Elgin Area School District U-46 Supt. Tony Sanders on Tuesday was named the next state superintendent of education.

Sanders will assume his new duties in late February.

"The U-46 school board is sad to see Superintendent Sanders leave, but knows the children of the state of Illinois will benefit from his leadership at the Illinois State Board of Education," U-46 school board President Sue Kerr said in a statement. "We wish him the best in this next chapter of his life."

Sanders was appointed to lead the state's second-largest school district in 2014.

Kerr noted Sanders' numerous accomplishments, including expansion of the district's dual-language program, launching a full-day kindergarten program, starting a dual-credit

program with Elgin Community College, undergoing a facilities study to identify building needs and growing the career pathways programs for high school students.

"Dr. Tony Sanders has distinguished himself as a visionary leader and passionate advocate for students and educators," said Steven Isoye, ISBE board chairman. "As the superintendent of one of Illinois' largest school districts, he intimately understands the strengths, the policy history and the challenges of our public schools.

## Elgin leaders say Tony Sanders leaves U-46 'in much better shape than when he started

Elgin area officials and community members praised the selection of U-46 Superintendent Tony Sanders as Illinois' new State Superintendent of Education.

"The U-46 School Board is sad to see Superintendent Sanders leave but knows that the children of the state of Illinois will benefit from his leadership at the Illinois State Board of Education," U-46 Board of Education Board President Sue Kerr said in a prepared statement after the Tuesday announcement.

The U-46 Board of Education will discuss the next steps at its closed session on Monday, according to a news release. The Board will take action at its next regularly scheduled meeting on Monday, Feb. 13. Sanders posted on the U-46 website that he will remain with U-46 for the next few weeks as the Board considers its next steps relative to the leadership of the school district.

Sanders has been working for U-46 since 2007, first serving as chief communications officer, then as chief of staff before being appointed chief executive officer of the district in 2014. State law was changed in 2017 to allow him to lead the district without superintendent certification. His title was changed to superintendent in 2020 after he completed certification.

Bill Wright, who chairs the governing board of the Alignment for Collaborative Education and whose children attended U-46 schools, also had praise for Sanders.

"Tony made a significant impact in his 15 years at U-46, leaving the school district in much better shape than when he started. I wish him nothing but success in his new endeavor with the state," Wright said.

Kerr said the district's accomplishments under Sanders include the expansion of the dual language program; the launch of full-day kindergarten; the creation of a dual credit program with Elgin Community College; undergoing a facilities study identifying infrastructure needs; and the continued growth of career pathways programs for high school students.

"Work continues on U-46 Rising, which is an initiative to improve student achievement through rigor and academic teaming, and the transition to a true middle school model that moves 6th grade from the elementary level to middle school," Kerr said in her statement.

Kerr noted that during Sanders' time as superintendent the district eliminated its structural deficit, built up cash reserves and abated millions of dollars to taxpayers.

Sanders is a member of the Elgin Area Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. Chamber CEO & President Carol Gieske said Sanders fostered a collaborative environment that recognizes the importance of engaging local businesses with education.

"We appreciate Tony's leadership in workforce development and aligning the district with the needs of our local business community. He recognizes the importance of career readiness and creating learning opportunities so students can enter the pipeline ready for careers," Gieske said.

Elgin Mayor Dave Kaptain said, "Tony did a great job for the district and for the community. He was able to work not only with the mayors of the towns in the district, but worked well addressing the concerns across the various demographics in the community."

"He worked well with our village staff. Good luck to him," said South Elgin Village President Steve Ward.

David Sam, President of Elgin Community College, called Sanders a strong supporter of community college and understands the community college system.

"His track record of innovation, equity and academic achievement will serve him well in this new role. I applaud this decision. Dr. Sanders is a great choice," Sam said.

Elgin City Manager Rick Kozal said Sanders' being named the next State Superintendent of Education is bittersweet news.

"Tony's positive impact extends beyond School District U-46 and he will be sorely missed here in Elgin," Kozal said.

Kozal said he had the good fortune to personally work with Sanders over the past decade and witness the benefit the greater Elgin community derived from Sanders' leadership.

"But I cannot be more pleased in learning that Dr. Sanders will now be serving a statewide audience," Kozal said.

The Illinois State Board of Education made the announcement about Sanders Tuesday.

Sanders, 53, will succeed Carmen Ayala, who announced in November that she would retire effective Jan. 31. Sanders will take over the post in late February while Deputy Education Officer Krish Mohip will serve as interim superintendent during the transition.

Gov. J.B. Pritzker recommended Sanders for the job.

"Dr. Tony Sanders is an extraordinary choice for State Superintendent of Education," Pritzker said in a statement. "Dr. Sanders' breadth of experience as superintendent of School District U-46 and his entire background have prepared him to take on this role. # Crain's Chicago Business – Elgin schools chief named new state schools superintendent

The Illinois State Board of Education today named Tony Sanders its new superintendent. In a statement, the board said it conducted a nationwide search to succeed the retiring Carmen Ayala, but it didn't have to look far since Sanders now is superintendent of Elgin Area School District U-46, the state's largest district after Chicago. Sanders' pick won immediate applause from organized labor, a sign that union chiefs view him as an ally in their efforts to get more state funding and resist having any more put toward charter and other outside schools.

"As an Illinois superintendent with a strong education background, Dr. Sanders thoroughly understands the challenges facing our students, teachers and staff," the Illinois Federation of Teachers said in a statement. "His steady leadership during the pandemic ensured that Elgin students and school staff were safe and healthy."

Similar praise came from Gov. J.B. Pritzker, who at a minimum almost certainly had the appointment run by him before it became official. He said Sanders' "focus on innovation, social emotional development and academic excellence make him an extraordinary pick. I can think of no better person to lead the Illinois State Board of Education."

In its statement, the board said Sanders added full-day kindergarten for all students, expanded the district's dual-language program and created a new alternative high school for students who had problems in conventional schools. He also developed a program to help teachers financially to obtain advanced degrees and is a strong supporter of the state's evidence-based

funding system that has sent more money to districts with high poverty and a low property tax base.

Before becoming U-46 superintendent, Sanders served as the district's chief of staff for 11 years following a stretch as the district's chief communications officer.

He received his bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois Springfield, a master's degree in business administration from the New York Institute of Technology, a Chief School Business Official endorsement from Northern Illinois University and his doctorate in education from Aurora University.

Sanders will take office in late February.

## Tony Sanders of District U-46 named new state superintendent of education

The Illinois State Board of Education announced Tuesday that Tony Sanders, superintendent of Elgin School District U-46, was named the new state superintendent of education.

Carmen Ayala — the first woman and person of color to hold the position — announced in November that she would be retiring as the state's top education official in February.

Before joining U-46 in 2007 as the district's chief communications officer, Sanders served in a similar role for St. Louis Public Schools and worked in communication and government relations for Illinois agencies, including ISBE, according to the agency's announcement.

Sanders then held a chief of staff role in U-46 before being appointed to lead the district in 2014. He follows in the footsteps of his father, Ted Sanders, former U.S. deputy secretary of education and superintendent of education in Illinois, Nevada and Ohio.

"Dr. Tony Sanders is an extraordinary choice for state superintendent of education," Gov. J.B. Pritzker said in a news release. "Dr. Sanders' breadth of experience as superintendent of

School District U-46 and his entire background have prepared him to take on this role. His focus on innovation, social emotional development and academic excellence make him an extraordinary pick."

Sanders accomplished a number of things during his tenure at the second-largest school district in Illinois, including the expansion of the dual language program, the launch of full-day kindergarten and the creation of a dual credit program with Elgin Community College, according to a news release from District U-46.

In a statement, ISBE board chair Steven Isoye noted Sanders' deep understanding of issues rooted in the public school system.

"At U-46, he has championed equity, expanded opportunities for students, and brought innovative new programs to the district," Isoye said. "We are confident he will build on our record-high graduation rates and college and career readiness to continue leading Illinois' schools in a positive direction."

At <mark>U-46</mark>, Sanders pushed for career pathways programs for high school students.

"The U-46 School Board is sad to see Superintendent Sanders leave, but knows that the children of the state of Illinois will benefit from his leadership at the Illinois State Board of Education," said U-46 Board of Education Board President Sue Kerr in a statement.

Sanders supported the effort to reform Illinois' school funding and helped pass the Every Student Succeeds Act. He will assume his duties in late February. ISBE Deputy Education Officer Krish Mohip will serve as interim state superintendent of education during the transition. Dr. Carmen I. Ayala's term as state superintendent of education concludes Jan. 31. She announced her retirement after 40 years of service and leadership in Illinois public schools.

kindergarten for all students and implemented a developmentally appropriate play-based instructional program. Dr. Sanders grew the district's dual language program and created a new alternative high school, the DREAM Academy, to reduce expulsions and better serve students in need of trauma-informed care. He also invested in a grow-your-own educator initiative to provide educational support professionals the ability to return to school to earn their teaching credentials. The initiative has supported more than 60 U-46 employees in receiving full tuition reimbursement as they work toward their teacher licensure. Dr. Sanders improved the district's financial standing, while overseeing a \$660 million operating budget.

Dr. Sanders also has advocated at the state and federal levels as a member and past chair of the Large Countywide and Suburban District Consortium. He supported the effort to reform Illinois' school funding formula and enact Evidence-Based Funding and to pass the Every Student Succeeds Act.

He chaired the Whole Child and Make SAFE Task Forces, providing the General Assembly with critical recommendations for providing students holistic supports and preventing child abuse. He supported the two Illinois school districts currently under the direction of Financial Oversight Panels, strengthened relationships with Illinois' Regional Offices of Education, and supported the implementation of ISBE's system of support for schools in the greatest need.

Prior to joining ISBE, Mohip served as the chief executive officer of Youngstown City Schools in Youngstown, Ohio, and was a school principal, deputy chief of schools, and chief of schools for Chicago Public Schools. Mohip received his bachelor's degree from Mount Saint Clare College, his Master of Education from Loyola University Chicago, and his MBA from Louisiana State University Shreveport. He is currently a doctoral candidate at National Louis University.

## Tony Sanders to become state superintendent of education

Elgin Area School District chief to replace outgoing Supt. Carmen Ayala

Sanders, 53, will succeed Carmen Ayala, who announced in November that she would retire effective Jan. 31. ISBE said Sanders will take over the post in late February while Deputy Education Officer Krish Mohip will serve as interim superintendent during the transition.

Sanders has been superintendent of the Elgin-area district since 2014. It is the second-largest district in Illinois, serving more than 35,000 students across five high schools and nearly 50 elementary and middle schools, according to the most recent state report card. # Examiner of Bartlett U-46 Board to vote upon IGA, varied bills, expenses

The Board of Education in School District U-46 approved a \$52,600 expenditure item, an intergovernmental agreement (IGA) and a resolution at its Monday, Jan. 9 meeting.

The votes were 6-0, board member Veronica Noland was absent.

The expenditure is with Able Pest Control, and it will be paid for from the operations and maintenance fund. The proposal states it's "to establish a primary agreement" in order to "schedule pest control services as part of the district's comprehensive Integrated Pest Management (IPM) program."

"The IPM program is a process of achieving long-term, environmentally sound pest suppression and prevention using a wide variety of technological and management practices that align with Board Policy," the proposal adds. "Additionally, providing pest control services will comply with State regulatory guidelines."

The IGA is between four school districts including U-46 and community unit school districts 300 (Carpentersville), 301 (Burlington) and 303 (St. Charles) for the Northern Kane County Regional Vocational System.

The districts can "offer shared career and technical education (CTE) programs," the IGA states, and "the members of these districts would receive a wider variety of programs and more efficient services."

According to the IGA: "The purpose of the System shall be to allow for programmatic alignment and continuity of career and technical offerings among secondary and postsecondary institutions; cooperation in shared use of facilities, equipment and personnel (where possible and desirable), cooperative efforts in continuous planning, evaluation, and improvement of programs."

The IGA lists D301 as the administrative district.

The approved resolution allows for "vehicles to be removed from service and sold to a company 'as is' or to a junking company," the proposal states.

Included are 13 plant operations vehicles dating from between 1996 and 2006.

Also approved by a 6-0 vote was \$18.9 million in itemized bills.

## Large list of U-46 projects in works for this summer Feb. 1, 2023

School District U-46 is estimating \$80.1 million in capital projects for this coming summer.

Detail was presented by Patricia Waldau, director of plant operations, at the Monday, Jan. 9 Board of Education meeting.

That total is a 233.8 percent increase from the \$24 million spent in 2022, as recently reported.

The increase is largely due to a \$50 million renovation and addition project at Bartlett's Hawk Hollow, which will be converted from an elementary to a middle school.

"We'll be breaking ground on that project turning that elementary school into a middle school," Waldau said.

Waldau added that "a number of our projects are continuations or phased projects from the previous year," and "we have a number of projects that just need to be done to make sure that we maintain the infrastructure of our district."

There are several projects at Streamwood High School including phase two of a pathways renovation (\$6 million), a boiler/pumps/electrical switchgear/generator replacement (\$5.1 million) and a project to bring internet access to Millennium Field's press box (\$100,000).

Four schools have planned roof replacement projects at \$11.4 million total, and five will have fire alarm replacements at \$1.7 million total.

The Educational Services Center in Elgin has renovations and cooling tower replacement planned at \$3.9 million total, Elgin's Larkin High School has fences and parking lot replacements at \$955,000 total, bathroom renovations will have a total cost of \$722,000 at Elgin's Channing elementary and Kimball middle schools, Elgin's Illinois Park Early Learning Center regrading project will cost \$255,000, Elgin's Abbott Middle School will have a cooler/freezer replacement at \$100,000 and a Elgin High School gas main relocation will cost \$16,080.

Most of the funds will come from operations and maintenance with \$5 million from the fire prevention, life and safety fund.

Spring Training in Major League Baseball (MLB) is right around the corner, and it will mark the first year for Bartlett native Nick Mahrley, a 2000 Bartlett High School graduate, as a full-time umpire in the big leagues.

Mahrley, 40, has been a professional umpire for nearly 15 years and was one of 10 Minor League umps to be promoted this year, according to an MLB statement.

Now a Scottsdale, Arizona resident with his wife Jodi, Mahrley will be near home during Spring Training, with a Chicago Cubs Cactus League game his first as a full-time MLB umpire, before the constant travel and hotels during the season.

However, Mahrley's first MLB game was in 2017 when he made the call-up list to fill in when needed. In a hotel room in August in Des Moines, Iowa as a Triple-A umpire, he got the late night phone call that he would be catching a 6 a.m. flight to ump a Colorado Rockies game. He has umped 382 MLB games as a call-up.

"It was surreal," Mahrley said about walking out the tunnel for his first big league game. "I stepped out on the field, and the first thing I felt was everything out there was just larger than life."

This career path all started in Bartlett Little League. After playing throughout his childhood, Mahrley saw a flyer in high school advertising for umpires. Mahrley admitted he decided to ump primarily as "a good way to make money and be around the game," but he enjoyed the experience.

It wouldn't be for a few more years, however, that it became a potential career path. After high school, Mahrley joined the U.S. Air Force.

After his military service, Mahrley was unsure of what he wanted to do when he and his parents, Bartlett residents Janet and Ken Parcell, went to Spring Training. That's when Mahrley researched and went to the Harry Wendlestedt Umpire School in Florida.

Of the hundreds of graduates of the school, Mahrley was one of only a handful to get a spot starting in the Rookie League in the late 2000s. From there, just like players, the umpires have to work their way up the minors.

Mahrley said it's "different planets" umping in the little league compared to professional, but he said the Bartlett Little League was always supportive and "ignited my passion for this career path."

"It created an atmosphere for me to fall in love with umpiring and see it as something that I wanted to do," Mahrley said. "If I had not done that, I would have never become a big league umpire."

Mahrley added: "It is the best job in the world. My office every day is a big league ball park, and it's pretty cool."

## Examiner of Streamwood – Sabres boys hoops drop heartbreaker to Maroons

The Streamwood boys basketball team suffered a heartbreaker, a 43-42 Upstate Eight Conference loss to Elgin on Tuesday, Jan. 24 at Streamwood.

It was the closest game for the Sabres, who are still looking for their first win. Streamwood lost 45-42 at Elgin earlier this season.

The game was back-and-forth with no more than four points separating the two teams all night until the fourth quarter. Streamwood grabbed a 33-29 lead early in the fourth when Elgin went on a 13-2 run for a 42-35 lead in the final two minutes.

Dakota White (11 points) hit a three pointer and James Donato (nine points) scored four as Streamwood pulled to 43-42, but mistakes did in the Sabres who had a chance at a game winner.

For Sabres coach Quentin Ruff, it was also missed opportunities earlier in the fourth quarter when Streamwood had chances to increase its four-point lead.

"There was a point where we were up by four, and I was just harping on we want 10 passes," Ruff said. "We wanted to move the ball, and we've just got to pay attention to detail. On those possessions, we come down and try and score on one pass, two passes."

Ruff added: "We've just got to be smarter. I've got to find a way to get all of us on the same page as far as awareness of the clock, awareness of we're ahead and we don't need to score quick."

Saul Zamudio had 10 points, including three treys, and Josh Wilder added seven.

Streamwood went on to drop a 64-26 game against UEC leader South Elgin on Friday, Jan. 27 at Streamwood, and the Sabres opened the week with a 72-40 non conference loss at Hoffman Estates on Monday, Jan. 23.

The previous week, the Sabres had a pair of UEC losses, 87-63 to East Aurora on Tuesday, Jan. 17 in Aurora and 61-45 against Glenbard East on Thursday, Jan. 19 at Streamwood. The Sabres dropped a 58-23 non conference game at Barrington on Saturday, Jan. 21.

Ruff said of his Sabres, now 0-25 overall and 0-13 in the UEC, that they continue to fight no matter the score.

"That is a huge positive," Ruff said.

"All I want my dudes is to just never quit. Whether we're down five, we're down 30 or 40, we've just got to keep fighting."
