
Tony Sanders

Increasing Opportunities for Early Learners



-46 continues to grow our Early Learners programs to provide educational opportunities for our area's youngest children.

During the 2014-2015 school year, we added a preschool classroom, bringing our total to 51 preschool classrooms at 12 schools.

Illinois Park Early Learning Center received a \$5,000 Fit for

Kids grant for a walking learning track behind the school, and Independence Early Learning Center has a new and improved library.

We offer Full-day Kindergarten Intervention with literacyrich curriculum at 14 classrooms at four schools and four classrooms of Extended-day Kindergarten at two schools.



Expanding Our Renowned

he U-46 Dual Language program continues to grow in popularity as English-speaking and Spanish-speaking students reap the benefits of learning language alongside each other. Students develop strong skills and proficiency in the student's first and second language in order to become bilingual, biliterate and bicultural. This year, U-46 offers Dual Language to students in preschool through fifth grade at 30 elementary schools. Two-Way Dual Language is offered at 18 of those schools.

Surrounding districts including Barrington 220, Carpentersville 300, and West Chicago Elementary School District 33 have only one Dual Language elementary program.






A National Model for **Dual Language**

- U-46's Wilma Valero, Director of English Language Learners, and Patricia Makishima, Dual Language Coordinator, were invited by nationally-renowned researchers Thomas and Collier to share insights on the successful implementation of Dual Language programs for their upcoming book.
- U-46 is recognized as an exemplary Dual Language program model from districts across the nation. We offered guidance and assistance to Cardinal Valley Elementary in Lexington, Kentucky, in implementing a Dual Language program and have frequent visits from districts that hope to emulate our program.
- U-46 CEO Tony Sanders and Director of English Language Learners Wilma Valero will present at the American Association of School Administrators Conference as a national model for ELL programs.
- U-46 Dual Language leaders and principals will present at the Illinois Association for Multilingual and Multicultural Education on Reflective Conversations to Impact Dual Language Instruction.
- New Dual Language teachers, including those recently recruited from Puerto Rico, receive two days of intense professional development in the foundation of Dual Language, biliteracy development, standards-based instruction and learning environments conducive to language and content development.





- Seven U-46 elementary schools are in the top 25 percent in Illinois for growth in reading and math, including Fox Meadow Elementary School, Hanover Countryside Elementary School, Liberty Elementary School, Nature Ridge Elementary School, Prairieview Elementary School, Timber Trails Elementary School and Wayne Elementary School.
- Three of the eight middle schools are in the top 25% of growth for grades 7-8 middle schools in Illinois, and one middle school is in the top 25% of growth for grades 7-8 middle schools in Illinois in reading.
- Five of the ten U-46 schools that were previously classified as federal restructuring schools last year have academic growth scores at or above 100 in reading and math.
- Attendance has been climbing since 2011 and reached a six-year high of 94.6 percent this year, up from 94.3 percent last year.

Implementing Effective **School Improvement Strategies**

U-46 Focuses on Teacher Collaboration to Support Student Learning

ased on the compelling body of research on teacher professional learning, teachers participate in a U-46 Collaborative Inquiry Cycle in which coaches are working with teachers. Together they identify the standards they are expected to teach in the current unit-lesson, to create common assessments that measure students' ability to meet these standards, to design learning progressions and effective instruction to teach toward this competency, to use the common assessments and other measures to assess where students are, to reflect upon and improve teaching practice and to reteach when needed in order to ensure that every child is on target to master the designated standards.

"During our first cycle, we learned how to closely examine where our students are compared to specific standards, and design learning progressions to fill the gaps to proficiency and beyond. It was very valuable having someone support us as a team while we made these important decisions."

Implementing Standards-Based **Grading at Middle and High Schools**

In U-46, we believe in holding students to the highest academic standards that will best prepare them for success in college and the workplace. That's why we have begun transitioning to Standards Based Grading (SBG) practices to better assess what our students are learning across our middle schools and high schools. SBG provides teachers and students with more information about the skills and knowledge that our students are mastering.

We have begun to phase in SBG to allow teachers time to alter instructional practices and assessments. Some of our schools were early adopters and made SBG the professional development focus in their school improvement plans for the past several years. During the summer of 2014 and throughout the school year, U-46 offered extensive professional development to our teachers. So far, approximately 30 percent of middle and high school teachers have fully implemented SBG.

At this time, teachers are not required to implement SBG; rather, teachers have opted to participate, and U-46 is working collaboratively to support these teachers. What is required for the 2014-2015 school year is Marks grading, using the 0-4 scale. To learn more about our efforts to implement SBG, visit www.u-46.org.

Rolling Out New Opportunities for Gifted

-46 rolled out an extensive strategic plan to expand gifted services for elementary school students. In 2014, U-46 launched the Access to Inquiry and Meaning program (AIM) to provide opportunities for the development of student potential in students from diverse cultural, racial, socio-economic and linguistic backgrounds and students with disabilities. Gifted Specialists act as coaches and collaborative teachers helping classroom teachers develop specific curricular and instructional modifications. The program was implemented for third grade in 2014 and will be rolled out to first through third grades by 2016-2017.

In 2014, IGNITE was launched for fourth grade students and will roll out by 2016-2017 for fifth and sixth grade students. It includes core academic gifted classes for students who demonstrate exceptional intellectual ability and high-level performance across core academic subjects: language arts, math, science and social studies. Two-Way Dual Language core academic gifted classes were also implemented in 2014 for students enrolled in the Dual Language program who are identified as gifted.

T-46 reported positive progress in its initiatives to increase the number of students taking advantage of the district's Advanced Placement (AP) course offerings as well as those taking AP exams. The district offers more than 20 AP courses.

During the 2013-2014 school year, there were 3,052 AP exams taken by U-46 students, up from 2,244 in 2010-2011; 1,660 students earned a score of 3 or more, up from 1,243 in 2010-2011; and U-46 high schools saw 1,642 unique AP test takers, up from 1,299 in 2010-2011.

Promoting Social & Emotional Health



-46 recognizes the importance of social and emotional support for all students. That's why we have aggressively implemented and continue to grow our PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions & Support) system to ensure that our schools are safe, caring environments where students can learn.

- In 2014-2015, 47 U-46 schools are implementing PBIS up from 44 last year. New PBIS schools include Fox Meadow Elementary School, Sycamore Trails Elementary School and Larkin High School.
- In 2013-2014, four U-46 schools out of 28 across the state of Illinois earned platinum status for PBIS implementation, the highest level of recognition possible from the state. Those schools include Abbott Middle School, Century Oaks Elementary School, Glenbrook Elementary School and Highland Elementary School. Platinum means that schools have reached 80 percent fidelity on all three tiers of PBIS implementation and that the school has documented measurable behavioral and academic trend improvements.
- In the Fox Valley area, outside of School District U-46, only one other school earned platinum status for PBIS.
- All U-46 schools are offering MTSS (multi-tiered systems of support) in some capacity, including MTSS/RTI Problem Solving Teams and Academic Interventions for Math, Reading and Social Emotional Learning.



U-46 Launched Campaign to Improve Student Attendance

-46 launched a campaign called, "I'm Here! ¡Aquí estoy!" to help improve the district's student attendance rates. The messaging campaign raised awareness about the importance of ensuring students are in school every day.

The attendance rate at U-46 for the 2013-2014 school year was 94.3 percent. On average, 1,949.4 students are missing from U-46 classrooms each day. The campaign was created to support the District Improvement Plan (DIP) attendance goal of 98 percent.

U-46 families will receive Attendance Toolkits with information about excused and unexcused absences and tips for getting students to school on time each day. As part of each school's PBIS goals, students with improved and excellent attendance will receive special recognitions.

¶ Igin High School developed nine collaborative classes to offer a continuum of services for special education ✓ students. The classes incorporate a General Special Education teacher and a General Education teacher working collaboratively together in one classroom to meet the needs of students with and without disabilities. The collaborative classes were so successful during the first year that two additional classes will be offered next year.

Intensive Hands-On Autism Training

More than 30 U-46 teachers and support staff attended Best Practices for Supporting Students on the Autism Spectrum, a four-day intensive training. Participants applied lecture information by working as a team and side-by-side with Autism coaches and students in a simulated classroom. A panel of parents of children with autism shared their experiences and guidance.

These celebrations have ensured that our students receive an authentic, eye-opening lesson about what Veterans Day means in this country and what area servicemen and servicewomen have contributed to our past and our future.





Increasing Technology

n 2014, U-46 increased initiatives to promote instructional technology in the classroom. The Information Services and Instructional Technology Departments teamed up to develop an internal mini-grant process. As part of the application process, teachers developed instruction plans and established rubrics to measure student progress with new technology. As a result, 49 teachers or teacher groups received laptops for their classrooms, and 57 received tablets, engaging students in a digital learning experience.

The Information Services Department is working to improve the district's technology infrastructure and has a plan in place to provide wireless access to every classroom in every school by the end of the 2015-2016 fiscal year. As of December 2014, wireless coverage has been installed in 22 schools. U-46 also recently upgraded the network connecting schools to the district's data center, providing 12 times the bandwidth schools previously had.


U-46 also switched to Google Apps for Education, providing students with drive space that allows them to access their schoolwork from any computer. Students also received Google-based email accounts.



lassroom technology enabled Elgin High School environmental students to plan a national Biodiversity Teach-in. Using the 100th anniversary of the extinction of the passenger pigeon, the students recruited experts from around the world to participate in a weeklong webinar which attracted more than 5,000 students and teachers as virtual attendees.

aunched in 2008, the U-46 Educational Foundation provides extra financial support to educational programs and activities. In 2014, some of the projects it funded include:

- Supporting the district's attendance campaign by providing resources for educational toolkits and student recognitions to increase the district's attendance rate;
- Providing funding for the U-46 Planetarium to offer the Dawn of the Space Age Sky Show so students can learn about the universe and our nation's success with space exploration;
- Purchasing heart monitors for U-46 physical education classrooms to inspire students to stay active and allow them to understand the impact physical activity has on their heart rate; and
- Supporting Talentfest which showcases the abilities and talents of U-46 students at a community performance held at The Hemmens Cultural Center.

religious, and educational leaders met at an Education Summit, convened by Elgin Mayor David Kaptain, to evaluate the educational needs of our community and discuss community-wide systems focused on strategic school support. It was determined that hundreds of partnerships already exist in U-46 schools, but there is no coordination of community resources in support of education. Every resident of our partner communities has a vital interest in the success of U-46 schools. In an effort to capitalize on these existing community resources, U-46 teamed up with several key community partners to develop the Alignment Education Initiative. A public-private partnership was formed to coordinate the approach of aligning community resources in support of U-46 schools and the district's strategic plan.

The plan was developed using the Alignment Nashville and Alignment Rockford models. The Alignment Steering Committee includes U-46, United Way of Elgin, Elgin Community College, the City of Elgin, Judson University, the Grand Victoria Foundation and CUSD 301. The work is organized around the priorities of U-46, focused on students who need the most support in order to be successful. (In February, 2015, Alignment for Collaboration in Education – ACE- was established.)



U-46 Parents Take Advantage of Leadership Institutes

U-46 continues to see great results from the district's African-American Parent Leadership Institute (AAPLI) and Hispanic Parent Leadership Institute (HPLI), which provide parents with extensive leadership training and opportunities to get engaged with U-46. In 2014, there were eight AAPLI graduates and 19 HPLI graduates.

THE DAILY BEAST America's Top High Schools 2014


artlett High School was named to The Daily Beast's list of America's Best High Schools for 2014. The award-winning publication examined the nation's high schools with

a graduation rate of 85 percent or higher and then analyzed 1,200 schools for graduation and college acceptance rates, percentage of free and reduced lunch students, SAT and ACT scores, academic rigor using Advanced Placement (AP) and other test scores, and student performance on college admission exams.



S. News and World Report named Elgin High School among the Best High Schools in the nation for 2014 and honored the school with a bronze award. This is the second year in a row that Elgin High School has been honored with this prestigious,

national recognition. U.S. News and World Report analyzed more than 31,000 public high schools across the country to determine its rankings.



National Lighthouse Schools of Excellence

Ellis Middle School and Streamwood High School received national Lighthouse School of Excellence awards from Renaissance Learning. Renaissance Learning's Lighthouse School program aims to help schools across the nation improve students' academic achievement by using data to improve instruction.

"Renaissance Learning programs have boosted test scores for our students in both reading and math," said Ellis Middle School Principal Perry Hayes.

"Since the implementation of Renaissance programs at Streamwood High, we have seen underperforming students turn their reading and math performance around," said Streamwood High School Principal Dr. Terri Lozier.











Abbott Teacher Inducted into "Fuel Up to Play 60" Hall of Fame

bbott Middle School mathematics teacher Kim Elders was named the 2013-2014 Illinois inductee into the Fuel Up to Play 60 Hall of Fame. Elders received the award for her role as program advisor by promoting healthy lifestyle changes among students and staff while ultimately reshaping the culture of her school to include nutritional awareness and physical activity as an important part of their daily routine. Established by the National Dairy Council and National Football League, in partnership with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Fuel Up to Play 60 is a national school wellness program that encourages young adults to eat healthy and stay active for at least 60 minutes a day.

Because of its active involvement in Fuel Up to Play 60, Abbott Middle School achieved "Touchdown" status this year, an honor awarded to schools who reach program goals and show a dedication to healthy change. Kenyon Woods Middle School and Larsen Middle School were also named Touchdown Schools for their participation in Fuel Up to Play 60.

outh Elgin High School Nurse Julia Olsta received The Journal of School Nursing/SAGE First Publication Award by a School Nurse at the National Association of School Nurses Conference in San Antonio, Texas, in July. The JOSN SAGE First Publication Award celebrates writing excellence of a first-time school nurse author. Olsta's publication reviewed literature linking breakfast consumption to improved student learning. Elgin High Teacher Awarded the **2014 Environmental Educator** of the Year

Igin High School teacher Deb Perryman was honored to receive the 2014 Environmental Educator of the Year award by the Environmental Education Association of Illinois (EEAI). Perryman was recognized for implementing environmental education in and out of the classroom, including using the 35 acres of natural space at Elgin High School as an instructional tool.

Perryman and her students spearheaded an advocacy campaign about Miss Martha, the Last Passenger Pigeon on Earth, to promote protecting biodiversity. The campaign resulted in former Illinois Governor Pat Quinn's naming September 2014, the Month of the Passenger Pigeon and U.S. Congresswoman Tammy Duckworth's recognizing EHS in the official congressional record. Perryman and her students organized a National Biodiversity Teach-in to honor the 100th anniversary of Miss Martha's death.

Liberty Elementary Teacher Serves on National Dream Team

iberty Elementary School sixth grade teacher Kim Stancl was named to a Dream Team of 200 teachers from across the country who participated in TeachFest in New Orleans on June 4-7. The professional development event is organized by Learn Zillion and gathers the nation's top Math and English Language Arts (ELA) teachers together to work on best practices around Common Core curriculum. Approximately 4,000 teachers around the world applied for the opportunity to participate, and Stancl was one of eleven chosen from Illinois.



U-46 Demonstrates Consistency in Operational Efficiency Initiatives

- From July 2013-June 2014, U-46 saved \$798,776.95 in printing costs because of a strategic decision to close our printing shop and outsource to Office Depot.
- U-46 received \$63,284 for recycling in 2013-2014 and \$43,952 in 2014-2015.
- As a result of Business Services' negotiating better prices for goods and services, the district saved \$4,418,474 in 2013-2014.
- A switch to LED lighting at two high schools, paid in part by state incentives and grants, yielded \$191,894 in cost savings and recurring annual electric savings of \$26,573.
- In 2002, the U-46 Plant Operations Department purchased a tub grinder for \$63,000 and began making its own mulch. Each year, U-46 produces a minimum of 1,500 cubic yards of mulch and playground surfacing material, saving the district approximately \$33,775 to \$59,600 per year.
- Due to reduced routing in high school bus stops and other transportation efficiency steps, U-46 reduced overall mileage to 4,306,412 in 2013-2014, down from 4,644,653 in 2012-2013.
- Savings were identified by the Transportation Department mechanics, performing services that were previously purchased through outside vendors. In 2013-2014, \$603,945 was spent in mechanic services, down from \$710,250 in 2012-2013.

U-46 Book Bus Drives **Increase in Reading**

he Book Bus is a mobile give-away book exchange for U-46 students. It's a chance for students to get books, give books, and trade books. Each student receives three books, and another for each book donated. U-46 bus drivers, the U-46 Transportation Department and members of the District U-46 Transportation Union sponsor the event. During the summer and throughout the year, the Book Bus made stops at Century Oaks, Garfield, Highland, Hillcrest, Lords Park, Oakhill, Parkwood, Sunnydale and Washington Elementary Schools.



U-46 Bus Drivers Recognized for Safe Driving

uring the 2013-2014 school year, U-46 bus drivers traveled 4,306,412 miles, transporting approximately 26,880 students each day. U-46 bus drivers received 236 safe driving awards under the National Safety Council Guidelines.



One Million Dollar Grant

to Improve School Security

-46 was awarded with a \$1 million grant by the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) to improve safety and security at the district's 40 elementary schools, eight middle schools, and five high schools. The district will use the grant to enhance security for elementary school entrances and implement a district-wide digital radio system.

Electronic access control (EAC) will be installed at two entrances of each elementary school and school employees will receive key fobs. Additionally each elementary school will receive a new door intercom system and additional exterior cameras, allowing the school's main office staff to monitor every door entrance at all times.

The district-wide digital radio system will be stationed in five high schools and broadcast to all schools. All principals will receive new radios with district-wide broadcast ability. The system also will allow local police departments the ability to communicate with all U-46 schools instantly and send out emergency messages directly to all principals.

U-46 Hosts Area-Wide Safety Training

In July, U-46 partnered with the City of Elgin Police and Fire Departments for an Active Shooter/Mass Casualty training at Otter Creek Elementary School in Elgin. Nearly three dozen fire departments, several SWAT teams, four area hospitals, 200 volunteer actors, and several U-46 staff members participated in the drill.

The empty weapon drill involved deploying police units, command post operations, casualty collection points, rescue task forces, mutual aid, evacuations and re-unification protocol.



espite being the second largest school district in Illinois, U-46's per-pupil spending is lower than the state average. We work hard to spend responsibly both on instruction and operations.

Doing More With Less

T-46 has lost \$36 million over four years due to cuts in state aid. U-46 does more with less so that our students will not suffer. Illinois has not fully funded the state aid formula since 2011.

A Balanced Budget

School District U-46 proposed a balanced Fiscal Year 2015 budget of \$488 million in revenue and \$487.7 million in expenses.

The budget projects a revenue increase of \$20 million. Expenditures are estimated to increase by \$13 million, with \$12 million related to capital investments in buildings and equipment. To cover the cost of contract increases, \$4 million is slated for salaries and benefits.

The district issued \$40 million dollars in bonds for capital projects to be completed in the next three to four years.

Did you know?

Illinois contributes a quarter of the total investment in K-12 education; other states, on average, cover half.

CEO Tony Sanders and the U-46 Board of Education have been vocal proponents of Senate Bill 16, the School Funding Reform Act of 2014. SB 16 passed the Illinois Senate in May but was not called for a vote in the House. The legislation aims to make education funding more equitable, based on student need, and is estimated to generate \$24 million for U-46. The Board of Education adopted a resolution in support of the bill and Sanders traveled to Springfield to speak at a public hearing and lobby Illinois lawmakers. U-46 will continue to take proactive steps to fight for statewide school funding reform.

Did you know?

-46 expenditures have increased by \$54.5 million in the past seven years. That's an average of 1.95% each year...less than the average rate of inflation.

Property Tax Undate

In the 2014 property tax bills, DuPage County homeowners saw a significant increase while other U-46 taxpayers saw their bills decrease. The increase was an error caused by misreporting by the Kane County Clerk's Office. County and state officials have said the miscalculation will be corrected and reflected in tax bills in 2015. This means that DuPage homeowners may see their taxes decrease next year and Kane County homeowners should expect an increase in their tax bills.

Investing in Our Future

U-46 is committed to investing in programs that will ensure our students are college and career ready. Our 2014-2015 spending priorities include:

- Expanding the number of All-day Kindergarten, Dual Language, Early Childhood, and Gifted classrooms.
- Providing educational and extracurricular opportunities for all students.
- Aligning curriculum to new learning standards.
- Increasing technology in the classroom, including expanding our wireless access to every classroom in every building and replacing old computers.
