#### **Summer Connection**

Have you checked out the robust offerings of the 2024 Summer Connection programs yet? There are <u>learning and enrichment</u> <u>opportunities</u> for elementary students, and a <u>special program</u> for those who are new to the United States. Current 6th, 7th, and 8th graders can sign up for <u>academic enrichment opportunities</u>, and high school students can take advantage of <u>credit recovery</u> <u>options</u>.



All students entering 7th grade are encouraged to attend a voluntary two-day program that will feature community and team-building activities. Called the <u>Middle</u> <u>School Experience</u>, it will be offered at each of our eight middle schools and will help students become familiar with their new classmates, schedules, and buildings.

Similarly, students entering 9th grade can be a part of the two-day <u>Freshman Connection</u> at the high school they will attend in August, and seniors can join <u>College Jumpstart</u> to help refine their post-secondary plans, get guidance on college applications and essays, and more.

Fees for the U-46 summer school program will be waived for 2024, and transportation will be available to eligible students who sign up before specific deadlines for each program. There are limited spots available, though, so click <u>here</u> to begin the sign-up process for elementary summer school and <u>here</u> for secondary summer school.

Separately, our five comprehensive high schools are hosting a number of <u>athletic camps</u> this summer, too.

## Safety Tuesday on Wednesday

Drivers ages 16 and 17 get into more car accidents than any other age group, according to <u>research</u> from the American Automobile Association (AAA) Foundation for Traffic Safety. Teen drivers don't have the experience or skills that older drivers have, and they get distracted easily, especially if they have friends in the car.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) offers a <u>number of resources</u> to help parents develop their teen's driving skills. One of the most important pieces of advice the agency



offers is to learn about the laws that apply to new drivers in your state, in our case <u>Illinois</u>. For instance, Illinois drivers ages 16 and 17 have restrictions on their nighttime driving. Also, for the first 12 months of licensing, or until the driver turns 18, whichever occurs first, the number of passengers is limited to one person under age 20, unless the passenger is a sibling, stepsibling, child, or stepchild of the driver.

Distracted driving can also involve the use of mobile phones. One in three teens say they have texted while driving. Research has found that dialing a phone number while driving increases a teen's risk of crashing by six times, and texting while driving increases the risk by 23 times.

Parents and guardians should not only talk to their teens about the risks of distracted driving but also set consequences for breaking a distraction rule you have set, such as cutting down on the hours or places they can drive. Adults also must set a good example - keep your eyes on the road and hands on the wheel while driving. Teen drivers learn from watching their parents, relatives, and others.

## African American Advisory Council


