The Process

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
Unite U-46 is a community-led initiative to:






Question	Total AGREE	Total DISAGREE

Our school facilities are fine just the way they are. Nothing needs to be done to improve them.






Question	High Priority

For all schools, upgrade and renovate, where needed, building infrastructure — items like roofs, windows, electrical systems, plumbing, and HVAC.	56.8%
Improve accessibility for physically challenged students.	56.4%



Question	Strongly/Somewhat Agree
The schools in our community represent an approximately \$1.5 billion dollar investment. We must protect that investment by keeping them up-to-date and in good working condition.	84.2%
With declining enrollment, closing buildings that are old and expensive to operate makes good financial sense.	82.4%
It is important that schools throughout U-46 are equitable in terms of physical condition and educational programs.	81.2%
Investing in improved school buildings now will benefit many future generations of students and homeowners.	80.2%

 - How best to address long-term facility and enrollment challenges.
 - Current and accurate perceptions and priorities regarding the Educational Facility Master Plan.
 - Steps to be taken to implement the Educational Facility Master Plan.

As U-46 Schools Move Forward



Have equitable access to programs and opportunities at school buildings districtwide.







Attend schools with similar class sizes, achieved by balancing enrollment districtwide.



Be well-supported by high-quality teachers and staff who are well-trained and certified in their areas of expertise.





Have their educational, social, and emotional needs addressed as they transition to preschool, elementary, middle, and high school levels and to new schools.





Have the opportunity to learn in schools that are:

- Safe and secure.
- Accessible to all.
- Proactively maintained and updated as needed.
- Adaptable to changing technology.
- Integrated with the outdoors and nature.
- Updated to include collaborative, flexible spaces that encourage group and self-learning.
- Replaced when they have reached a point where they are more expensive to repair or renovate than replace.

The U-46 Community Should:



- Continue to have the opportunity to learn and provide feedback about the future of U-46 schools through Unite U-46.
- Continue to be well-informed about district operations, facilities, and finances.
- Be well-informed and actively involved in supporting students as these recommendations are implemented and schools are retired, renovated, and rebuilt.



Goals To Accomplish Recommendations



Increase budget for maintenance and repair by \$10 million per year

















 Balance enrollment at buildings throughout district

Improve equitable access to programs at more buildings districtwide



Update elementary school buildings to provide additional preschool opportunities





Implement a true 6th through 8th grade middle school model districtwide.

Develop an initial timeline for the implementation of the Unite U-46 recommendations and thoroughly communicate this timeline with the community.






Achieving Our Goals

Complete transition of Hawk Hollow Elementary to a middle school.



Retire Hanover Countryside Elementary after Glenbrook Elementary updates are complete.




Retire Illinois Park and More at 4 Early Childhood Centers

Illustrative Example of Existing Bond Debt




Amount of Bond Debt

Tax Levy





INVESTMENT \$310-\$380 MILLION

Proposal Would Result In

Zero Tax Rate Change For Residents*

Combination of reserve and bond financing.

Requires a successful referendum in April 2023 to raise \$179M.

* Zero impact to the portion of tax rate used for paying down U-46 debt.
