president of M/I Homes. 'It's so exciting': Side Street Studio Arts to move to bigger space in downtown Elgin --- 4/15/2022 By Rick West

Pointing out the character of the exposed brick and wood beams, Tanner Melvin -- co-founder of Side Street Studio Arts -- didn't seem to mind the years of neglect and layers of lead paint and asbestos that coated the dusty old building at 62 S. Grove Ave. in Elgin.

Side Street Studio Arts had found its forever home.

"It's a building that needs a lot of attention and some love to reactivate," Melvin said. "But it's so exciting. This is going to be a part of Elgin history."

After nine years at its current location at 15 Ziegler Court, including several expansions, Side Street had outgrown its old building. The nonprofit, which focuses on art exhibition, education, performance and advocacy, had to limit enrollment to its free summer programming because of space limitations. Their most recent signup for summer programming for U-46 students had a waitlist in less than 24 hours.

"We have the people, and we have the budget to do more. We just don't have the room," he said. "With this space, we'll be able to double if not triple the number of students."

The 18,000-square-foot space at the new spot, spread out over two main floors with a mezzanine and a full basement, is more than triple the space they have in their current location.

The building, which dates back to the early 1900s, was recently purchased by the Reva & David Logan Foundation. The foundation, which has supported Side Street with grants in the past, is a Chicago-based family foundation that provides strategic grants to support social justice, the arts and investigative journalism.

Side Street will get a long-term lease with a nominal rent of under \$100 a year. The arrangement will save Side Street about \$50,000 a year that they say will go back into programming and paying artists.

"We've had amazing landlords since we started, and it's going to be really sad leaving," he said of the space they've called home since 2013.

Side Street will pay for the renovations to the space.

The project will include installing a new HVAC system and ductwork, new electrical system, a new sprinkler system and updating an old manual elevator.

Melvin said it will take a couple of years to do the work. He couldn't say for sure how much it would cost but threw out \$1 million as a guesstimate.

"We have a lot of fundraising to do," he said. "These old buildings, they need a lot of work. But the community has supported us from day one in a number of ways, and we'll do whatever we have to do to raise the money."

Melvin said they plan to keep the floor plan open for flexibility. The first and second floors are mostly wide open already, extending from the front on Grove Avenue to Riverside Drive on the rear. A bank of windows on the second floor provides a wide view of downtown Elgin, and the back windows on the mezzanine look straight out on the Fox River.

"To find a building that gets this amount of light is not easy downtown," he said.

They'll redo the hardwood floors upstairs and use it primarily for performance space "like an old school dance hall," he said.

The space also has a rooftop area that they plan to renovate. "The views are going to be amazing," Melvin said. "We've already had people inquire about renting it."

A downstairs basement area will be for education and lab space. Melvin said he hopes to transform an old boiler into a forge for glassblowing and metalwork.

In addition to doing what Side Street already does in a bigger way, Melvin said he hopes it can branch out with some new events like a large-scale biennial art show that opens up from their space and spills onto Riverside Drive.

"Every downtown needs an entertainment district," he said. "We have been trying for nine years to get other people involved, and we've done a lot of great work, but his town needs more. This town deserves more. This place is going to be part of that."

After a two-year hiatus, the South Elgin High School Auto Show will be happening once again this May, and the educator behind it couldn't be happier.

"I'm excited," automotive instructor Steve Schertz said. "I enjoy introducing the parents and general public to our amazing automotive program here at South Elgin High School, and I like showing off all the student accomplishments and student success throughout the year."

Schertz and the high school's Auto Club have held it annually for 18 years until the COVID-19 pandemic shut it down in 2020 and 2021.

"In the past, typically with good weather, we would have 85 to 120 cars and a few hundred spectators," Schertz said. "With 20 different categories of trophies, we attract a very eclectic and wide variety of cars. Those have included Italian exotics, Japanese sports cars, classic muscle, actual race cars, trucks, fire equipment, military vehicles and antiques. It's a great show that any auto enthusiast can enjoy."

The cost to enter a vehicle in the show, being held from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, May 14, outside the high school's auto shop at 760 E. Main St., is \$5. Spectators get in free.

The automotive program at South Elgin High School has about 185 students, and they are playing key roles in staging the event, he said.

"I direct them (and) they pretty much run it," Schertz said. "They were put in charge of finding our sponsors, advertising by hanging up flyers and making posts on social media."

Come show day, students will be hosting registration as well as selling T-shirts, raffle tickets and concessions, he said. They will also be available to answer questions, hand out trophies and provide labor for the setup and teardown.

Schertz said his hope is that by their involvement, students will gain knowledge of hosting community events and build social skills by asking for sponsorships and promoting the event.

The auto show also will feature members of the high school's Hot Rodders of Tomorrow engine teardown team putting on an exhibition. Two automotive students will be awarded scholarships that day to help continue their education.

"It's also a chance for me to see South Elgin High School auto alumni from years past as they return to see the old auto teachers and to visit the learning space they started in. Alumni typically bring their cool cars back to show off, too," Schertz said.

Shots were made available to all of U-46's approximately 6,500 employees, and more than 1,200 community members age 65 and older received vaccines at U-46's Educational Services Center.



Softball: Burlington Central rolls to Slugfest championship -

Burlington Central exploded for 51 runs on Saturday to win first place in the Larkin Slugfest softball tournament held at the Elgin Sports Complex.

The Rockets overwhelmed Elgin 22-1 in the tournament opener, rallied to beat Bartlett 11-9 in the semifinal and rapped out 18 hits in two innings to beat Larkin, 18-4 in the championship game.

Jacobs also staged a comeback to edge Bartlett in the third-place game, 10-9 with a bottom of the seventh walk-off hit.

Central coach Scott Richman was just happy to play.

"It's been a rough year. The first game this morning was our fourth game of the year. We've had so many rainouts. Other teams have had upwards of 10 games already," said the Central coach. "It's about time we're we got some games in."

"They got to our pitchers. They started hitting the ball," Larkin coach Anne Vogt said. "Unfortunately, we didn't respond with our bats. That was the bottom line."

The Royals (7-2) jumped out to an early lead in the game, scoring runs in the first and second innings. Freshman Kaitlyn Neubert's 2-run home run over the right field fence put Larkin up 3-0 when Central (4-2) came up to bat in the bottom of the second.

"I want to say she hit .750 on the day if not more," Vogt said about Neubert, who was one of Larkin's three picks for the all-tournament team. "Her bat is just hot and she's also playing great defense."

Thirteen Rockets went to the plate in their half of the inning. Capped by Lauren Knief's 2-run blast over the center field fence, Central scored nine runs on 10 hits and an error.

Knief, a senior, went to the plate just hoping to end a hitting drought.

"My hitting has been in a slump today, so I switched to my old bat -- my almost broken, completely cracked bat -- and it actually worked in my favor," Knief said. "I just needed a complete change. I wanted to do anything I could to get out of my slump and it worked."

Larkin got one run back in its half of the third.

Central had another big inning in the bottom of the third, scoring nine more runs on eight hits and a Larkin miscue.

Everyone in the Rockets starting lineup got a hit and scored in the title game.

In addition to offensive output, Richman was pleased with defensive play of second baseman Anna Sanders and shortstop Rylie Duval,

"You can't go wrong with the middle of our infield. Anna and Rylie are the rock of our defense," he said. "They play shortstop just as good as anybody as I have seen."

Freshman call-up Allie Botkin also made a favorable impression on Richman.

"She pitched in game one and she came out here and started the championship game and she gave a phenomenal effort," said the Central coach.

Sanders, Duval and Botkin were all named to the all-tournament team.

Larkin had a similar path as Central to the title contest. The Royals downed St. Edward 13-3 in their first game and edged Jacobs 3-2 in the semifinal.

"Kailey Cronin pitched a heck of a game against Jacobs and drove in the winning run," said Vogt.

Cronin along with teammate Mya Bermudez were also named to the all-tournament team.

At one point, Jacobs (5-5) trailed Bartlett (5-6) by seven in the third-place game but battled back.

"We threw three different pitchers to throw their hitters off balance." said Jacobs coach Katie O'Brien. "Our hitters then just started hitting and hitting is contagious."

Golden Eagle Aria Patel, who had the walk-off hit, and pitcher Caitlin Cook represented Jacobs on the all-tournament team.
